Dr. Gordon Wetmore, NNC's President since 1983, believes the first goal of NNC should be to serve the students. "If we can't do that," he says, "we do not belong here." And to that end, Dr. Wetmore led NNC through 1987-88 with determination and strength.

In response to our question of what makes NNC and 1987-88 unique, Dr. Wetmore responded; "The unique quality of NNC is found in it's regional charge — to be the very best Liberal Arts College we can be." And this is one goal Dr. Wetmore has every intention of meeting.

Dr. Wetmore sees the future as being charged with excitement. "Great things will happen as we continue to strengthen ties on the Northwest region and deepen academic programs at NNC." Also in Dr. Wetmore's plans is the increasing of the endowment fund.

1987-88 brought trauma to NNC and the world. AIDS ran out of control and other diseases came to light. Dr. Wetmore realizes that NNC and the Church will have to take increasingly active roles in the AIDS situation in the future. He believes that NNC must face the problem squarely by providing guidance and information.

Members of the Faculty and Student Body alike salute Dr. Wetmore and the careful leadership he offers our college. 1987-88 would certainly not be the same without him at the helm of our ship.

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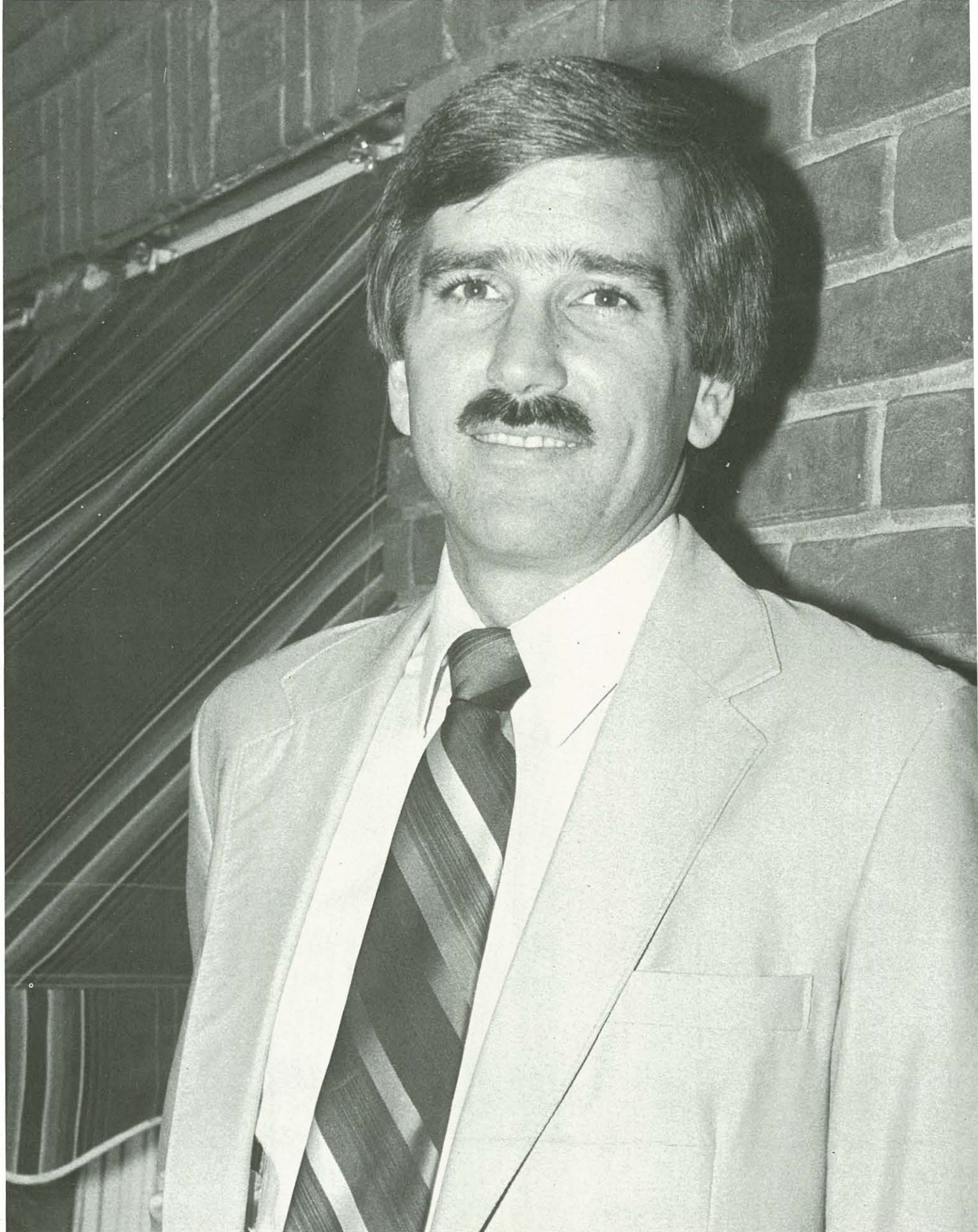
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DR. WATSON EXEMPLIFIES CHRISTIAN STANDARD.



OASIS DEDICATED TO INSPIRATIONAL SERVICE

The entire state of Idaho was rocked on November 15, 1987 when word came that an airliner had crashed at Denver's Stapleton Airport. Bound for Boise, the Continental jet attempted take off but soon smashed into the pavement. Twenty-six lives came to an end that night on Runway 26. Many children and parents waited for hours to hear some word of hope.

As many held onto life by a thread, various NNC administrators sped to the Boise Airport. One member of the NNC community was fighting for his life that night. Dr. Kenneth Watson's friends and family considered the worst and hoped for the best.

Dr. Watson suffered collapsed

lungs, head injuries, various bone injuries, severe cuts and bruises, and critical brain damage. He would linger near death for several weeks.

As NNC and thousands of Nazarenes across the nation and world united in prayer, Dr. Watson began to respond to stimulation. The coma was losing its grip on his brain. Recovery was in sight!

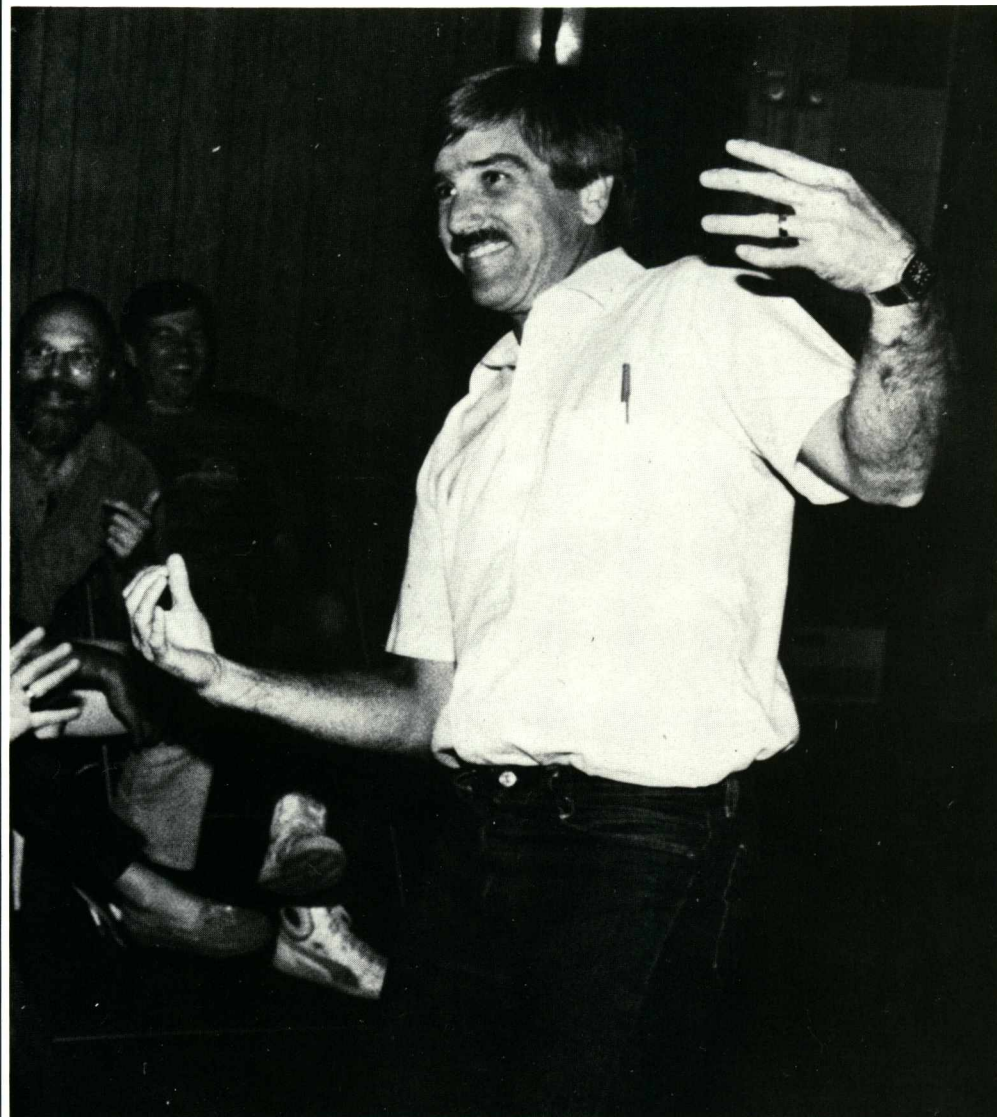
The 1988 OASIS is dedicated to Dr. Kenneth Watson and the courageous way in which he leads his life.

Dr. Watson, in his deep concern for the education of Christian young people, left a prestigious position in the private business sector and assumed the position of

Academic Dean and Vice President of Academic Affairs at NNC. He served at this post for two years prior to his accident.

There were many times throughout his recovery that Dr. Watson could have given up and gone on. But he fought. And because he fought and because God was willing, Dr. Watson is with us today.

Dr. Watson's love for life, his courage, his commitment to academic excellence, and his inspirational attitude in the face of death are awe inspiring. Dr. Watson exemplifies the Christian Standard and the NNC ideal. To him, the 1988 OASIS is and will remain — forever dedicated.

But joy and praises ring.

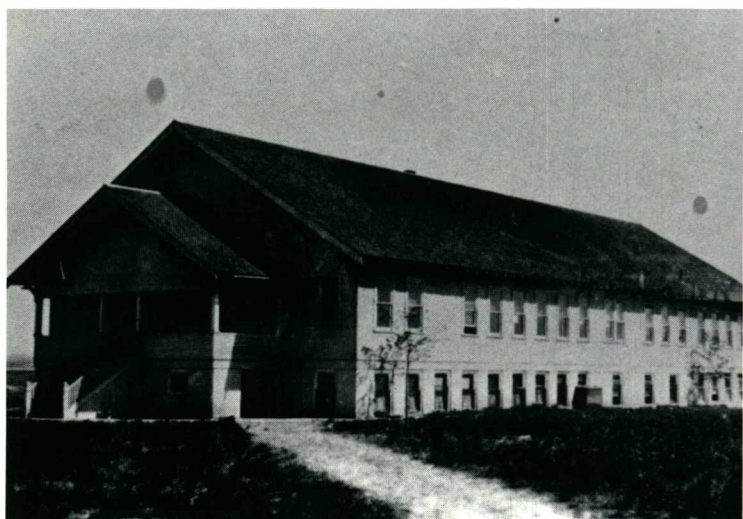

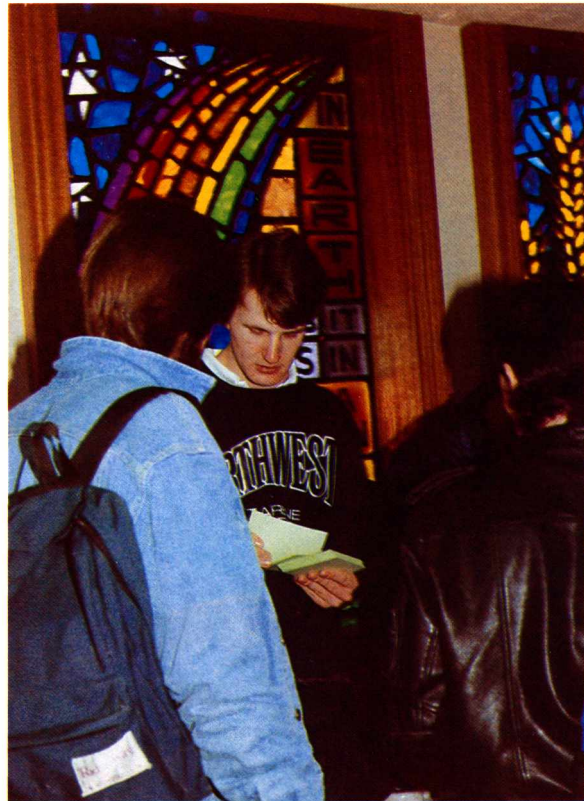

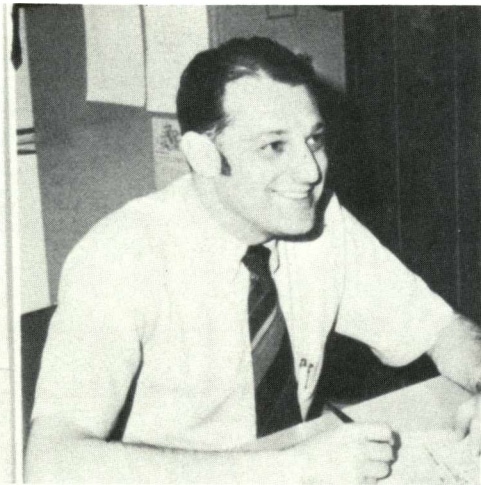

The one thing all these students had in common was the changing process taking place in their lives. Not one of them would walk away as they had come.

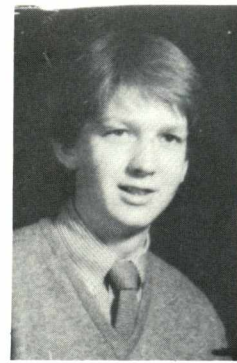

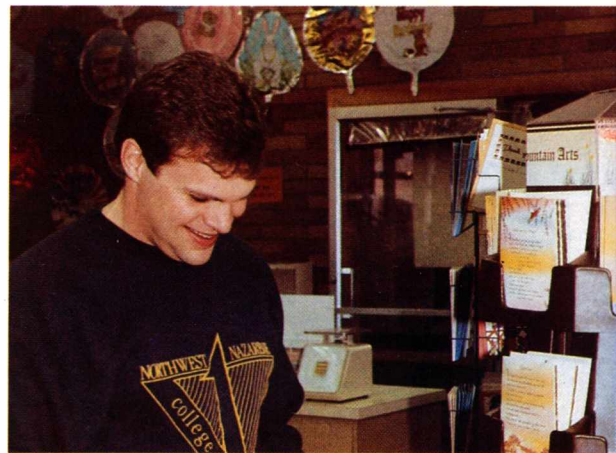

CARING PROCESS

The Spiritual forefront at NNC saw a lot of changes this year. There was an air of unity on the campus as students, professors, and faculty joined in prayer for the fall revival with Stephen Manley. During this revival, there were many heart-felt, life-changing decisions made. Burdens were lifted and tears were shed. A new religious life director, Rev. Fred Bullerton, joined the campus' efforts at strengthening and solidifying the Christian climate. He, as well as several students, claimed Proverbs 3:5,6: "Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding. In all your ways acknowledge Him and He will direct your paths." He saw this as the key to a successful walk with the Lord. His goal was that "through the chapel services and ministry opportunities, students would be challenged and stretched, both in their spiritual journey and as persons." Several students gave their input on the spiritual side of NNC: Mark Halley — "About four people (myself, Terry Buster, Mike Moore, and Kurt Waddle) prayed together for over an hour during revival week for the Holy Spirit to come glorify His Name among us and this school." Denise Wadley — "In October, the Sunday before revival week, I gave my life wholly and completely to Christ. My R.A. (Bev Rader), and my roommate (Mary Reimers) came down and prayed with me — that

meant so much. Then Bev gave me some advice on what to do now that helped me. I've been seeing Him change me from the inside out — It's wonderful!" Matthew Lolkema — "The Fall Revival with Dr. Stephen Manley was especially meaningful for me. It was a spiritually motivating time, and showed me what my priorities should be." Gale Zickefoose — "NNC had made me more accountable for the way I spend my time and has also pushed me to strive for a stronger walk with Jesus." Laura Bennett — "Since I have come to NNC, my desire to know God better has increased. Seeing students and faculty together on fire for the Lord has really excited me." Ginger Bell — "The past 2 years at NNC have opened my mind and heart to the meaning of 'seek ye first the Kingdom of God.' I have learned (and am learning) that God is concerned about all areas of my life — academically, spiritually, and socially." Bev Rader — "In 20 years, when I'm looking back at my sophomore year, I will see four friends praying together in the Student Center every Monday morning at 7:00. I may forget the wet hair, sleepy eyes, and tired bodies; but never the bonds we formed of the victories we saw." The spiritual growth that occurred would stay with us in the form of very special bonds between friends. Christ's work in our lives was truly evident.

Here are some views of various students:

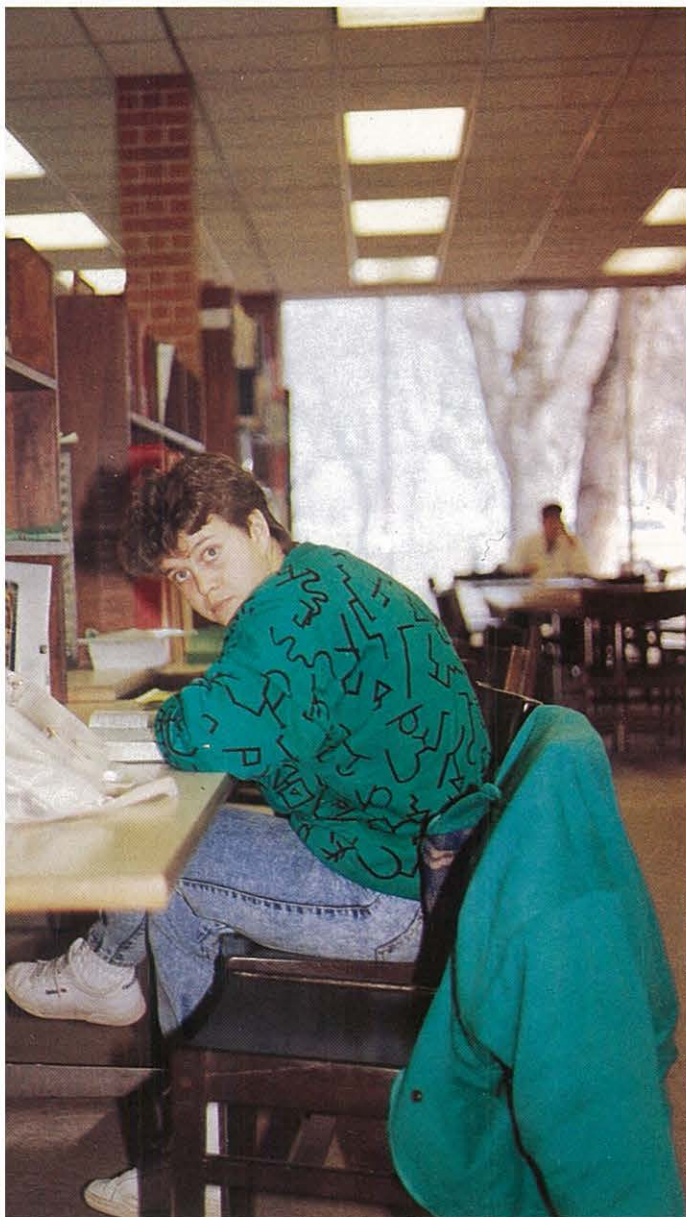

CLASS, CHARM, BEAUTY

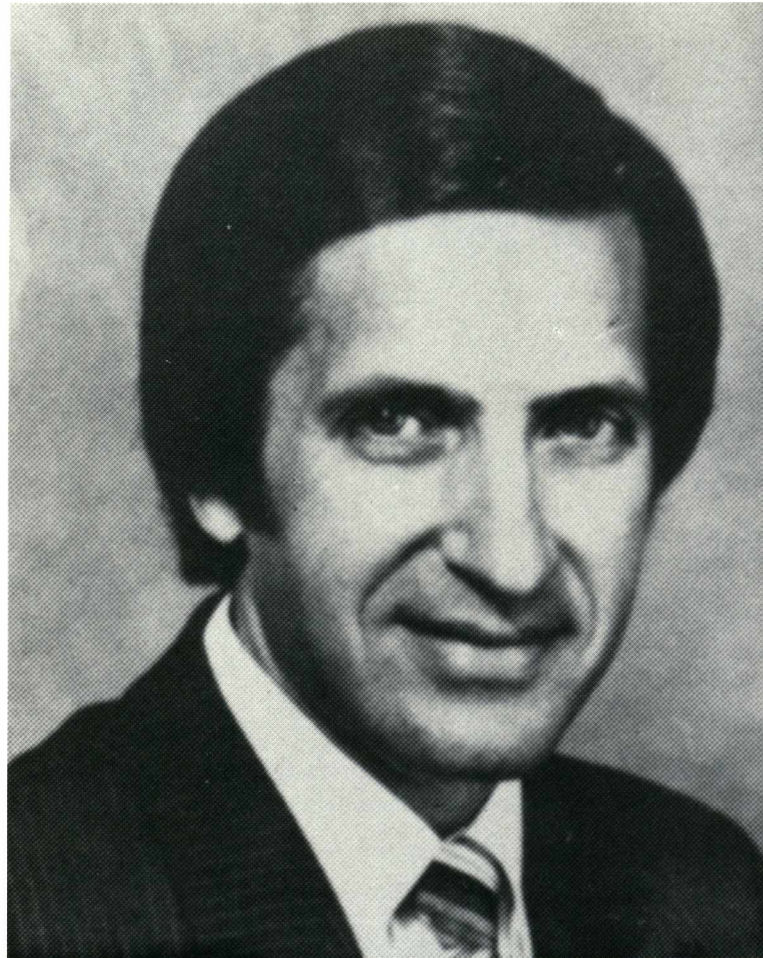

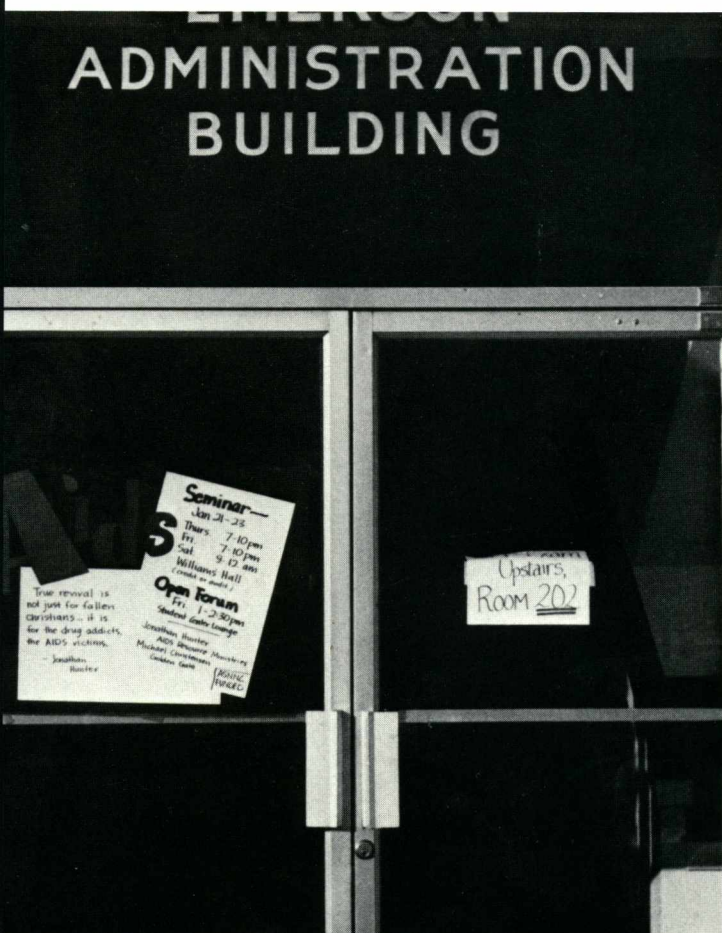

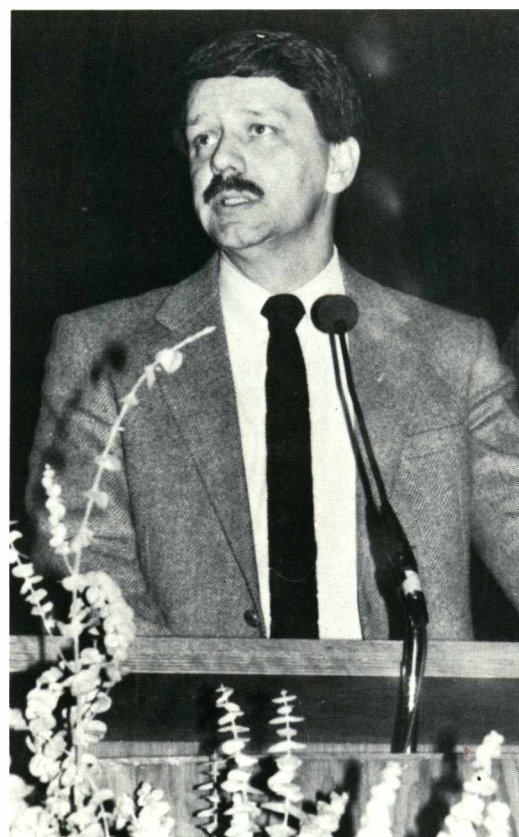

HOMECOMING

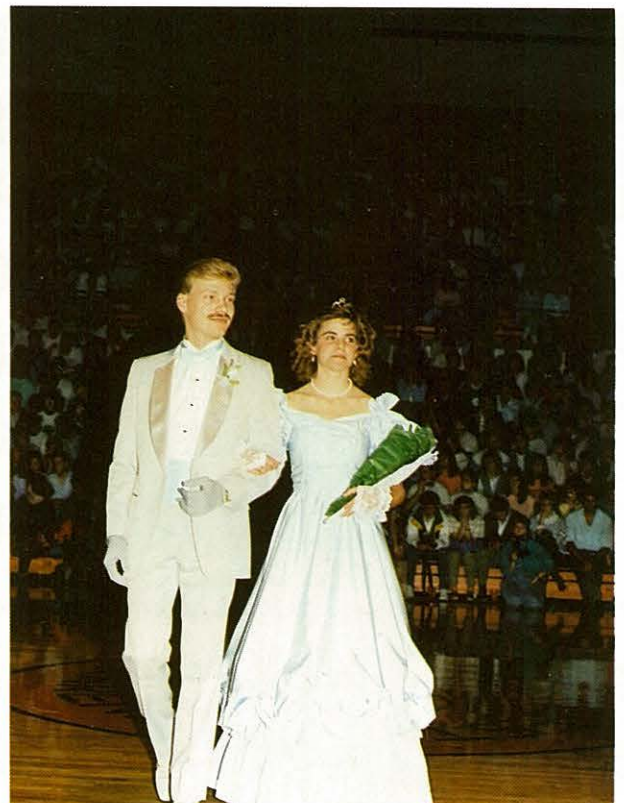

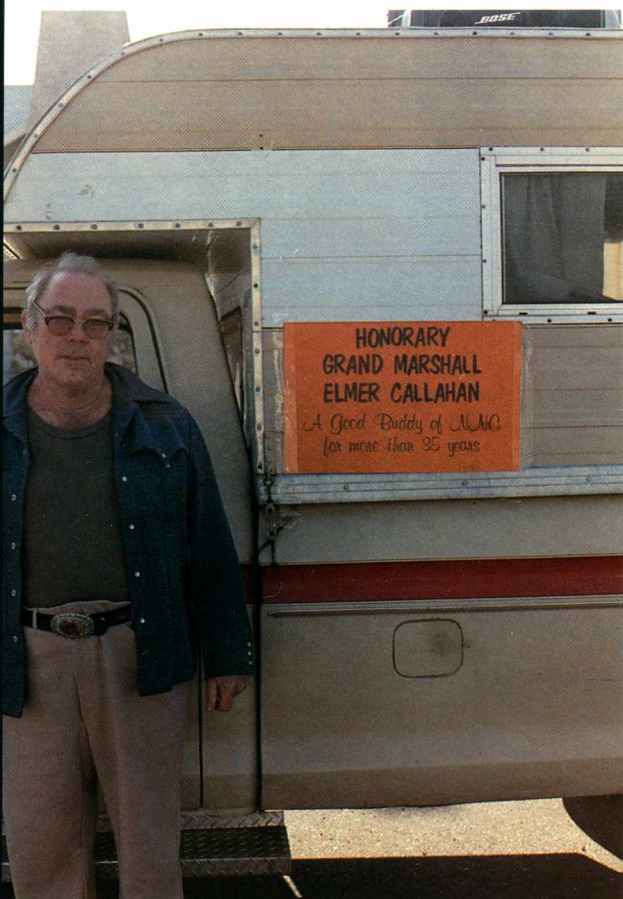

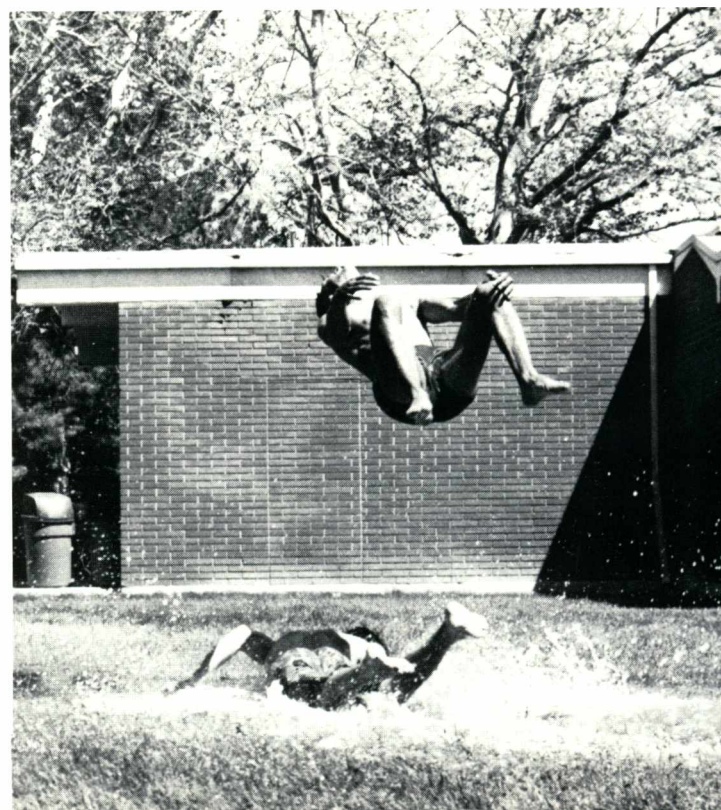

FRIDAY NIGHT LIVE

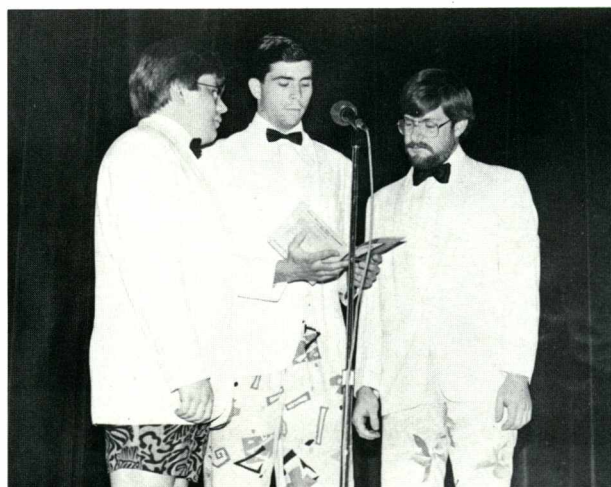

ORGANIZATIONS



ASNNC EXECUTIVE OFFICERS

As the Executive Vice President for 1987-88 I had a lot to learn at the beginning of my term in office. I have continued to learn of my responsibilities as the year has progressed.

One of the primary responsibilities of the Executive Vice President is to coordinate and oversee all ASNNC related elections. Jon Remy, as my elections committee chairman, helped me organize and implement the elections this past year. Student government as a whole would like to thank ASNNC for turning out to vote at each election. Students have an excellent opportunity to get involved in some of the decision making for the policies and procedures within the school through participation on Student Faculty Committees.

Over the course of this year some changes were made in library policies,

academic offerings and requirements, and chapel regulations. The student members of these various student/faculty committees were given the opportunity to include their comments in the discussions and vote on the decisions that were made.

As chairman of the senate, I was given the opportunity to serve on three standing committees and several special committees. These committees throughout the year wrote legislation to make executive officers more accountable for their responsibilities, cleaned up the run-off election proceedings, audited both student publications, budgeted conservatively, and regularly reviewed publications for quality. As a result of a strong and conservative budgeting process, Senate was able to

fund various student inspired projects such as: Jennifer Roemhildt's AIDS Awareness week, the Crusader in Mission trip to Mexico, and the Urban Ministries excursions into the inner cities of Seattle, San Francisco, Los Angeles, and Portland.

Another area of my office that kept me busy was the updating and revising of the Constitution, Code, and Procedures of the ASNNC. For the first time in several years everyone has the same complete document.

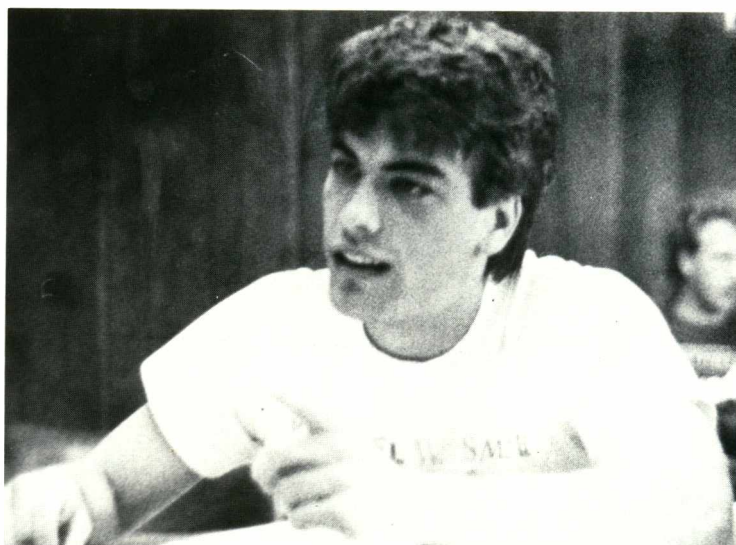
The students of Northwest Nazarene College gave \$25.00 per term to be used in student functions or activities related to them. The ASNNC Senate was the body of elected students who made the decisions of what money went where. The infamous but necessary budget creation was the primary time when the money was directed each term to different organizations or sections of student government. The Ways and Means Committee, chaired by Sophomore Senator Ben Olson, composed rough drafts of the budgets, then after changes made by the whole Senate, the budget was accepted and put into action.

The 1986-87 Senate passed legislation, which dissolved the ASNNC Publications Board. This was done to give the Senate direct responsibility for the OASIS and the Crusader. The Senate committee responsible for reviewing the publications was the Campus Life Committee, chaired by Junior Senator Greg Cullen.

The Senate Judiciary Committee, chaired by Senior Senator Tyler Martin, was responsible for reviewing the constitutions of new organizations and the newly revised ASNNC code.

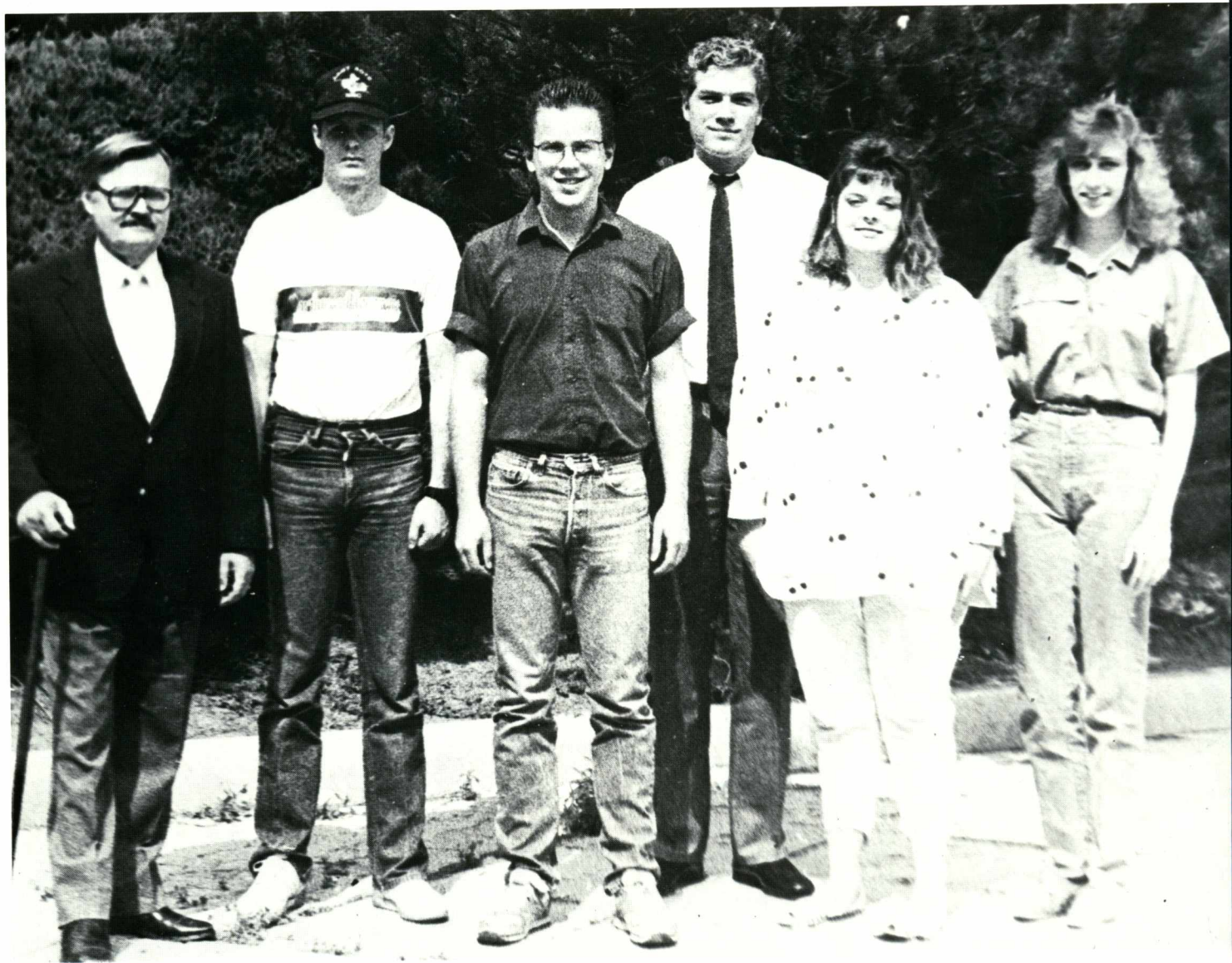
These three Senate committees did many more activities than what was mentioned. All the senators, met together once a week for the regular Senate meetings. During these weekly meetings, Senate decided to accept the three budgets and sponsored three concerts, a new computer for the Crusader, some Homecoming activities, the AIDS Seminar, the Pryaelife Seminar, World Christian Movement at NNC, and many other activities. The Senate also supported the week of prayer for the Fall Revival, ISIL, SAC activities, and CIM.

The 1987-88, led by Vice President Kurt Finkbeiner, made each of their decisions out of the best interest of the student body. This conscious effort taught accountability and responsibility to each Senator. The Senators also learned the procedures of parliamentary law, the practice of government and the method in which to pass effective legislation. Through this learning experience ASNNC helped to make NNC an eventful and more comfortable campus.

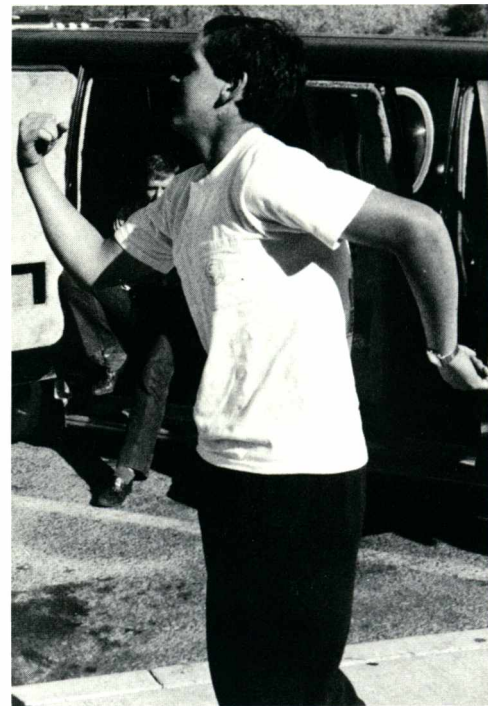

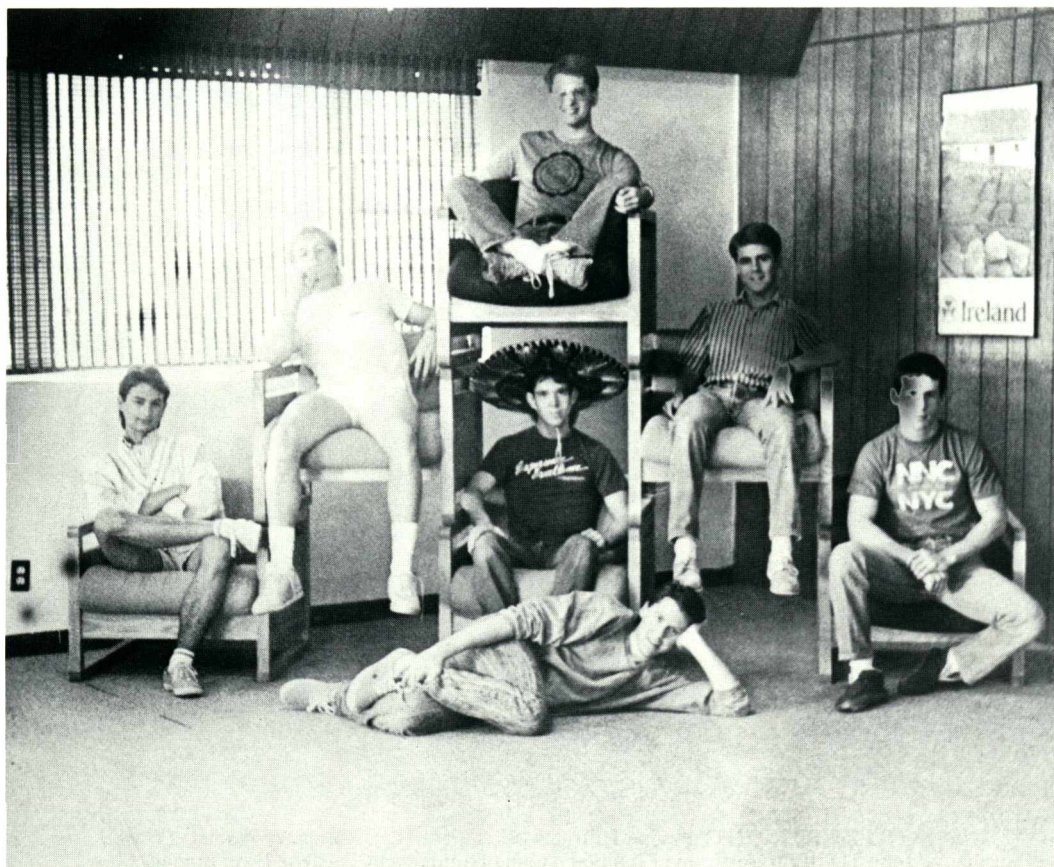

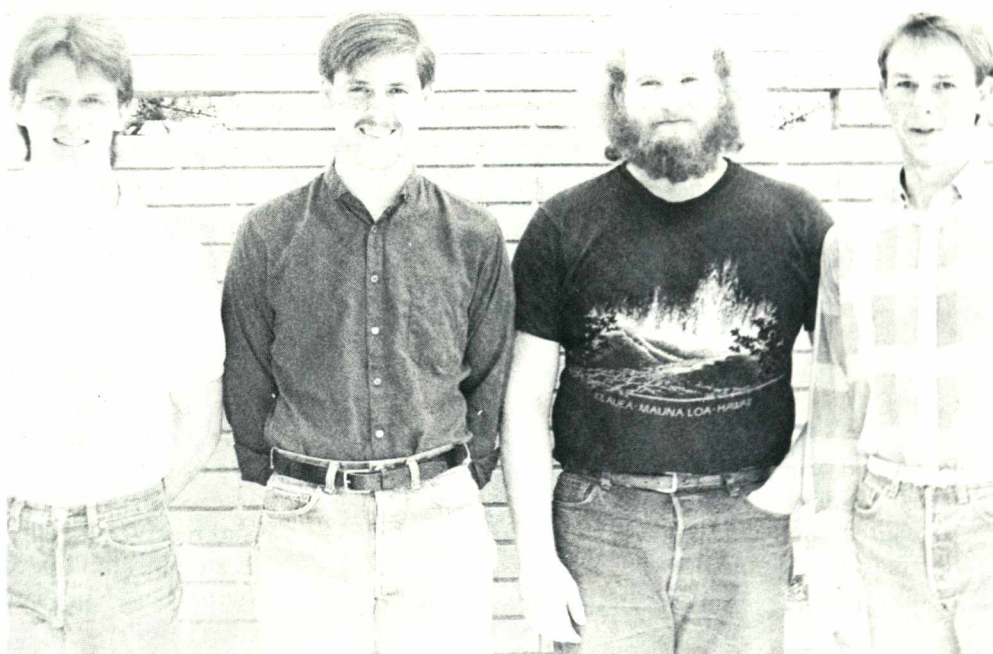

SOCIETY OF THE COURT

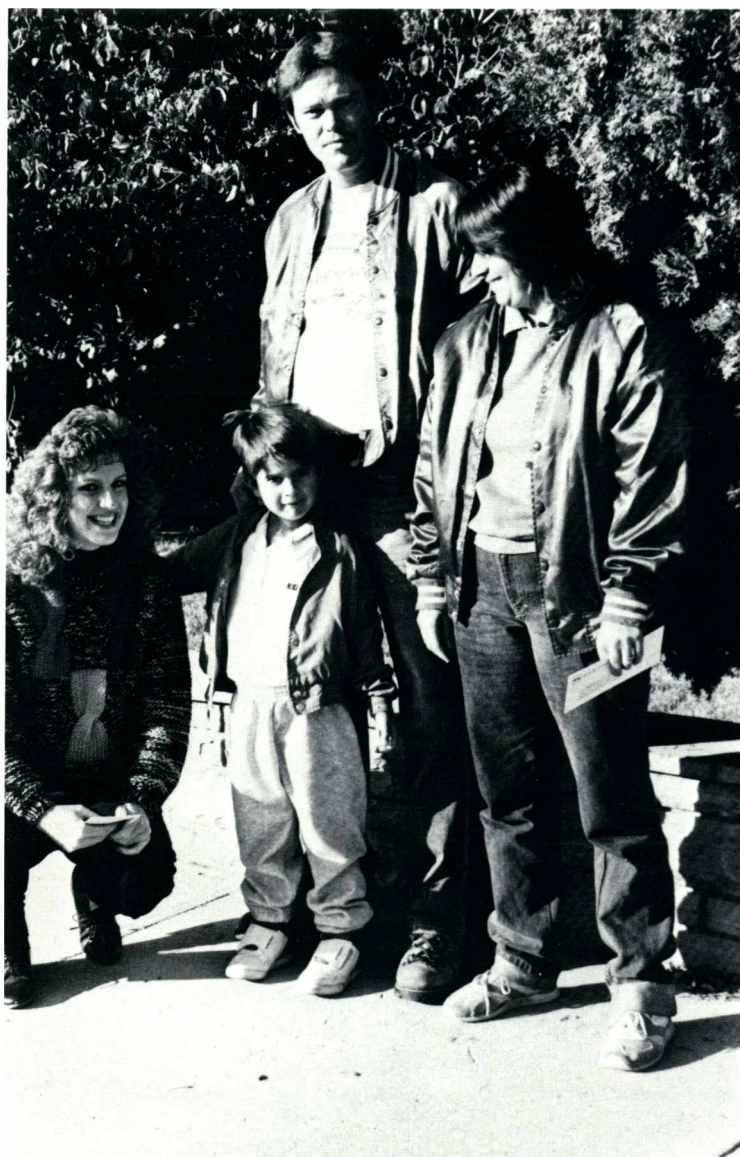

COMMUNITY RELATIONS

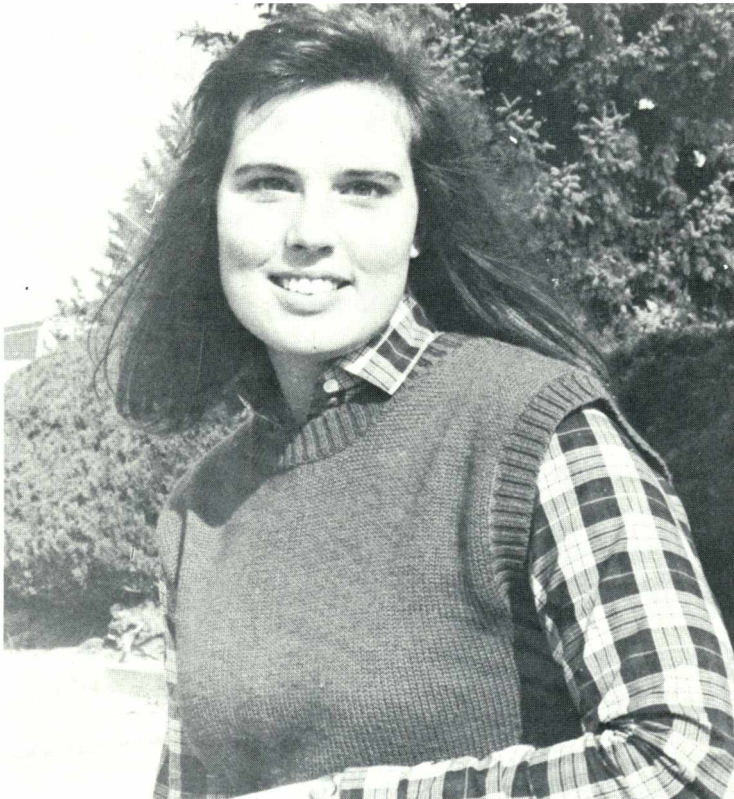
My year as ASNNC Community Relations Coordinator began by taking on a fundraiser for two children in the community. Barbie Wilson, a three year old, was mauled by a Pit Bull and Joshua Basier, a five year old, was the victim of third degree burns as a result of playing with matches. The faculty and students of NNC were asked to donate money for the two children to help pay for the medical bills. \$640.88 was raised for the two children which was divided between them. At the end of November, donations for the Christmas Gift Project began. The purpose of the project is to receive donated presents for the elderly in rest homes who do not have a family. The needs of the elderly were listed in the Idaho Press Tribune for two weeks. During this time, people in the community were allowed to call in and donate to the person of their choice. The project was a great success! Over 1500 presents were donated for the elderly in seven rest homes in the surrounding area. Two blood drives were also conducted during the year. One in October and the other in April. NNC has been well recognized by state representatives of the Red Cross for the attitude, cooperation, and organization of the blood drives held at NNC. In 1987, NNC won the Idaho Outstanding Performance Award for these qualities. 119 pints of blood were donated at the drive in October, missing the quota by only one. NNC still has a chance of winning the travelling award once again for 1988. Working with the students involved in the Big Brother and Sister program and communicating with NNC's Compassion Child from Kenya were also among my responsibilities. The year was a complete success and it was very exciting seeing all the lives that were touched in our community. The faculty and students of NNC were all very supportive in all the activities conducted. My year would not have been as successful without their help.

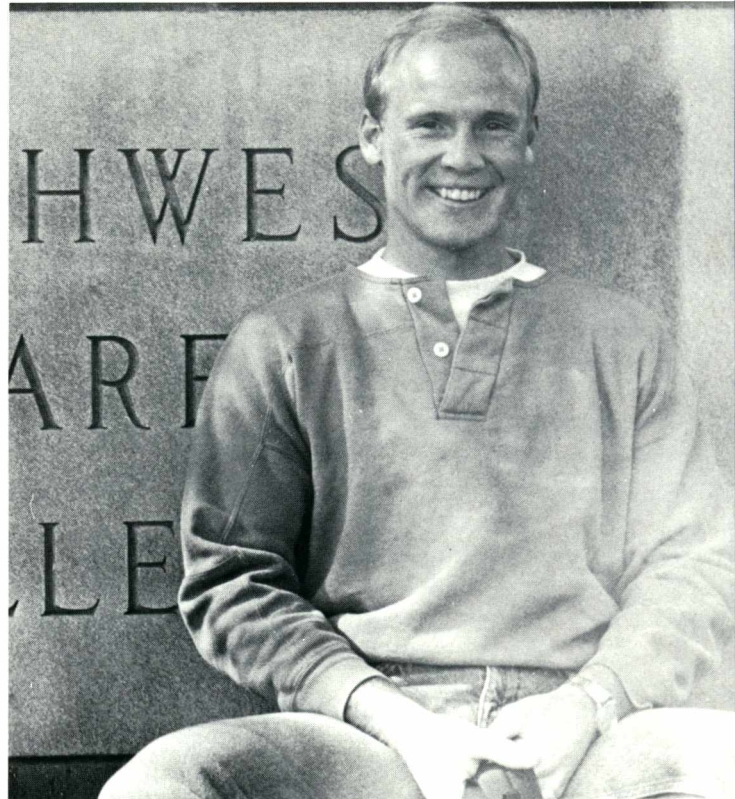
WHO'S WHO

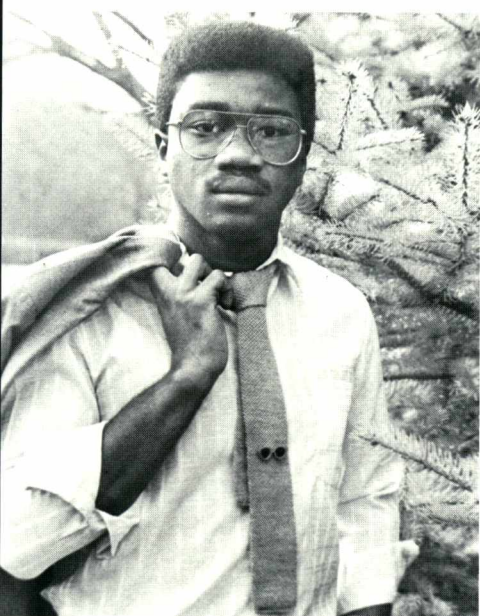
LISA ALLING:

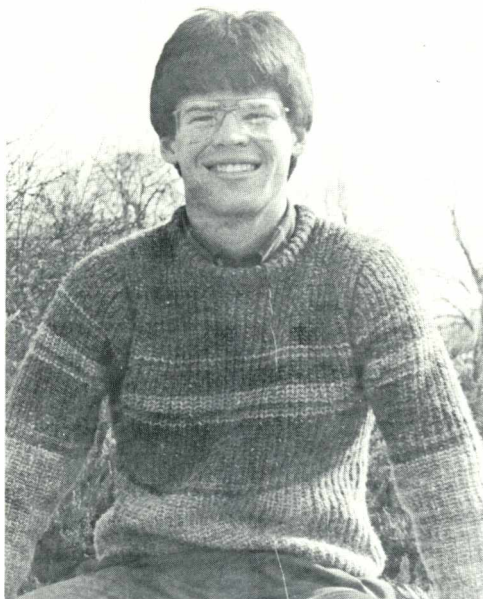
BRYAN KING:

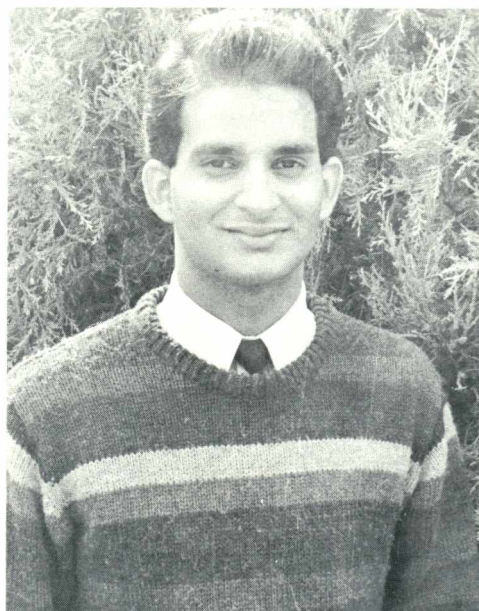
STEVE HALLEY:

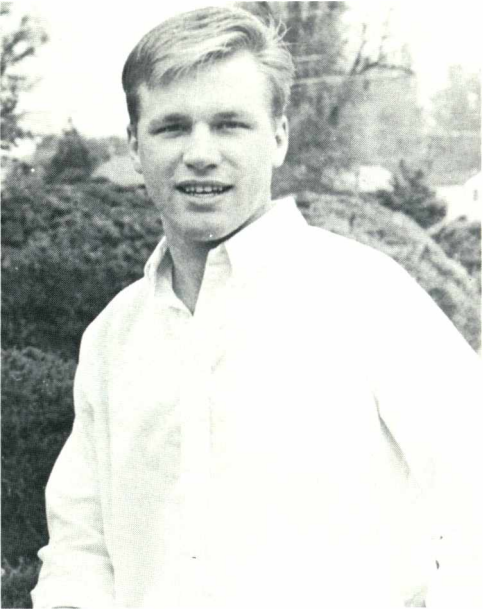
STACY STEPHENS:

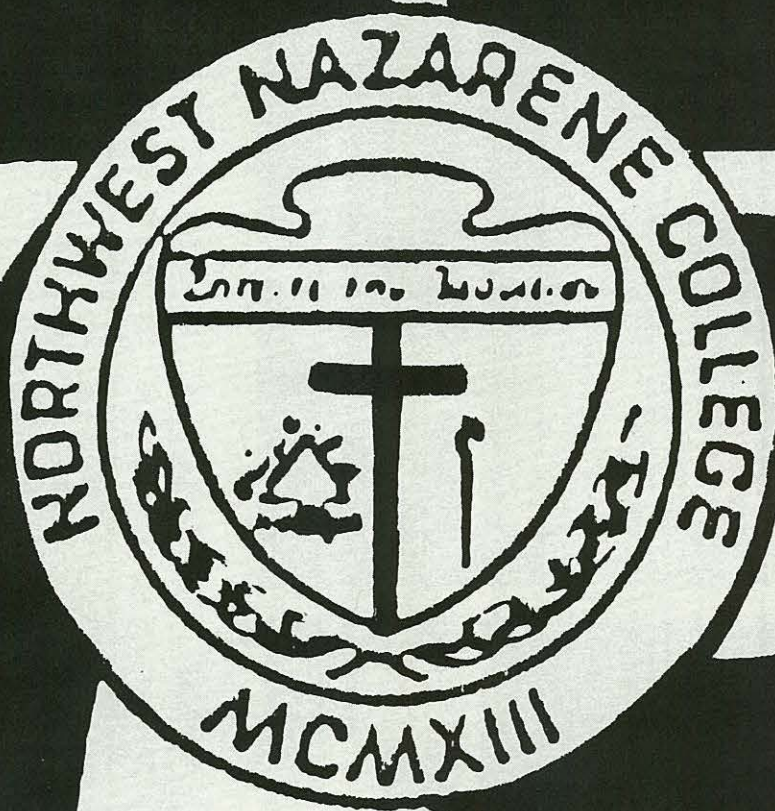

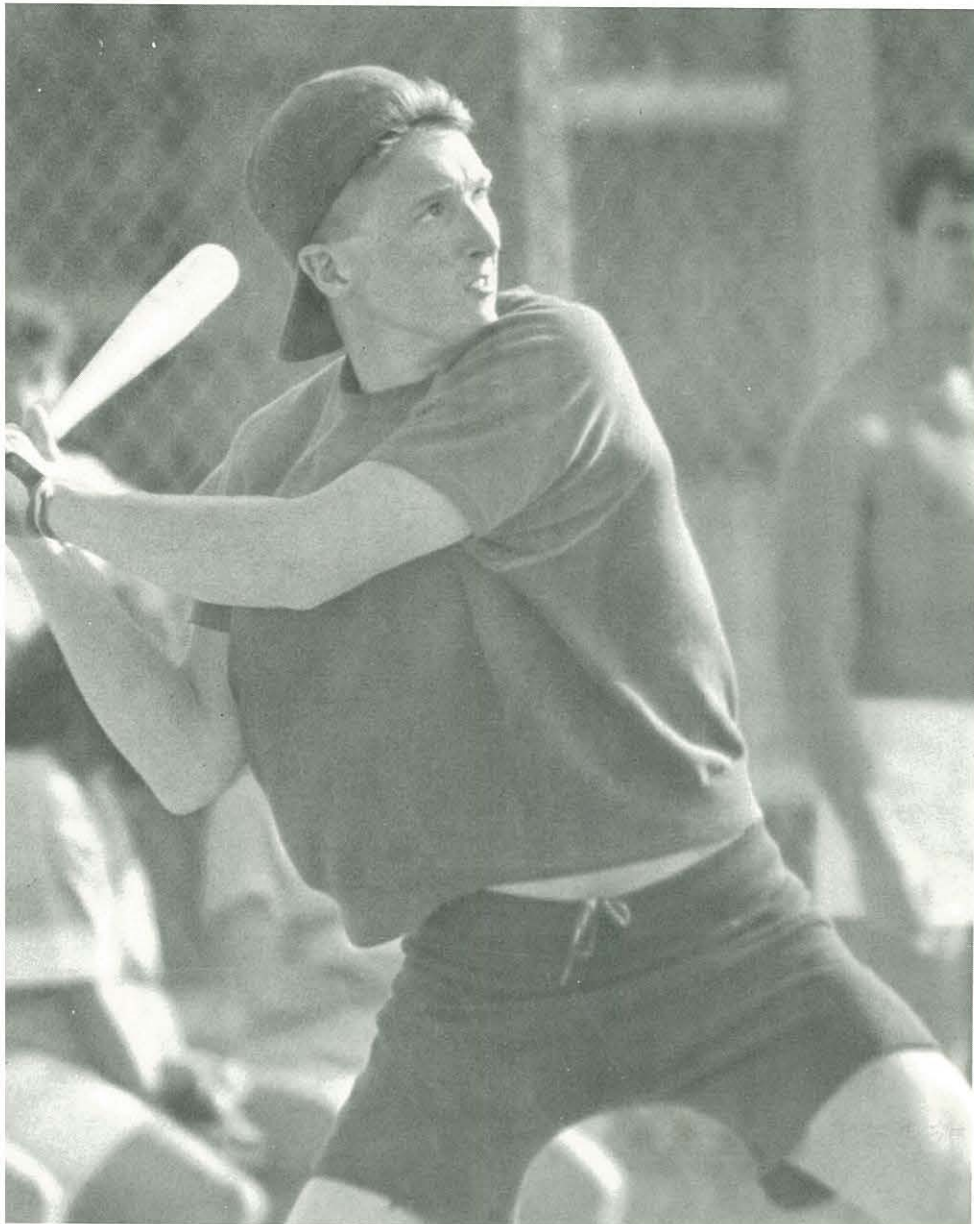




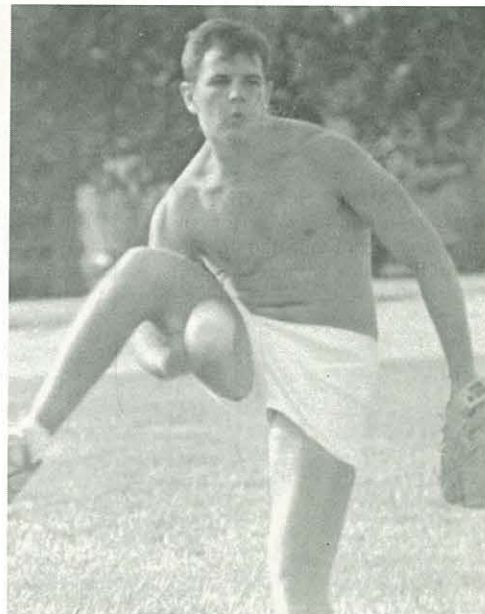
LLAMAS & NUGGETS TAKE IT

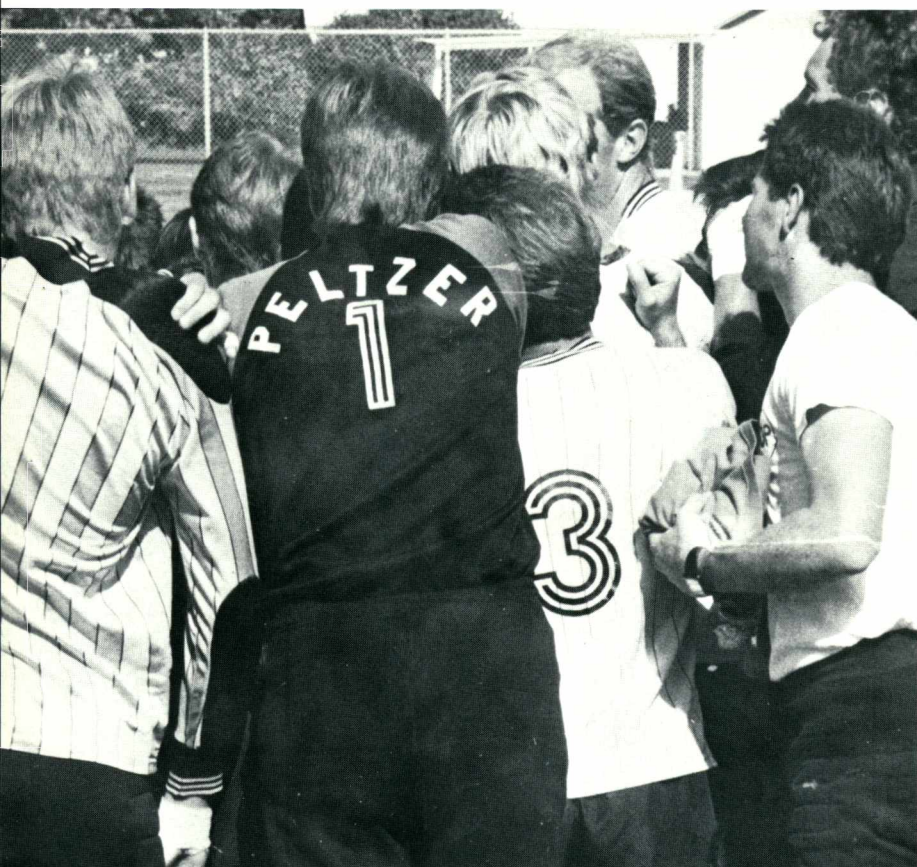
DETERMINATION . . .

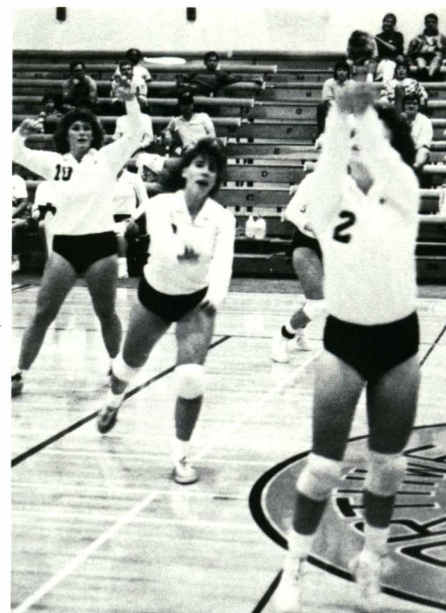
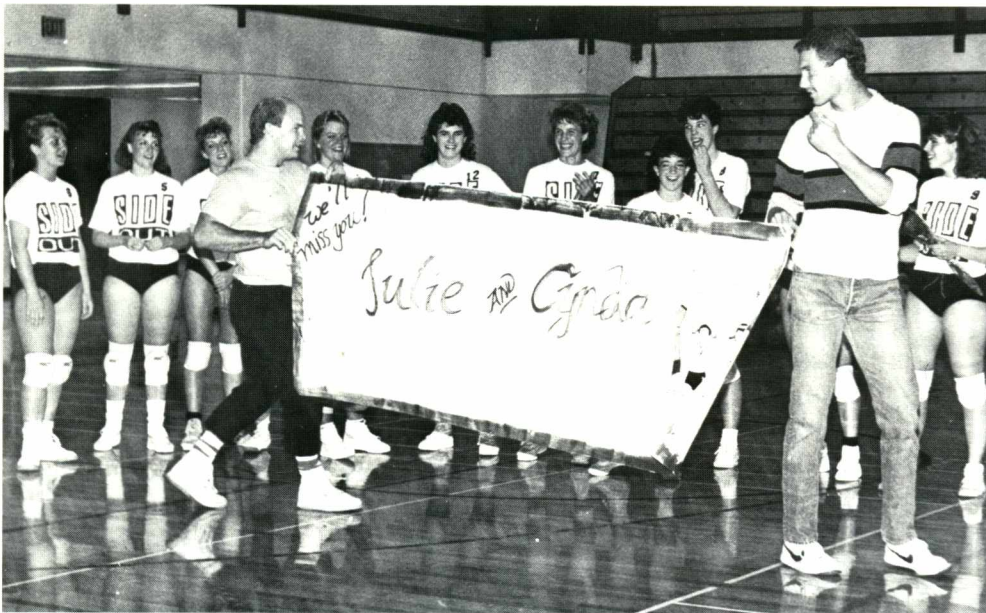
When asked about the team, Coach Mona Lewis said, "I am really excited about the '88 season.

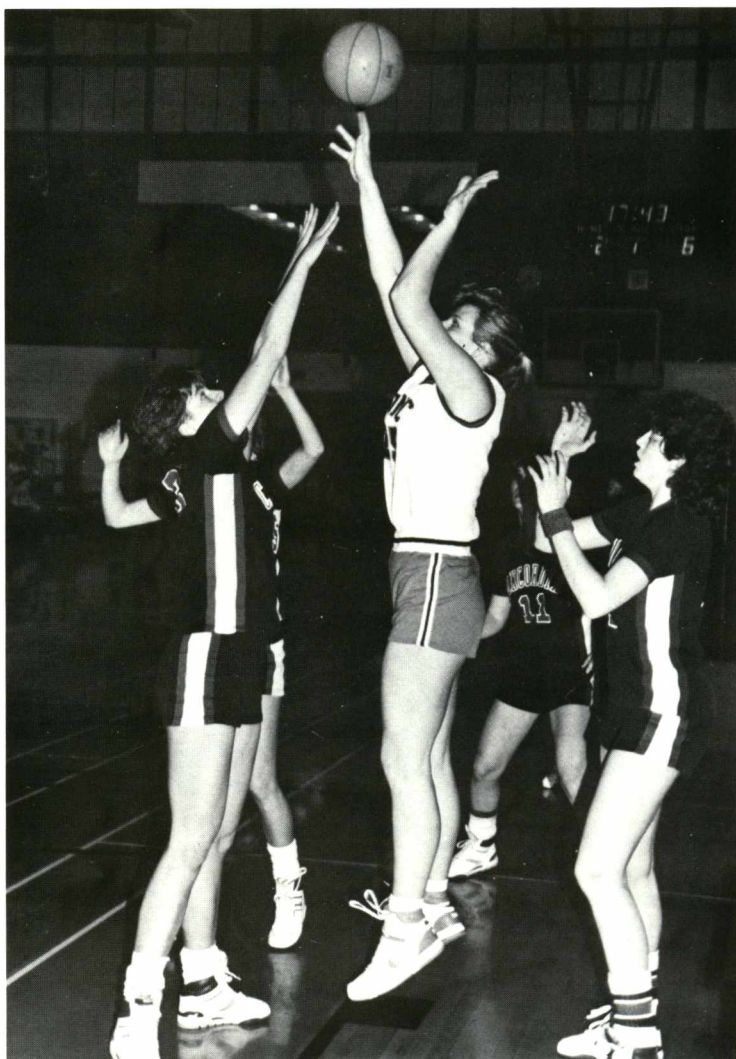

Citing new young talent and a new drive toward increased communication, Coach Matlock regarded 1987-88 as a "season for the record books — one to remember!"

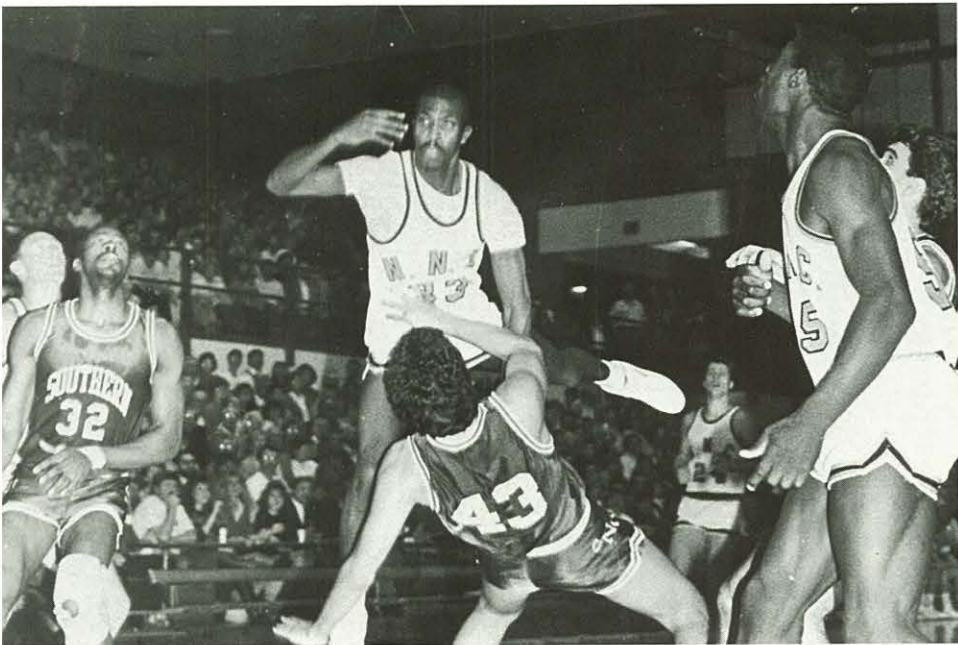
The NNC community owes a lot to the Crusaders. They provided weekly entertainment through the long winter. And they conducted themselves in a manner of which we can all be proud.



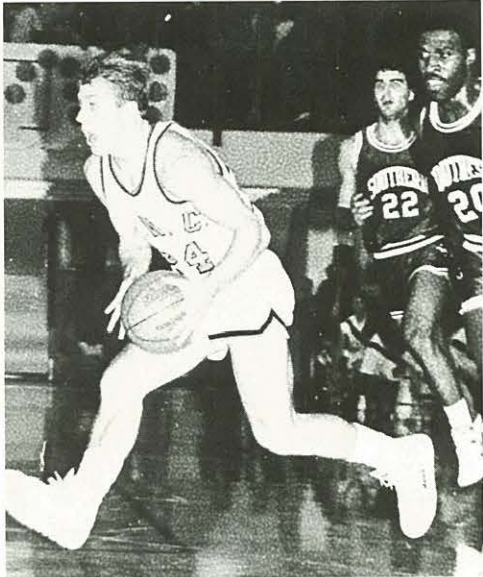

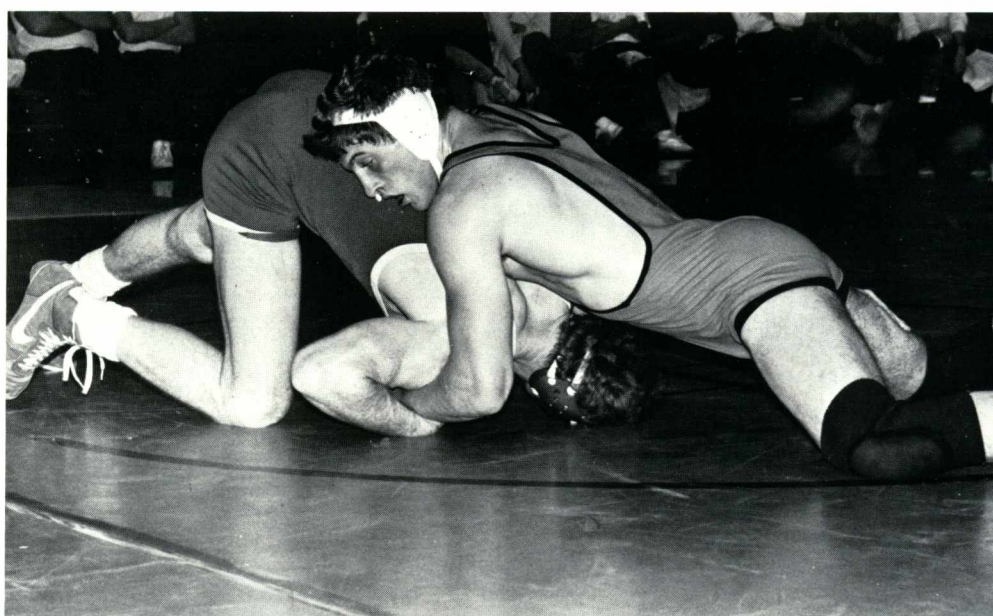

This year two people broke NNC Track and Field records. Chelly Tilzey broke the old record in the 10K and Michelle Skyles broke the 800 record.

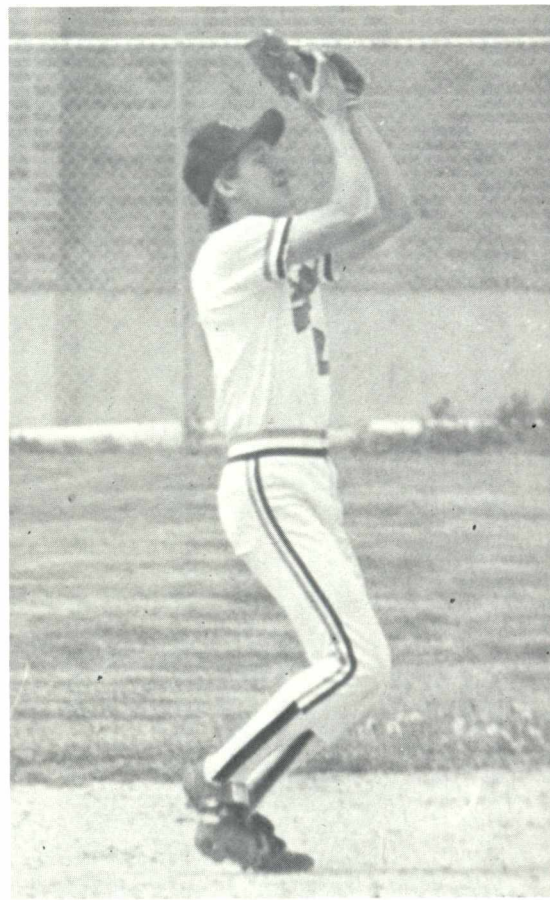
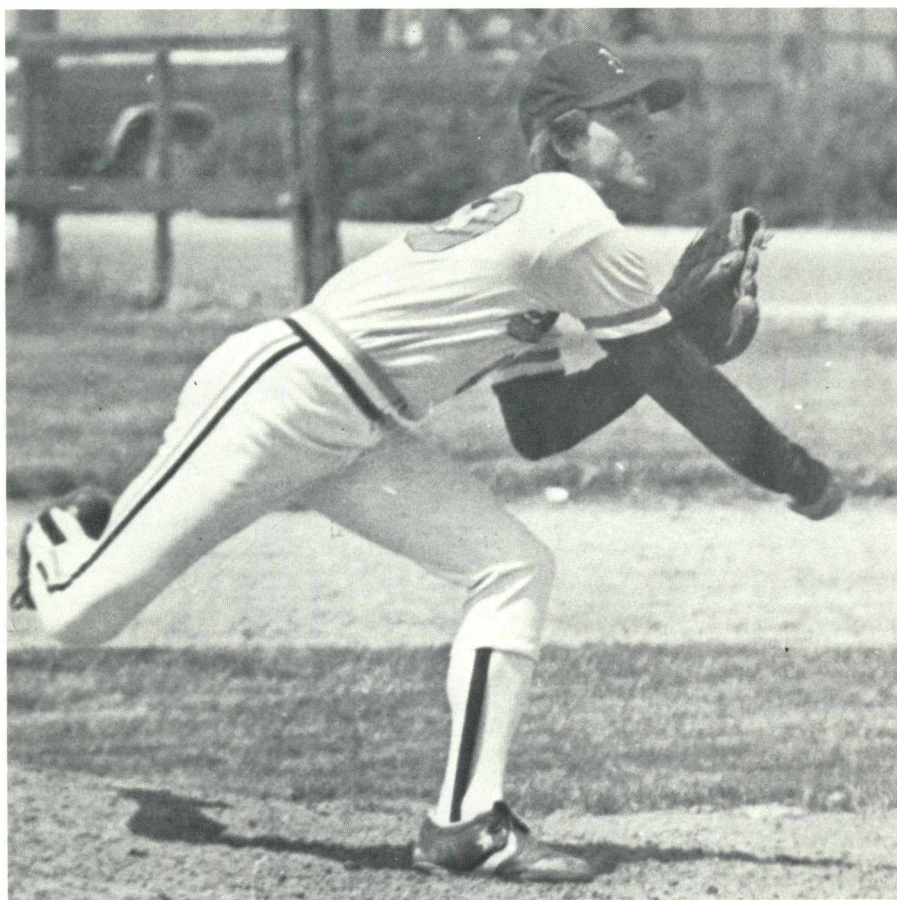
At the Spring Banquet, the awards were given in the area of Captain, Most Valuable Player (MVP), Inspirational, and Most Improved, for both men and women.

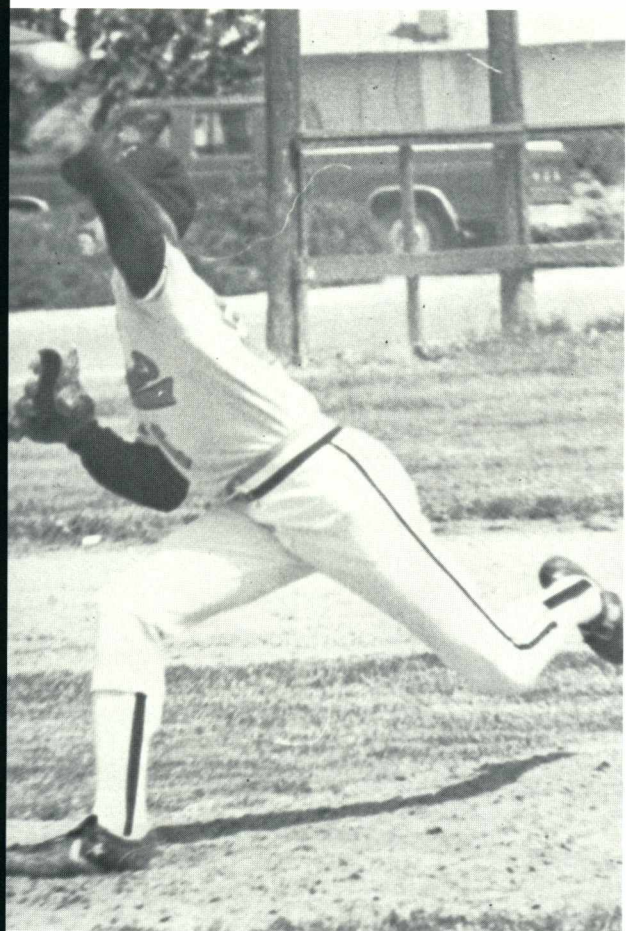

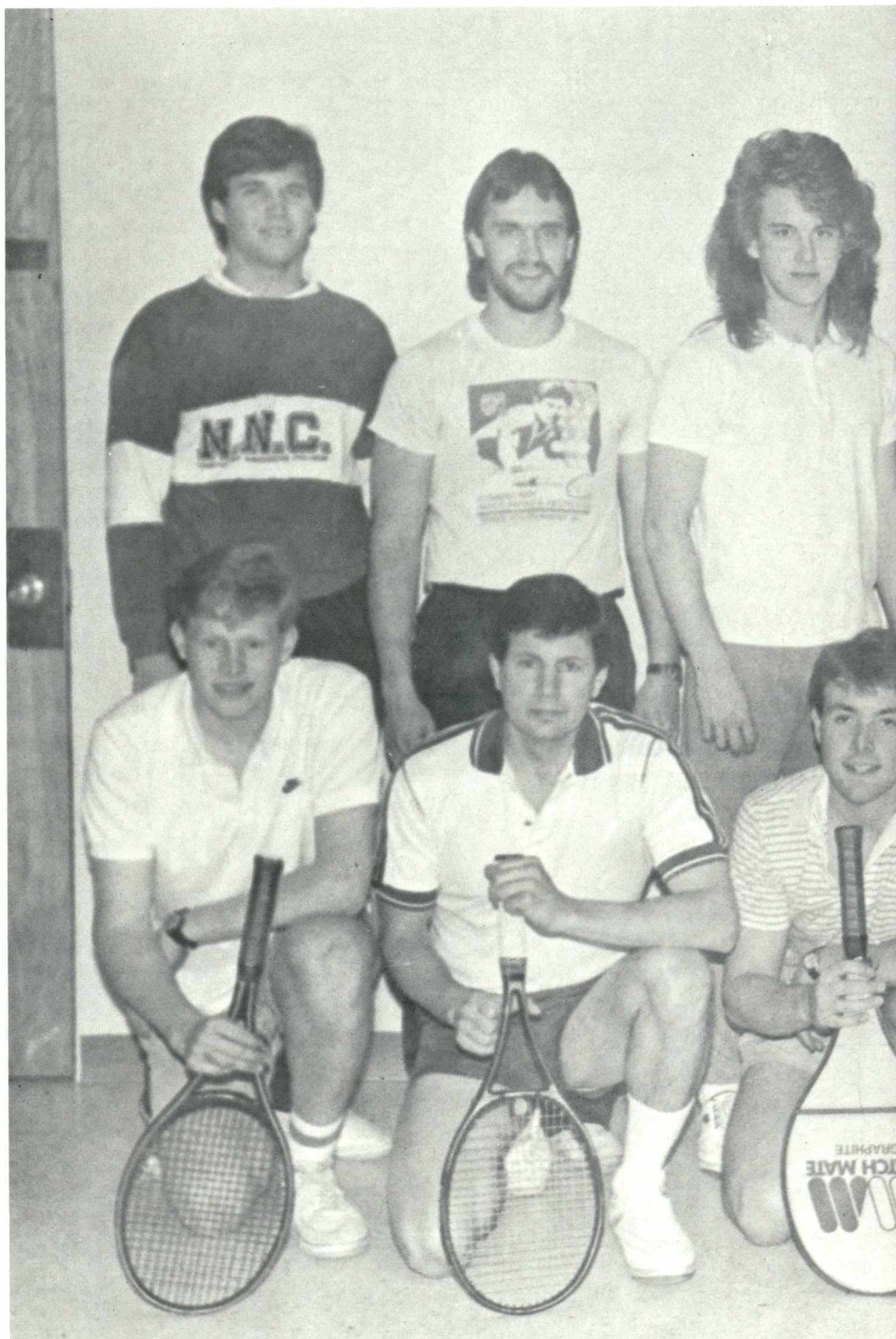

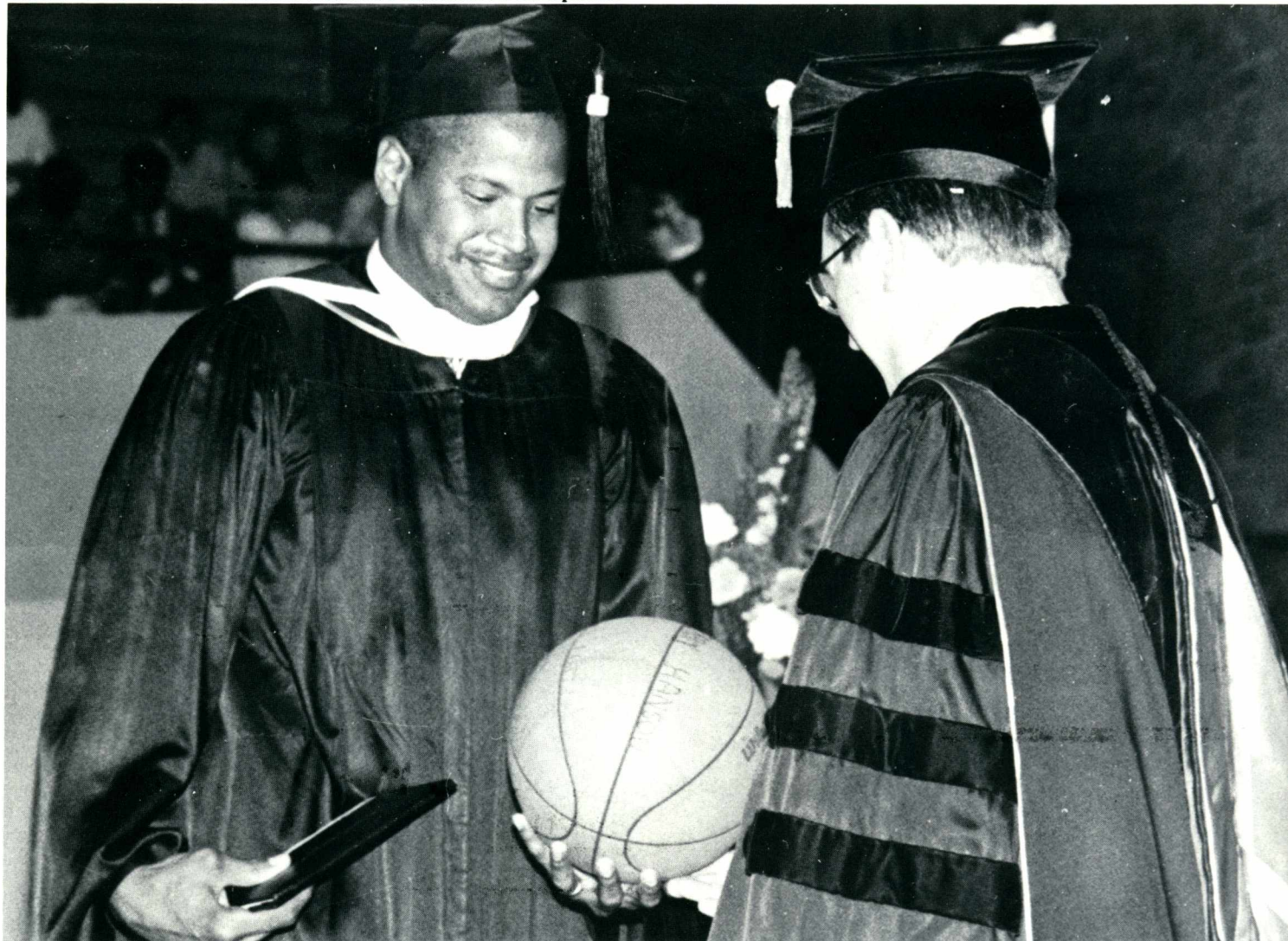
GRADUATION

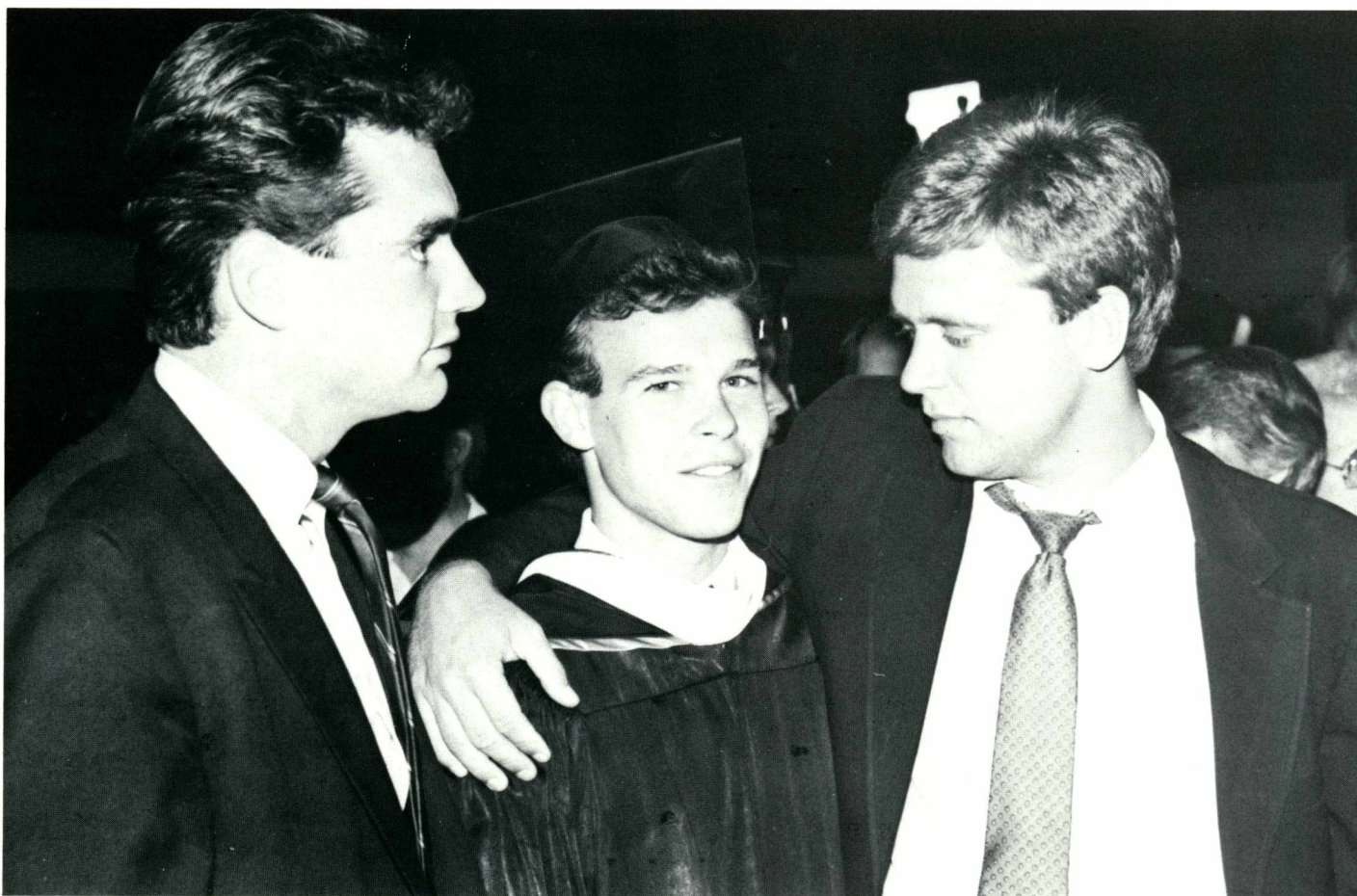

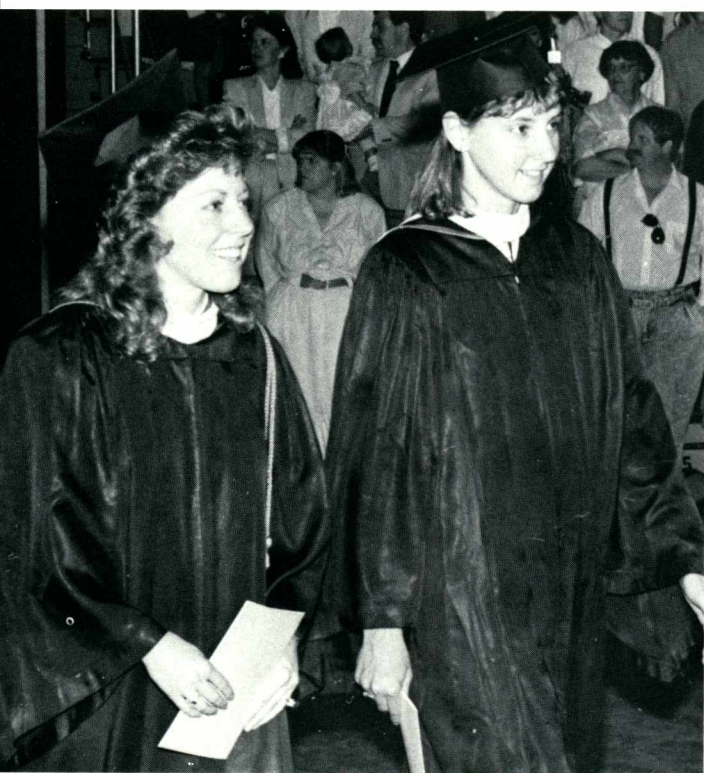
