










# 1986-87: A YEAR FOR NEW IDEAS, NEW IN-SIGHTS, AND NEW THIRST FOR KNOWLEDGE


# FRESHMEN PASS FIRST TEST

# BELCHERS WANTED: ADDLY WITHIN








# Fresheree is a smash . . .










# FUN TIMES AT FRESHEREE


















# HOMECOMING . . . BRINGING BACK THE ROMANCE



#### "JOHN BROWN'S BODY"


October 16, 1859, John Brown and his troops entered Harpers Ferry, Virginia and took over the U.S. arsenal. December 20, 1860, South Carolina declared itself as the first state to secede from the union. 4:30 a.m. April 12, 1861 Confederate troops fired on the U.S. Fort Sumter in the harbor of Charleston, S.C. the war had begun. The first major battle of the Civil War was fought by two armies that were not prepared. It began beside a sluggish stream in Northern Virginia. This was called Bull Run on July 21, 1861. September 17, 1862 the two armies clashed in the battle of Antietam. This cost more American casualties than on any other day in any other war, before or since a total of 25,000 dead and wounded. July 31, 1863 the armies had an out engagement but the conflict, which had to come when General Lee invaded the North, now erupted into a three-day battle of

epic proportions. April 9, 1865, in the farmhouse of Wilmer McLean, in Appomattox County, Virginia, General Robert E. Lee and General Ulysses S. 


# "A TIME FOR GROWTH, AND A TIME FOR DREAMS"



We on the OASIS staff hope you enjoy the versatility and fun of our theme.










The time has now come to, say, "so long." My experience here at NNC has been one that will never leave me. I've been here now for four years, they've been learning, growing and experience-filled — oh

Students are constantly writing their names on papers, homework etc., this means a student may have signed their name about 17,700 times in 16 years of school.



























# ORGANIZATIONS

In March of 1987 the Publications Board was officially dissolved and its duties and concerns were transfered to the Senate. But before this transfer of powers occured, the Board discussed many controversial issues and completed many projects which include a recommendation for a professional journalism program for future students at NNC and the choosing of two new editors for the following The members of the final Publications Board can feel satisfied that they upheld and finished up the tradition of ensuring fine publications for their school.

#### SOCIAL BOARD

The 1986-87 Social Board, under the direction of ASNNC Social Vice-President, Ken Lewis, provided several social functions ranging from picnics to concerts. Perhaps the biggest challenge for the group was the ASNNC budget conflict with regard to financing for concerts. Two or three concerts, including Michael W. Smith and Brian Duncan, were held successfully early in the year. However, as Senate realized that a deficit of over 3,000 dollars had occured, they cancelled scheduled concerts. Even with this financial set-back, the board was successful in staging many events that were just as rewarding and less expensive. # SENATE FACES BU



The center stage of NNC student government was filled by the Student Senate in 1986-87. The year saw the Senate expand its role to areas previously unexplored but also revealed three arduous term budget battles, no less intense than those encountered in the U.S. Congress, albeit over much less money. The term-by-term budgeting process absorbed most of Senate's time. Senate debated Executive Officer salary levels and finally arrived at a compromise moderate figure.

The budgetary belt was tight all year long due to a fall leadership retreat that consumed nearly 20% of first term funds. Although the Senate was faced with difficult choices, its leadership and members responded well. In 1986-87 the Senate budgeted more funds for outreach and ministry programs than in previous years. The Senate also passed several pieces of financial legislation that promise to insure greater responsibility in the future. These financial reform acts included a balanced budget statute, individual executive budget accounts, and a new purchase order system.

### ETARY SHORTFALLS



1986-87 not only found Senate taking strong financial action but also asserting itself in other ways. The Senate disolved Publications Board and absorbed its duties to streamline the system of accountability. The Senate also acted to direct that Dooley Hall be made a dormitory that upperclass men and women could be housed in. The Senate passed a resolution calling for chapel reform; and administration-student committee then drew up a new invative chapel system. The Senate established an impeachment procedure to insure that only the guilty be removed from office.

In January the Senate passed a resolution congratulating the New York Giants for the Superbowl victory. As this session of Senate came to a close the Senate combined the duties of the President and the Community Relations Vice-President in effort for greater coordination. In the final month Senate President Pro-Tempore replaced the Executive Vice-President as Chairman of the Senate. The Executive Vice-President and Parliamentarian resigned their posts. The 1986-87 Senate was the most productive Senate of recent years. The ASNNC Senate was a learning process for all involved because it allowed students to learn the practics of government and the responsibility that accompanies being trusted by their peers. Senate passed a great deal of worthwhile legislation and at the same time provided a compass of direction for a sometimes stormy year.

## STUDENTS ALUMNI COUNCIL












# THE CRUSADER "AIDS, TERRORISM, FREEDOM OF THE PRESS"

The Crusader in 1986-87 expanded its role as a campus publication beyond previous limits. This year saw the student newspaper write several movie reviews along with current topics of AIDS, terrorism, student government conflicts, and college politics. A major crisis The Crusader faced this year was in its coverage of the resignation of Rev. Duane Yoesel as pastor of College Church. The Crusader was censored and a tension-filled confrontation between the administration and the student editor resulted in several dark days for student operated publications. The message seemed clear: "write about anything as long as it doesn't hit too close to home." However, not the entire year was dominated by issues of freedom of The Crusader also wrote several features including stories about local people who help students go to NNC and what being a Nazarene means. Each issue also had an article by President Wetmore that allowed the President to communicate with students. The Crusader came out every three weeks and its production was a story all by itself. The Crusader staff seemed to work best between 11:00 p.m. — 4:00 a.m. Those late nights were the result of late breaking news and stories turned-in late. During those production marathons the editor and his staff would grow almost catatonic as they worked fiercely toward that last deadline. The Crusader and Oasis editors formulated a goal of dispensing with Publications Board . . . the last milestone around the neck of Student Publications. One tension filled Pub Board meeting revealed that the Senate had passed legislation ending Pub Board and Pub Board members sat dumbfounded as the news of their unemployment Three personalities on The Crusader left after three years of involvement: production assistant Brian Morrow typed nearly 35 issues of The Crusader and was a prime reason the paper came out each time. Jeff Shea, served as the business manager for three years and kept The Crusader operating in the black. Three-year editor Rich Hume finally was succeeded by Elissa Westbrook in late-May. As 1986-87 came to close. The Crusader staff members struggled to reach that final deadline: June 14 and graduation! Thanks Rich Hume.



# INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS CLUB










# NNC TAKES C OF I 7 OUT OF 7 . . .



# MEN'S SOCCER: ALWAYS HAD IT, ALWAYS WILL





# WOMEN'S B-BALL YOUNG TEAM GAINS EXPERIENCE




# MEN'S BASKETBALL

SPIRIT AND STUDENT SUPPORT BOOST CRUSADER'S CONFIDENCE

The men's basketball team completed the regular season with 13 wins and 14 losses. According to head-coach, Garry Matlock, the team improved greatly throughout the season. "We came into January 2 and 10 and no one really gave us a chance to make the playoffs. But the players never lost confidence in themselves, and together, with great support from the NNC student body, we began to win," said Coach Matlock. With one full week left in the regular season, the team clinched a playoff berth, but lost to Oregon Tech in the first round. Team captain, Norm Parrish, a 6'4" senior from Centerville, Utah, led the team in points scored. He finished with 509 for the season, an average of 18.2 per game. He was also selected for All-District, all-Eastern Division, and voted Most Valuble Player by the team. James Smith, 6'6" freshman from Dayton, Ohio, led the team in rebounds. He accumulated 252 for the season, an average of 9 per game. He also was voted Most Improved Player by the team. Smith was the third leading scorer for the team with 342 for the season. Mike Pardon, 6'4" junior from Roseburg, Idaho, became known for his many three point shots. He scored 414 points, an average of 14.8 per game. He received Honorable Mention All-District and Honorable Mention in the Eastern-Division. Pardon was also voted Most Inspirational Player by his team mates. Mike Davidson, the 6'3" sophomore from Boise, Idaho, also received Honorable Mention in the Eastern Division. Davidson scored 341 points for the Crusader during the season. Perhaps the most frustrating games of the entire season were the four losses to the College of Idaho, seemingly NNC's biggest rival. NNC vs C of I games consisted of tension, fights, and finally, defeat. NNC played, and won, only one over-time game against Western Oregon, in which the final score was 103-98.




#### GILBERT RANKS IN NATIONAL LEVEL DECATHLON










#### NNC BASEBALL: 16 WINS, 15 LOSSES.

"Character, Culture, and Christ."




#### DR. FRED KNIGHT

While in L.A. teaching high school, Dr. Knight started a Youth for Christ club on the secular campus. The club became one of the largest in the school with over 150 members.




"People are searching for something real," Dr. Knight said; "the kids in the classroom will pick up on who you are and what you stand for. They will know within days what you believe in and will ask you about it." Dr. Knight also said that he has had an incredible opportunity to witness in working on public-secular campuses. "My philosophy," said Dr. Knight, "is that if a person out in the world doesn't know Christ but they know me, they will want to know Christ because they know me. I've always liked to sell things-cars, real-estate, selling in a department store-and I've used that ability to help me to witness."

The aspect that Dr. Knight will miss most about NNC is his students. He also feels that NNC yields the "cream of the crop." Dr. Knight is an optimist with an extremely positive attitude towards NNC and the church itself. He feels that at any institution there will be problems because there are always differences of opinions. "We at NNC have a different emphasis, though. Some may say it is just like any other college. That's a view from the outside looking in. Once a person gets in, they can see it is worth it. We have to do more than just meet standards," said Dr. Knight.

Dr. Knight lifts Will Roger's quote by saying, "I never met a man that I didn't like." Dr. Knight has faith in people and believes the best of them. Dr. Knight's plans for the future include a trip to Alaska to see his daughter and family, some fishing, hunting, and spending a lot of time with his grandchildren. He will also continue as full time lay pastor at the Community Baptist Church in Melba. "I am extremely greatful for the time I've had at NNC and am looking forward to many great years ahead! I will continue to support NNC-I know she has a true mission, wonderful students, a dedicated faculty, and above all, a great God!"


#### Jeffrey Brian Shea

#### Jay Dean Lenn




#### Olivia Lynn Tate


#### George L. Zickefoose














#### CHAPEL CHANGES LIVES . . .



Wassmuth spoke on the Aryan Nations, The Order, The KKK, and other white supremacy organizations. Fairbanks shared information about the seminary which is the only other Nazarene seminary besides that in Kansas City.







#### EDITORS RANK YEAR: 1986-87



RICH HUME — CRUSADER

I have always believed that most people have an inaccurate perception of NNC and its mission. Parents often think that NNC is a place where students can be indoctrinated and isolated from that "big, dangerous world out there." Others perceive NNC as a four-year summer camp. None of these beliefs are valid.

In order to determine if the 1986-87 year was a success, our perception of the purpose of NNC is very important. This year was full of activity, but campus life was a far cry from the giddy, pastel portrayal found in most college promotional material.

In student government there were disappointments and successes. Two scandals rocked ASNNC this year: Although both were different situations they showed a lack of judgement and a disregard for the value of servanthood. 1986-87 also saw the dissolution of the ASNNC Publications Board, a step toward reform in student government bureaucracy and a free speech. In the spring, the Guatemala project faltered as people decided not to go, money was not raised, and project leadership failed to give direction. The ASNNC Senate combined the duties of the ASNNC President and the Vice President for Community Relations to aid in the stream lining of government responsibilities. The ASNNC Senate also budgeted more funds to student outreach and service organizations than ever before. In a historic move, the ASNNC Senate originated the idea of making Dooley Hall a men and womens' dorm. College leadership implemented the plan. For student government, 1986-87 was a year of disappointment but also a year that saw student leaders confronting issues much more important than planning ice cream socials.

In publications, 1986-87 was a year of continued improvement and learning. Jon Remy, NNC's second-year OASIS Editor, continued to produce a "within budget", quality annual. The

Crusader, under my direction for the third year, was a newspaper that constantly found itself in the midst of a controversy. In the fall, the decision to publish a story on the resignation of College Church pastor, Duanne Yoesal, resulted in a bittet conflict between journalism and insitutional values. A reluctant compromise allowed the paper to be published with a censored story. The Crusader also published the first movie reviews to appear in any Nazarene student publication, and dealt with the 1980's issues of AIDS and materialism. Both the OASIS and The Crusader were able to function as partners in publications in large part due to the friendship between editors. It is my opinion that Jon Remy has been the best OASIS Editor in recent memory. Campus life consists of much more than publications and student government. This year NNC celebrated the careers of long-time Registrar Wanda McMichael and Education and Education Professor Dr. Fred Knight. 1987 saw the 50th Wedding Anniversary of Doctor and Mrs. A. Elwood Sanner. Dr. Sanner has been a religion professor for NNC for three decades. This year NNC gained reverend Michael Pitts who is in charge of growing outreach, ministry and service activities on campus. Rev. Pitts, who also is involved in NNC Chapel programs, headed a committee that established guidelines for a sweeping chapel reform that promises better chapels and more student involvement. Wendell Bowes, a religion professor, earned his Ph.D in 1987.

NNC's Forensics Squad completed a great year. Many team members, competing for the first time, led NNC to a first place Sweepstakes Trophy for the Northwest District.

In sports, 1986-87 was overall a good year. The Basketball season saw a young and underrated team make the District playoffs. Senior Forward, Norm Parrish, provided some great memories as he always exhibited Poise and control on the court. The Baseball season was once again long, however the team made the playoffs due to some awesome efforts on the part of some individual players. This team showed great potential but always seemed held back by a coach who shouldn't have been. Jeff Seaney represented NNC at the National Wrestling Tournament. Track had new young coaches with the most students involved in years. Mike Gilbert went to Nationals to compete in the decathalon. Sports probably provide the most entertainment and are a major point for social activity on campus. It seems appropriate to conclude the review of the sports year with this, "Next year we'll beat'em at O'Connor."

How does one pull out a label and stick it on the whole year? How can we determine if this year was a success or a failure? I began this article by discussing outside perceptions of NNC. Now let me share my perception of our college. NNC is a physical place, it provides an environment, circumstances, and people. Its uniquely Christian environment requires that students come to grips with their faith: Accepting faith or rejecting it.
