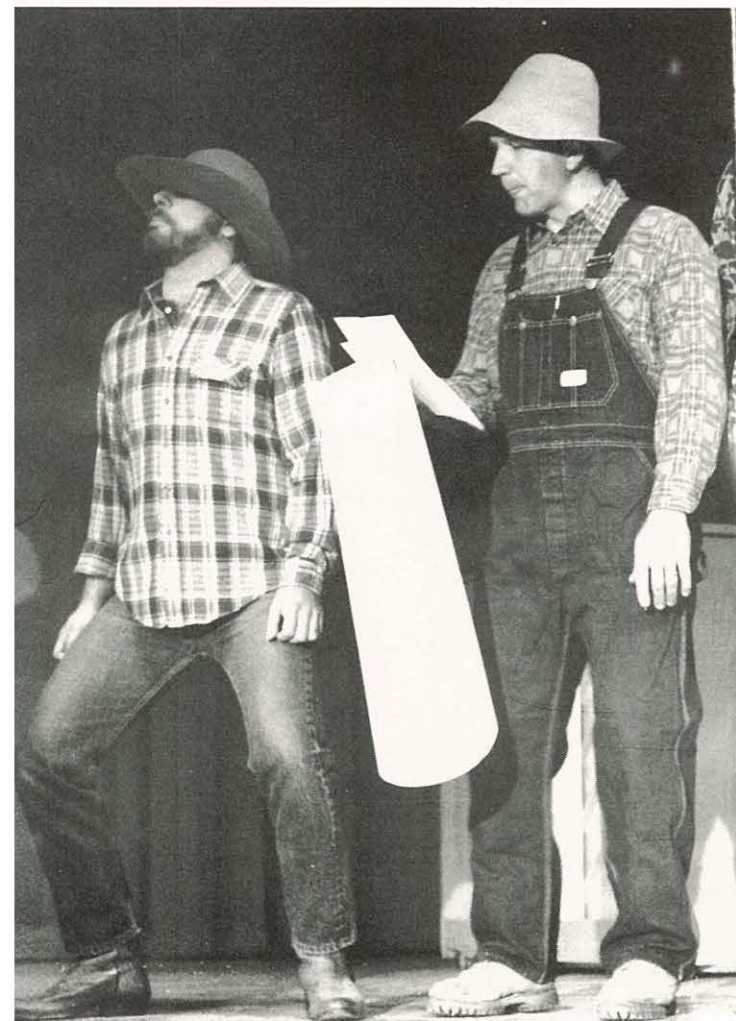

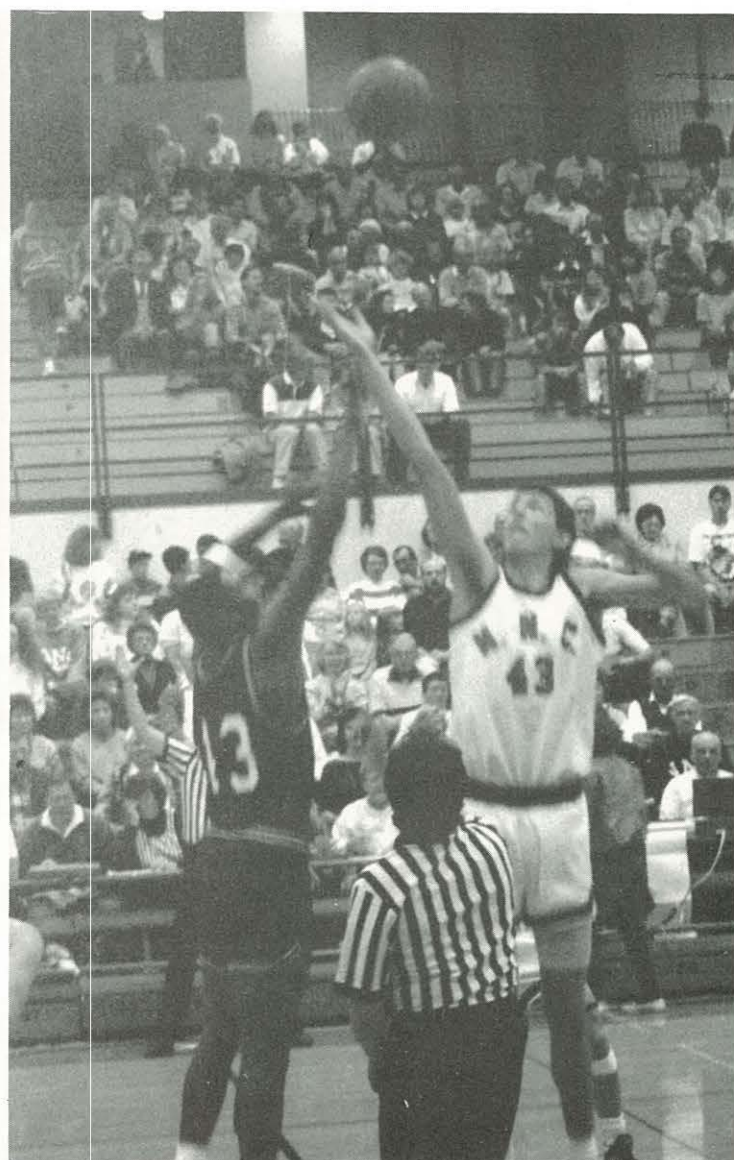

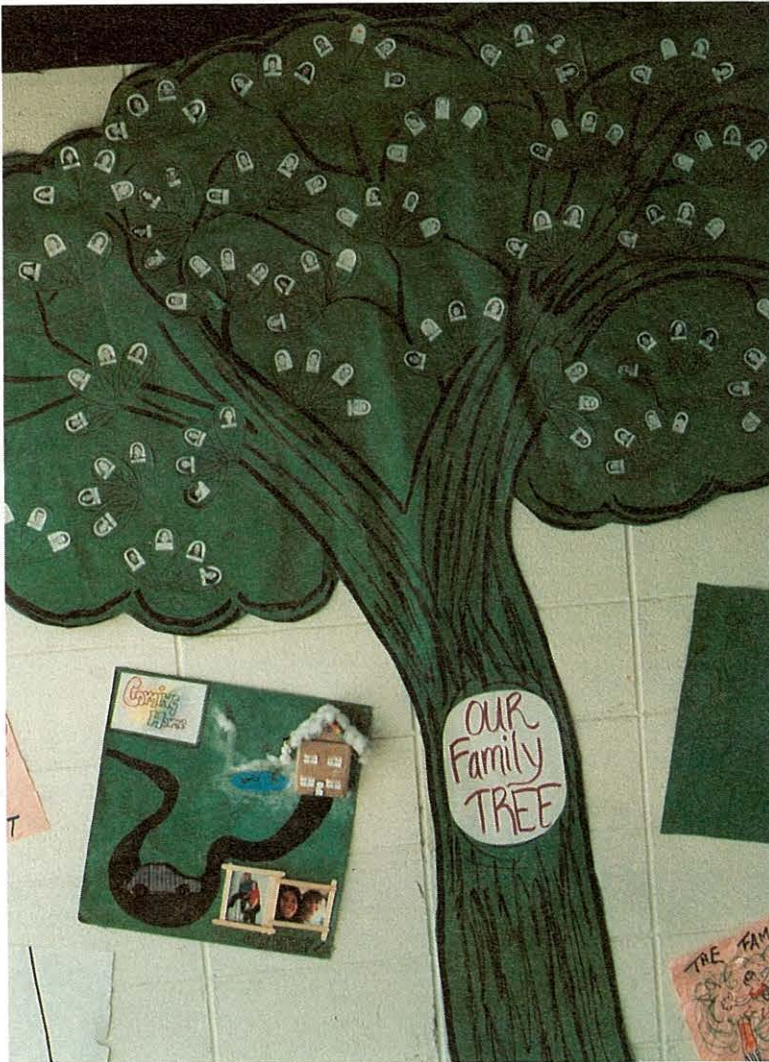

## NNC's response to the Gulf War

As Desert Shield became Desert Storm and the threat of war turned into reality, emotions, fears, and support heightened. Northwest Nazarene College was not immune to this effect and reactions and opinions varied. Yet, one truth stood clear above all else; each of us was united by a common bond - Jesus Christ. While we did not always agree on every issue, we realized we had to put our trust and faith in God.

This war brought the campus, its faculty, administrators, and students closer as they bonded together under a common concern. A large poster reading

hour prayer vigil, while a window in Culver profoundly stated, "MAN'S PEACE IS TEMPORAL, GOD'S PEACE IS ETERNAL". In a special War-time Edition of the Crusader, the names of friends and family of students were published to demonstrate the extent to which the campus was affected by the war. Chapel, however, was the most unifying scene and we were reminded daily that we must continue to pray. Religious Life Director Fred Fullerton initiated the lighting of a white remembrance candle in chapel. Different students, faculty, and administrators who had friends and relatives in the Gulf lit the candle at the start of every chapel. Among these was Jay Turnbow, an NNC student in the inactive reserves, who was called up for deployment to Saudi.

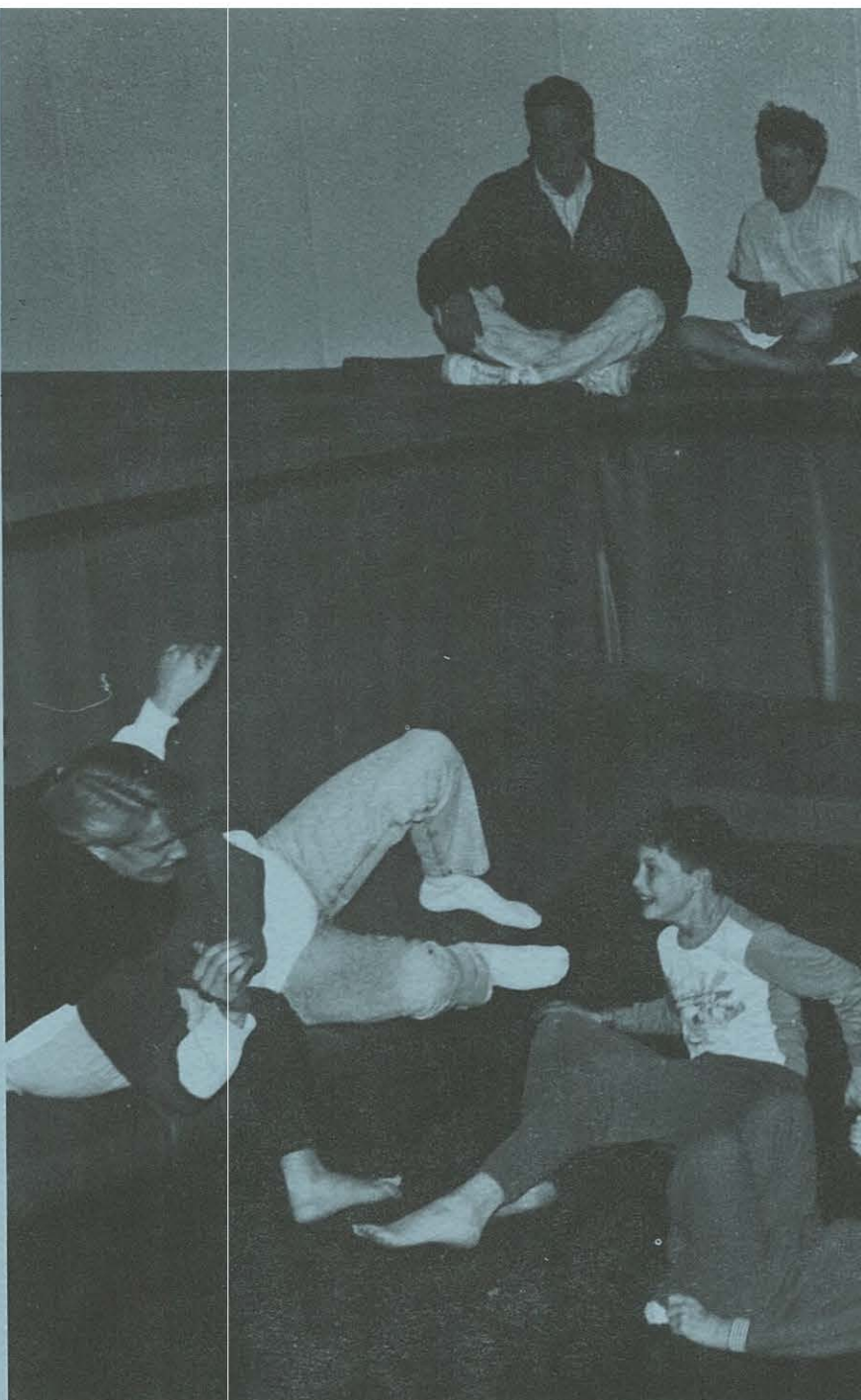
Six NNC students start-

They learn so many things—how to be more independent, responsible, stressed-out college students. Some girls are feeling freedom for the first time. They are away from a home that maybe was strict, some are scared, and some are thrilled to death.

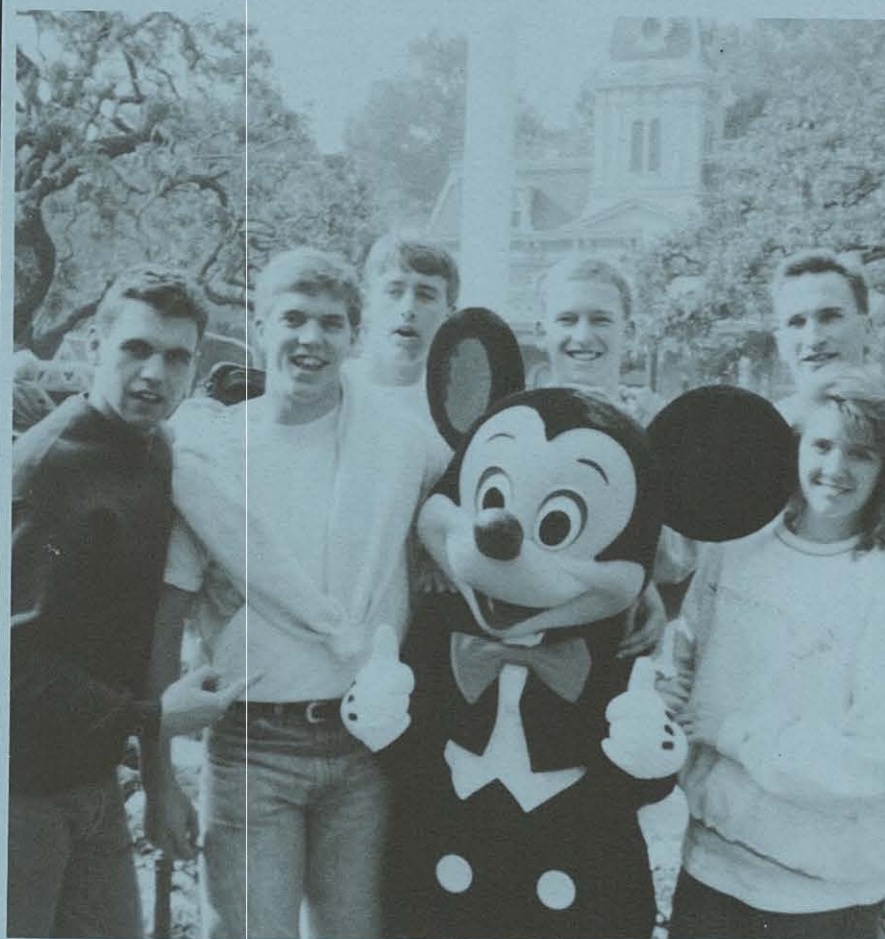

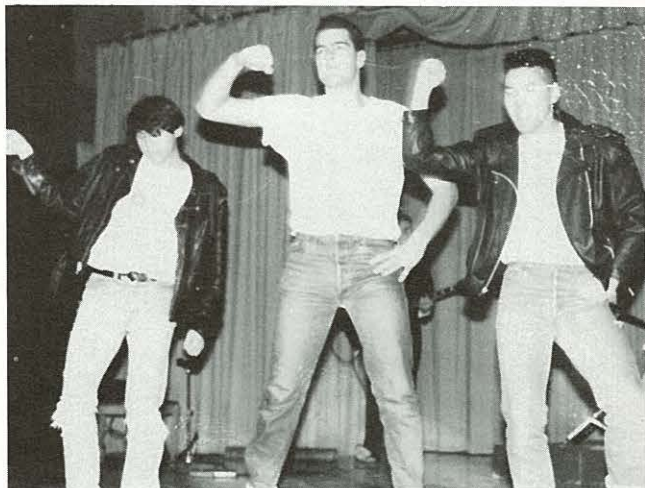
place prize.

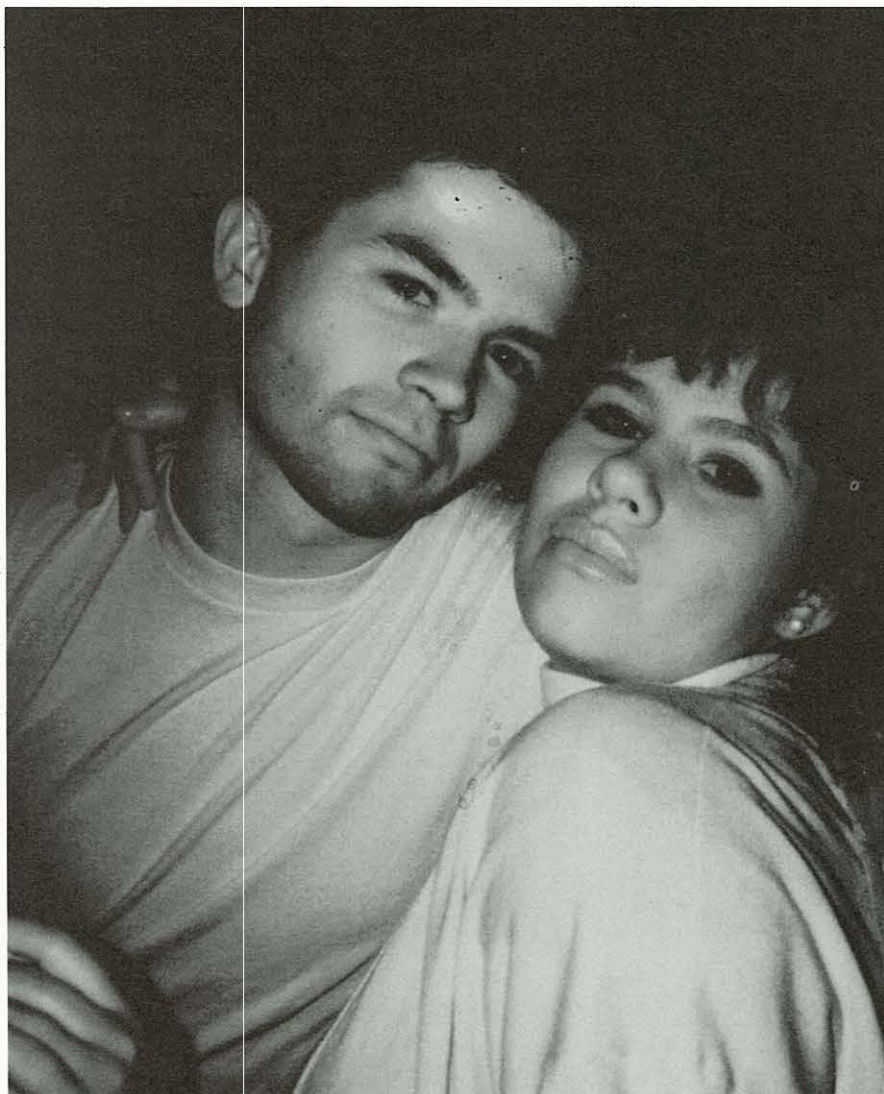

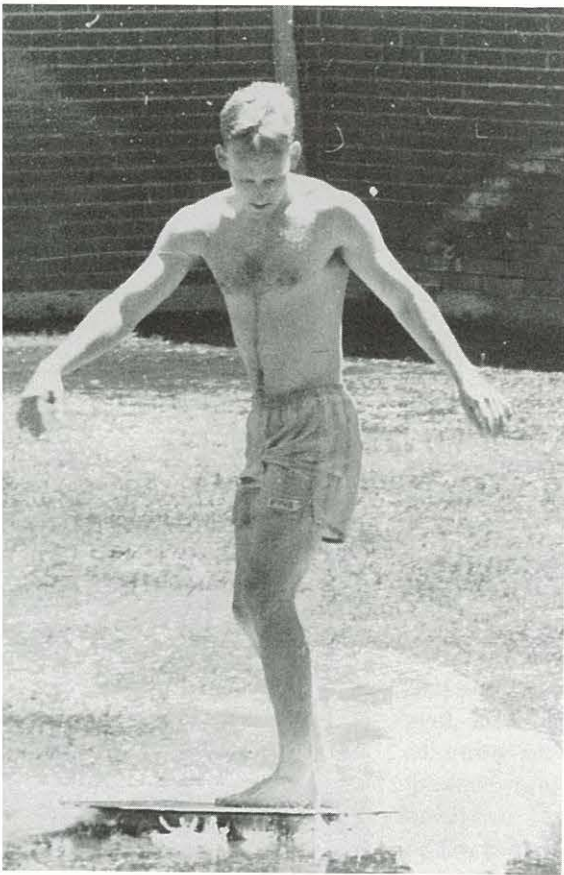

Saturday morning introduced the Frisbee Golf competition that included many participants. The competitions was won by Vernon Riehle.

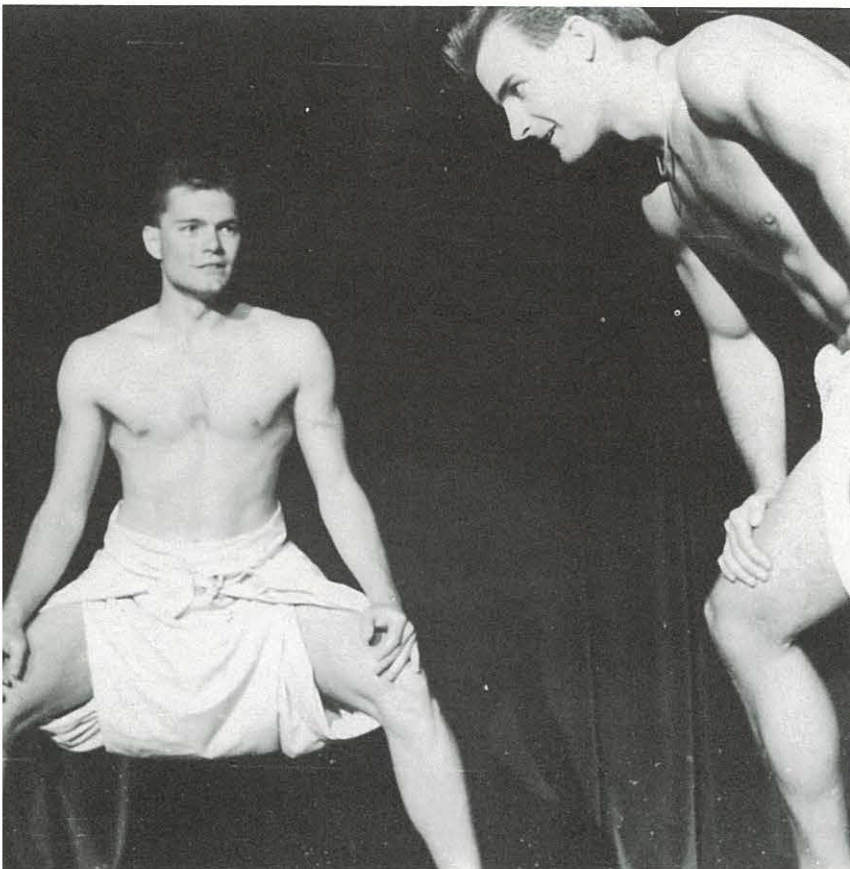
The skim boarding action began with a rush of water and adrenalin as a large number of competitors arrived to display their great water skills. There were two categories - freestyle and dis-

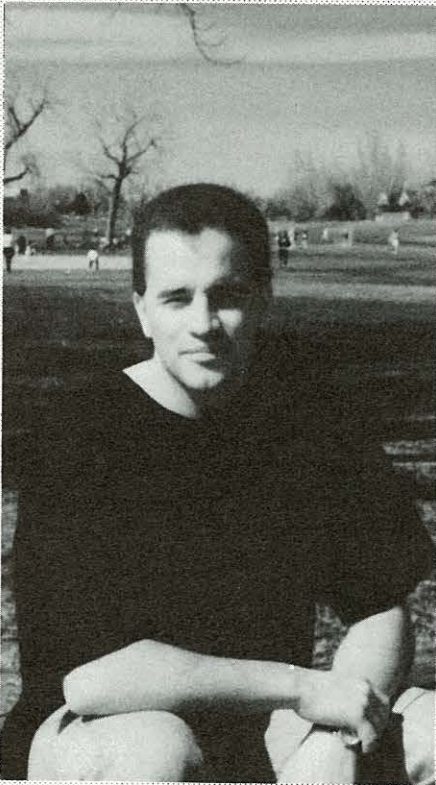

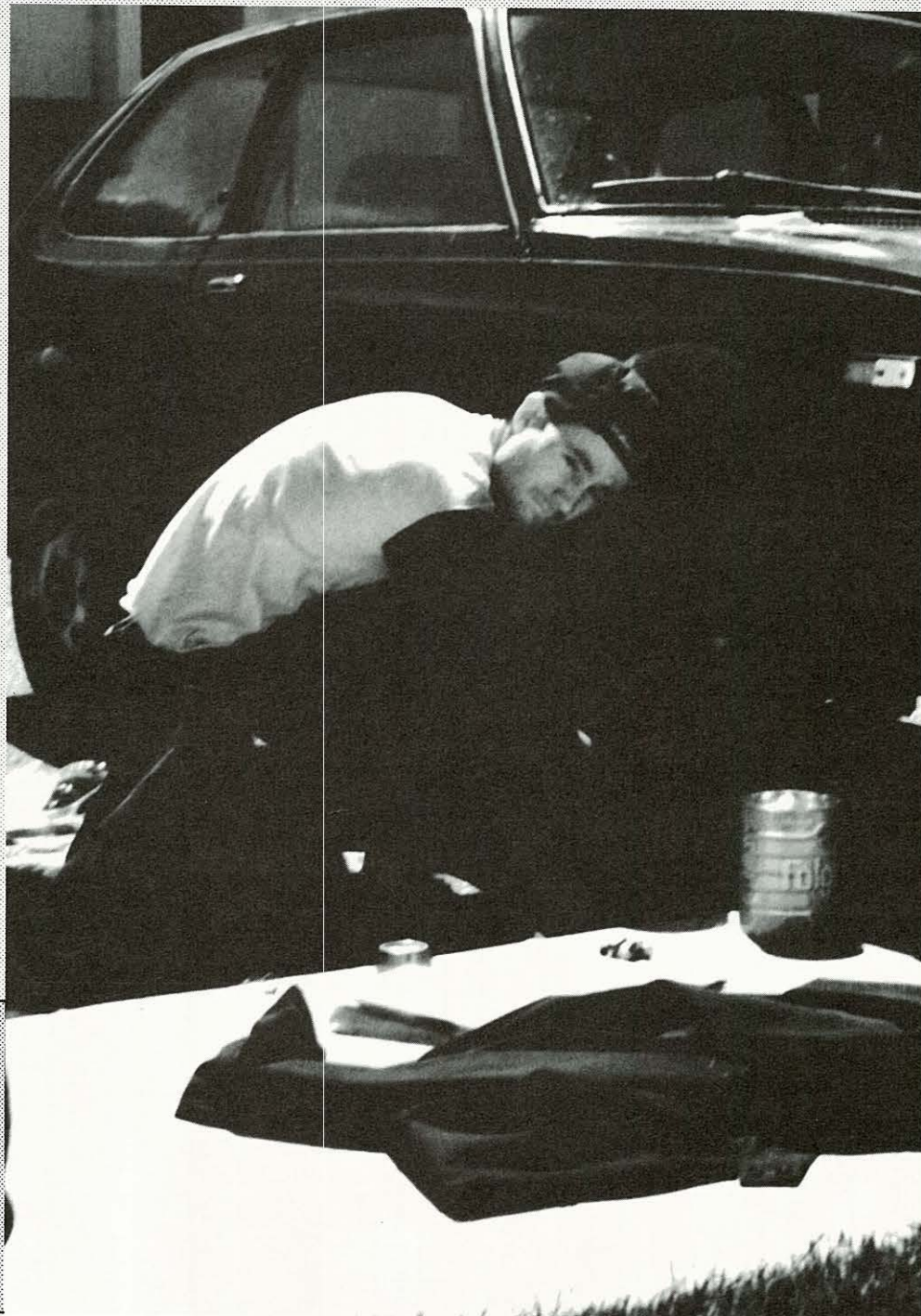

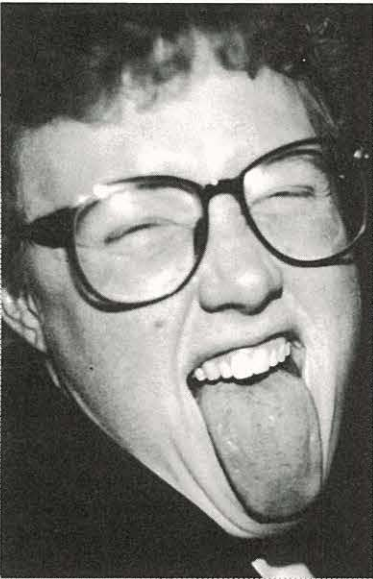

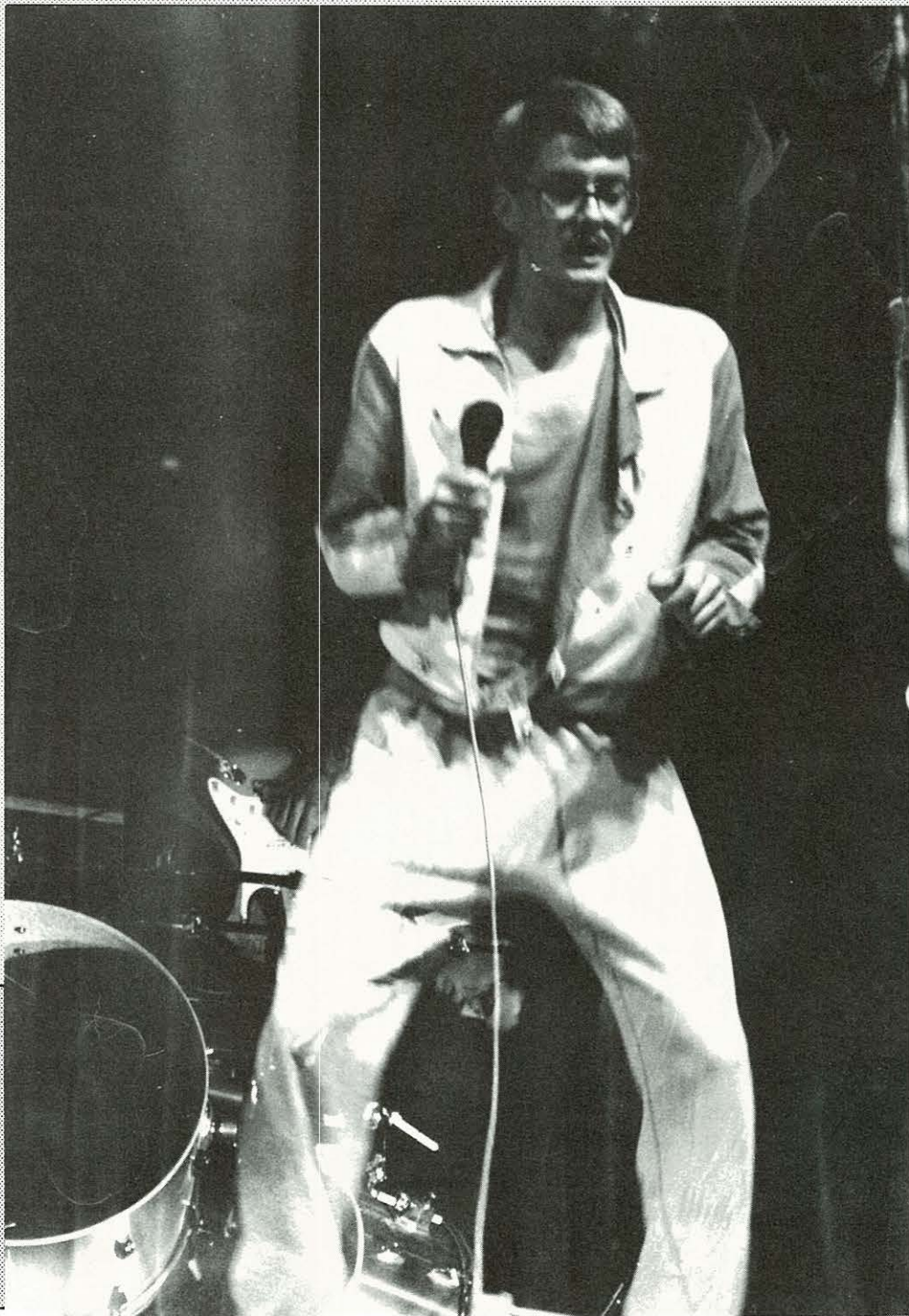

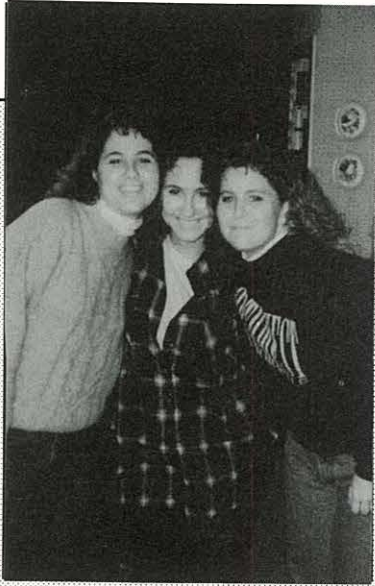

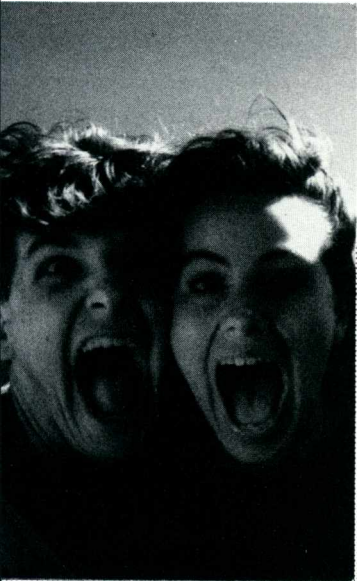

Urban Ministries Club provided a variety of activities for students of NNC to get involved in the urban setting.

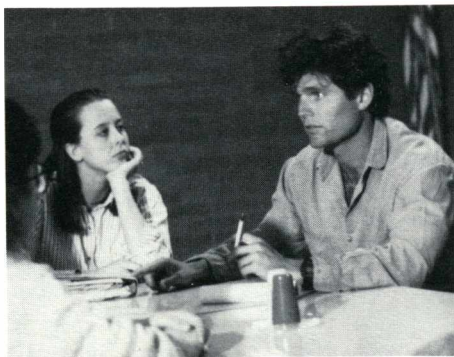

## Ministry to Unwed Mothers

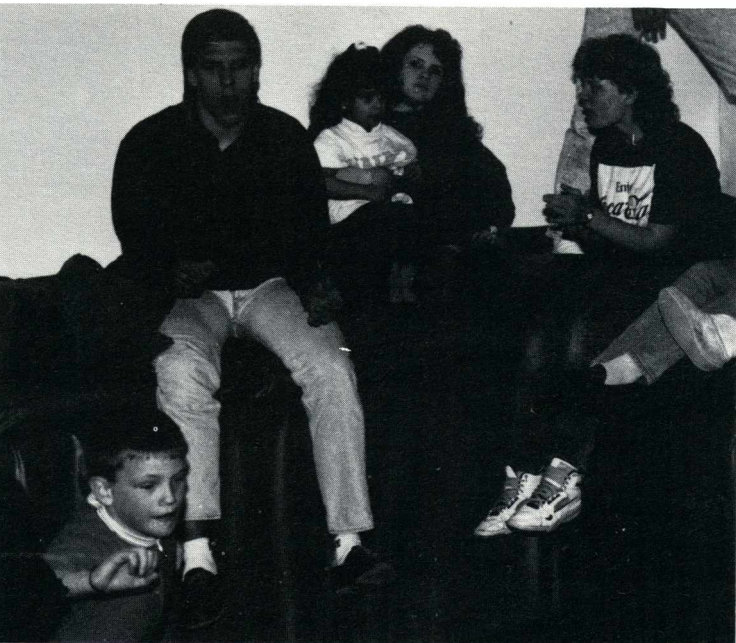

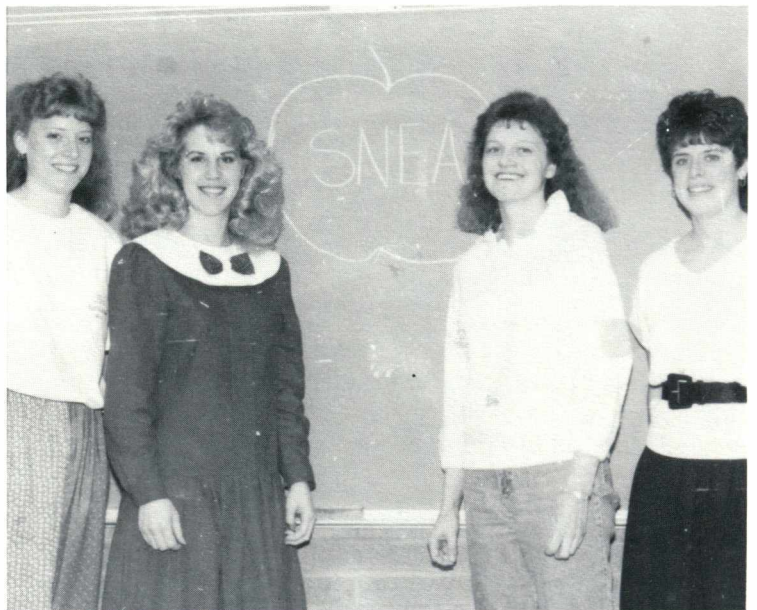
# Student National Education Association

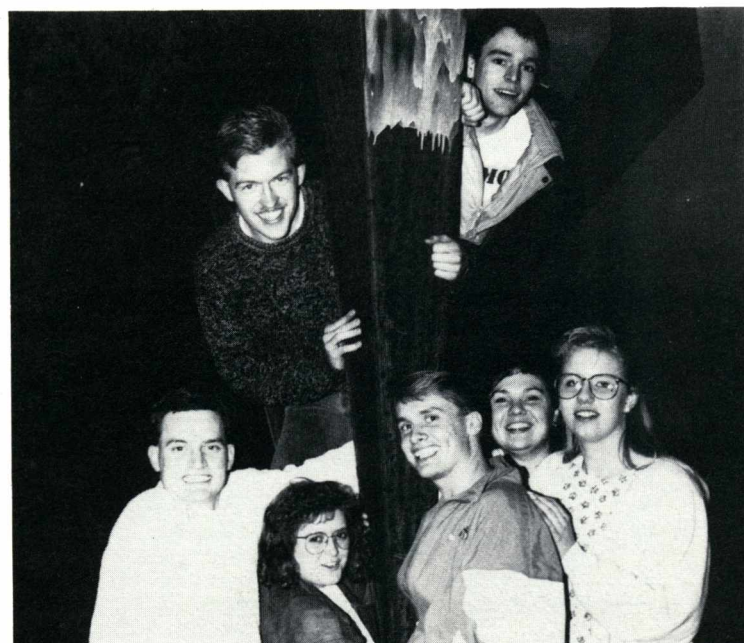

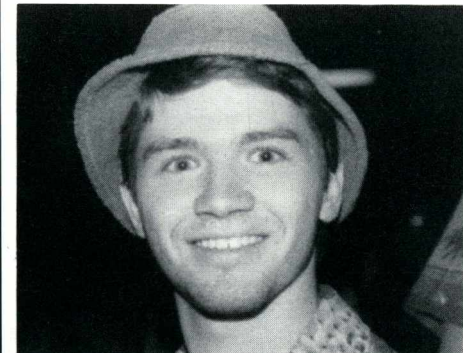

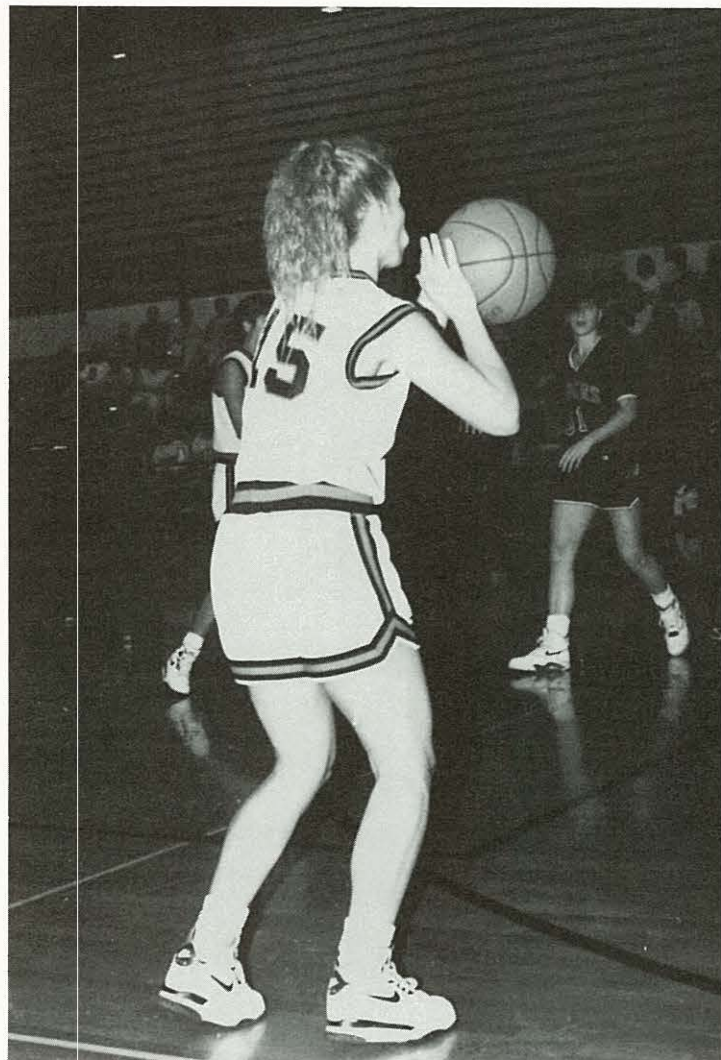
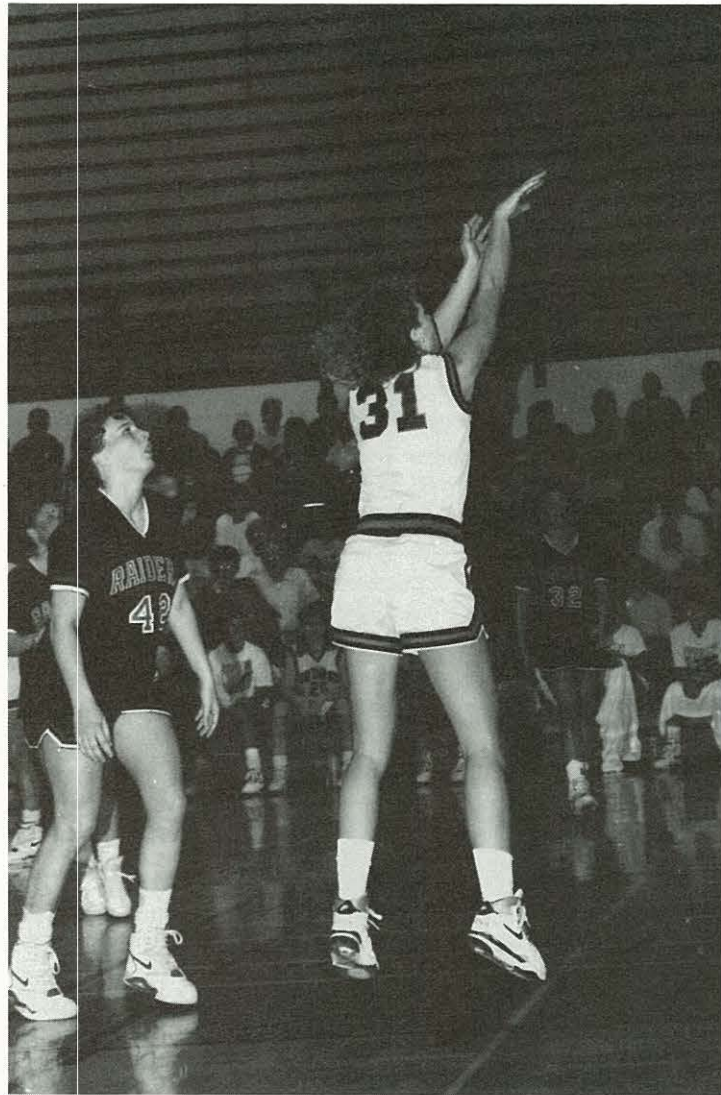
Around homecoming time basketball season started for varsity and for intramurals as well. The varsity basketball men played hard and fast through-

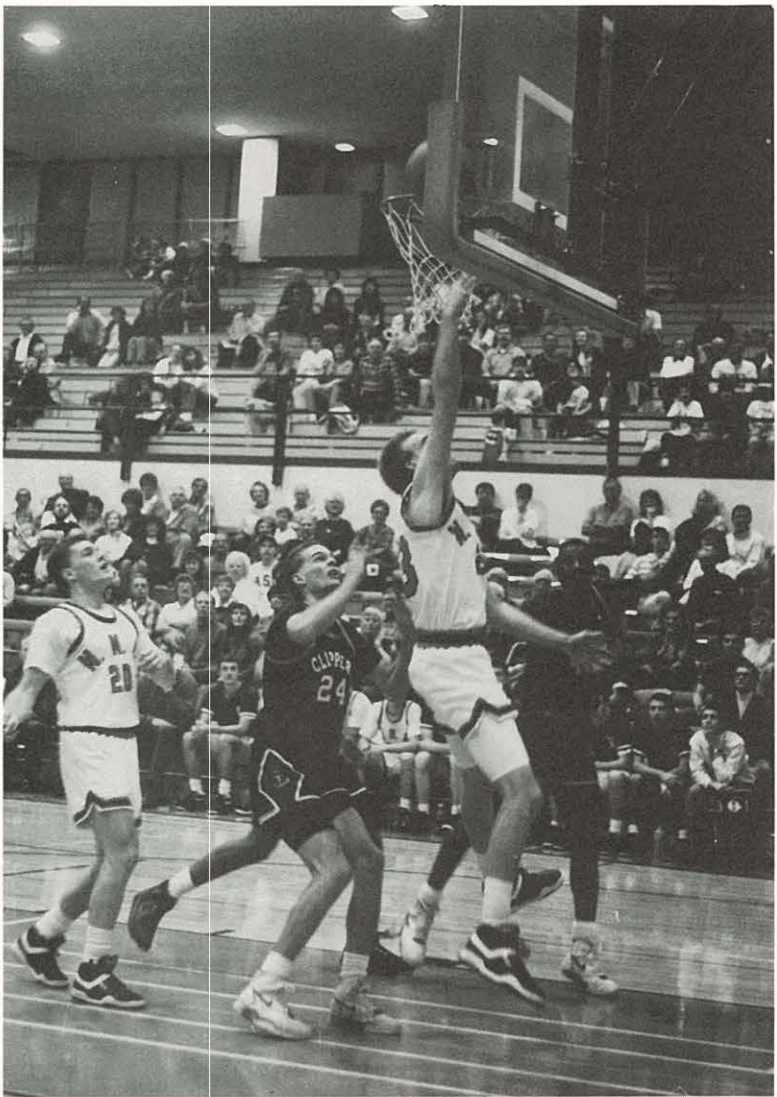

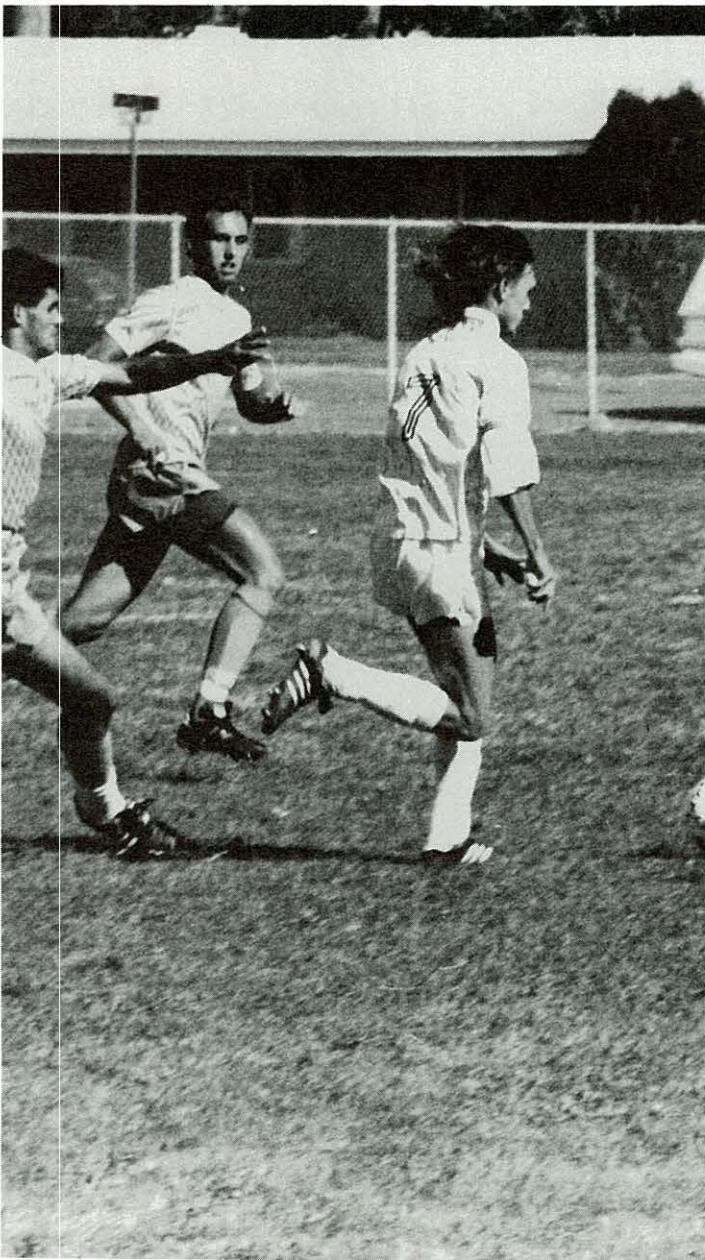

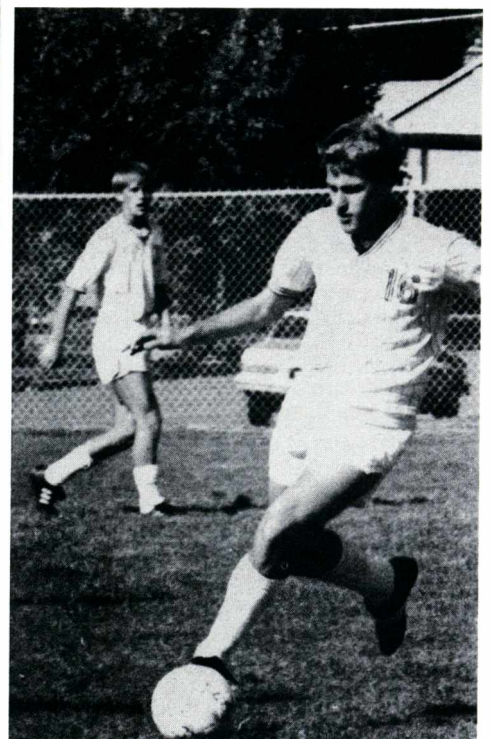
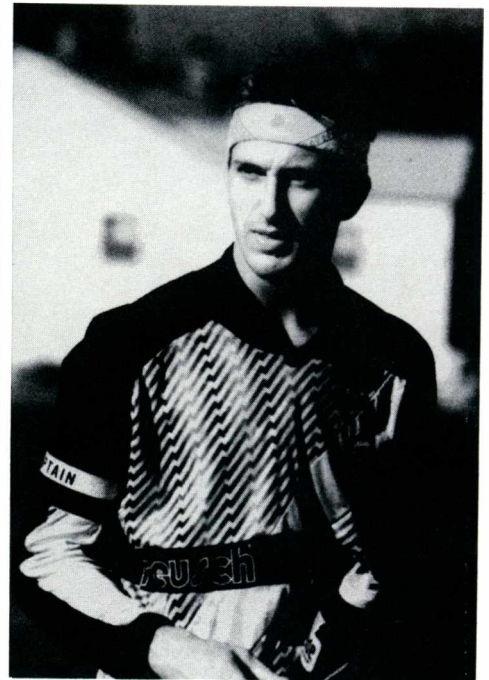




Left: "I got it!" Dennis Howard goes up for the ball.

Below: Dennis tries to collect his thoughts after a rough first half.

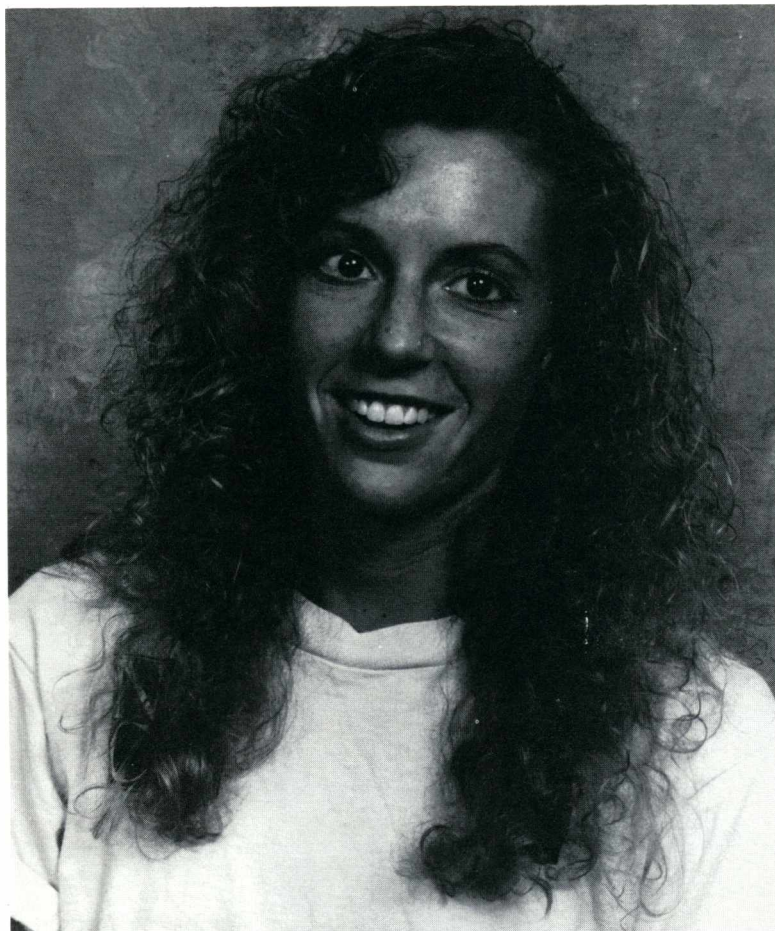

Brenda Naccarato - (being twenty-fifth in the nation for individual assists with a 9.55 per game).

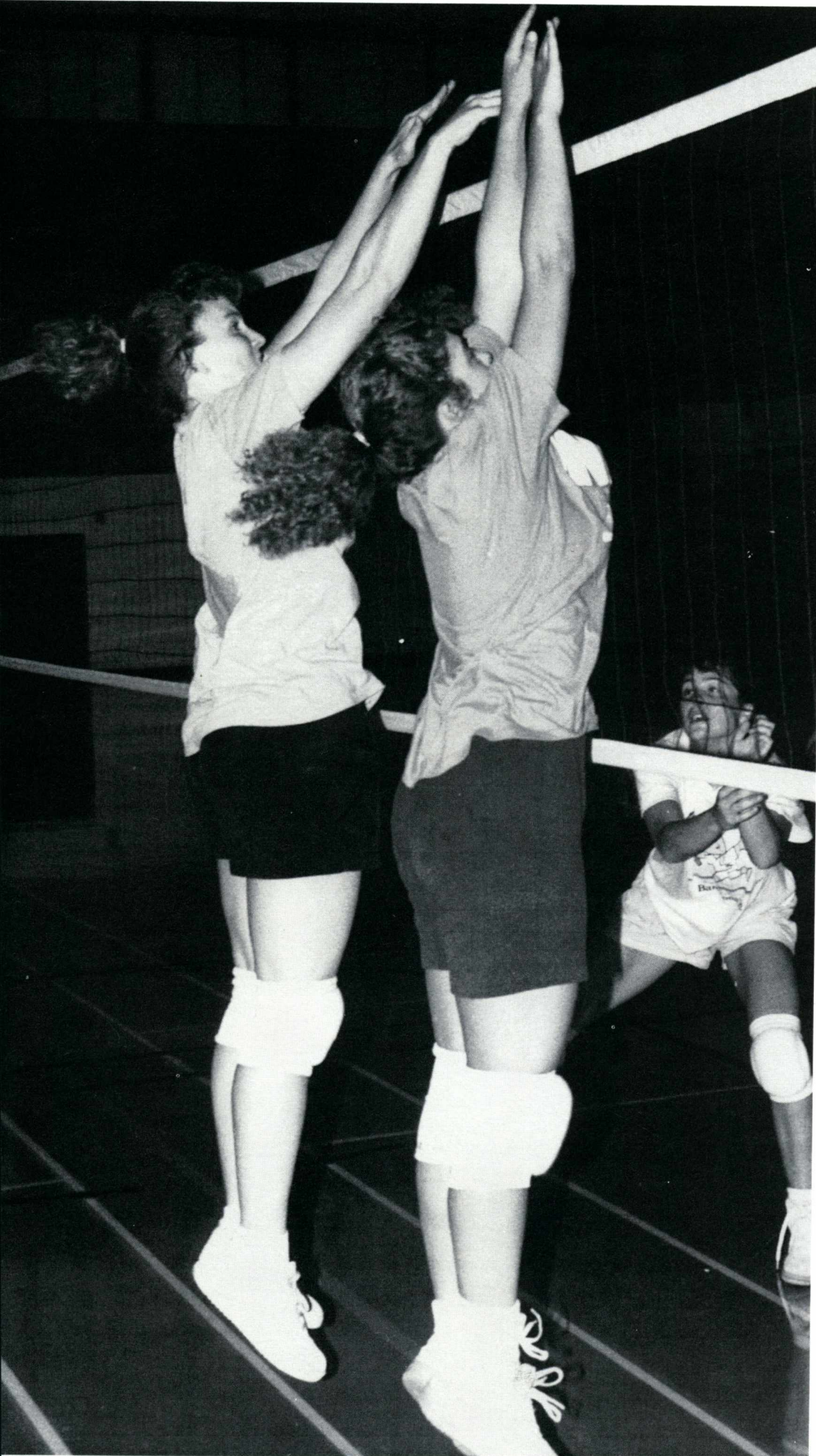

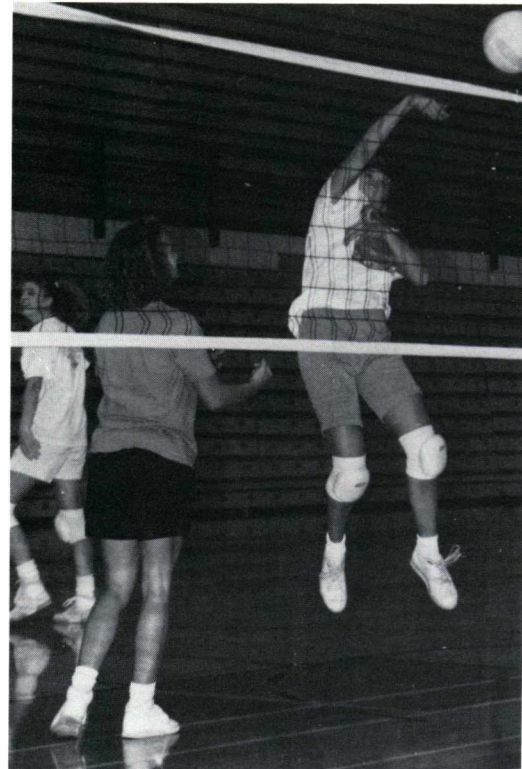

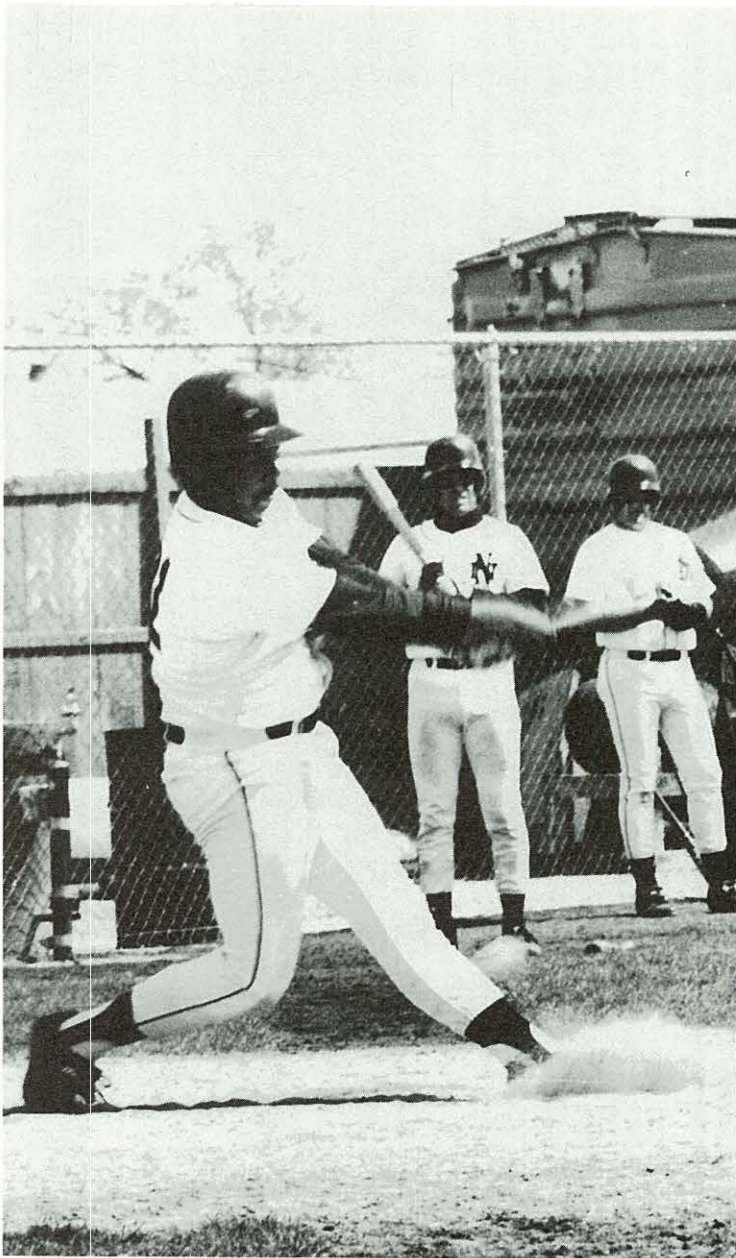
# Baseball

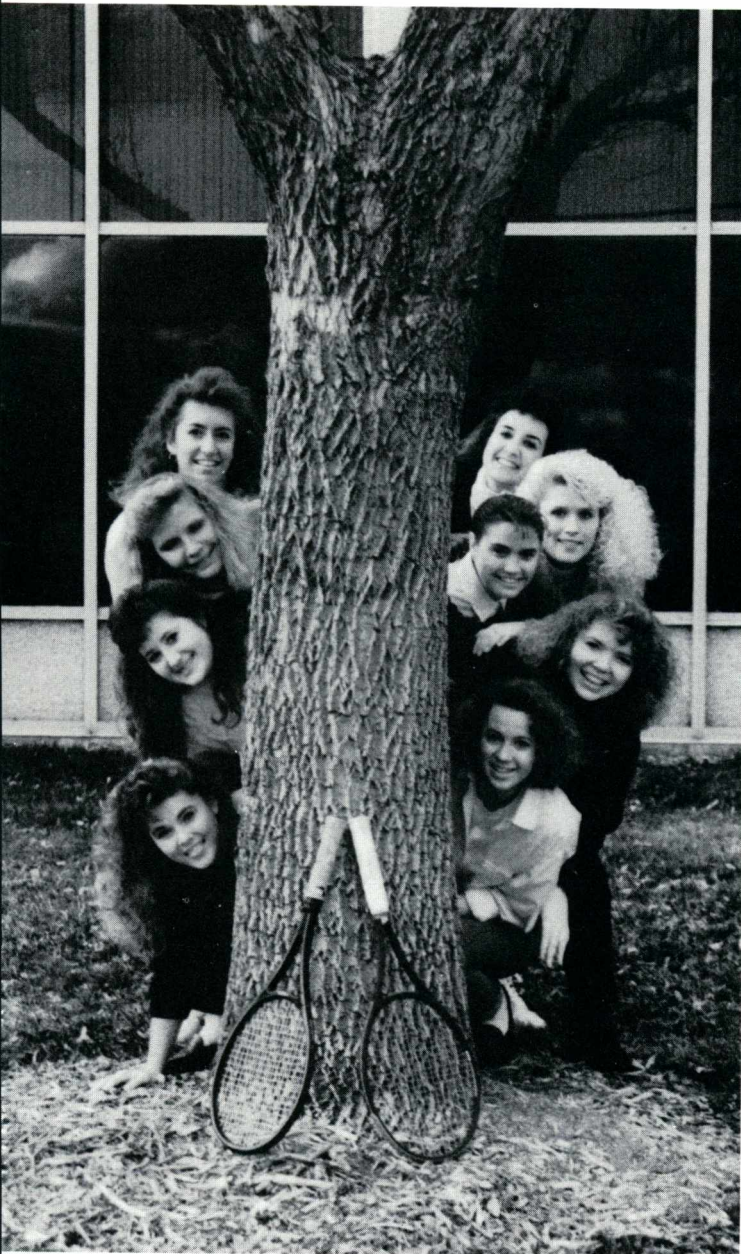
## Tennis

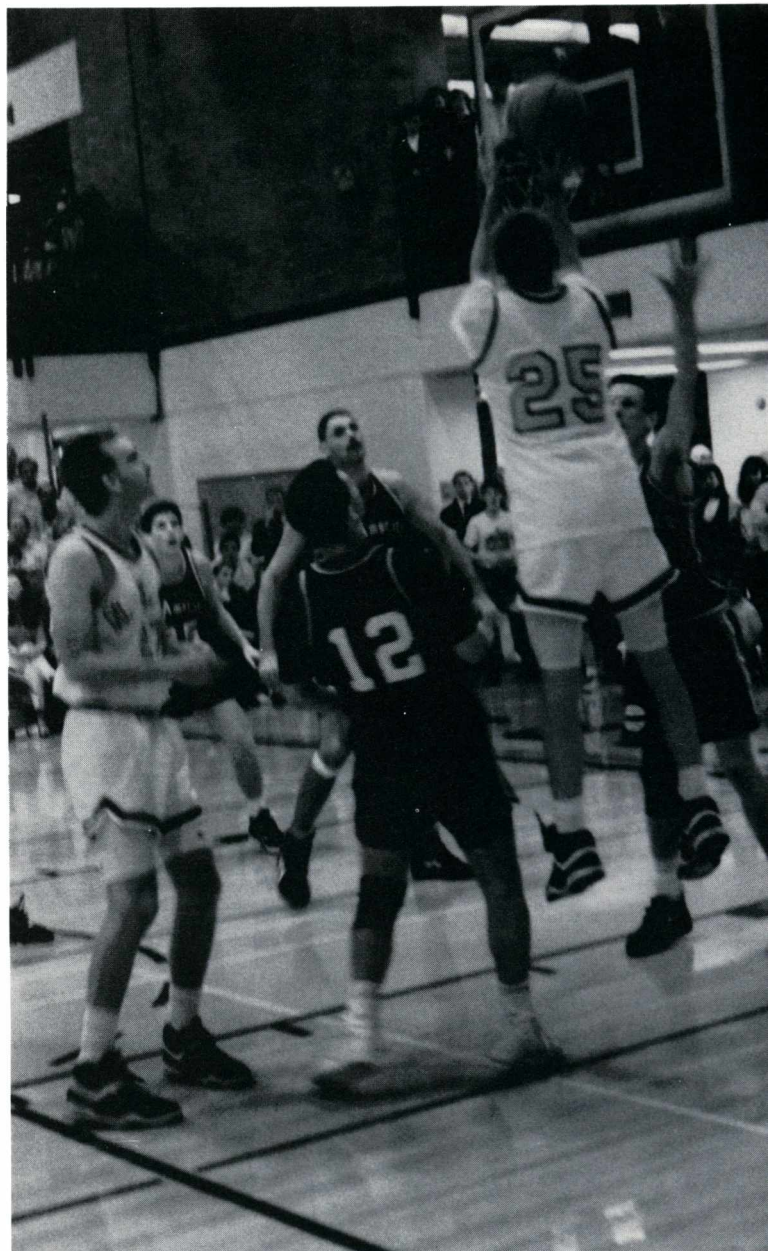

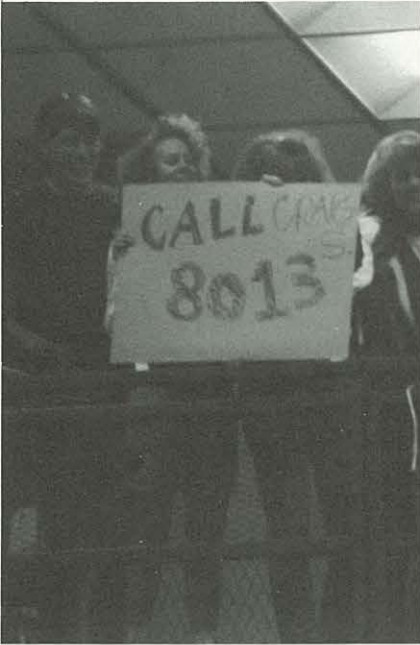

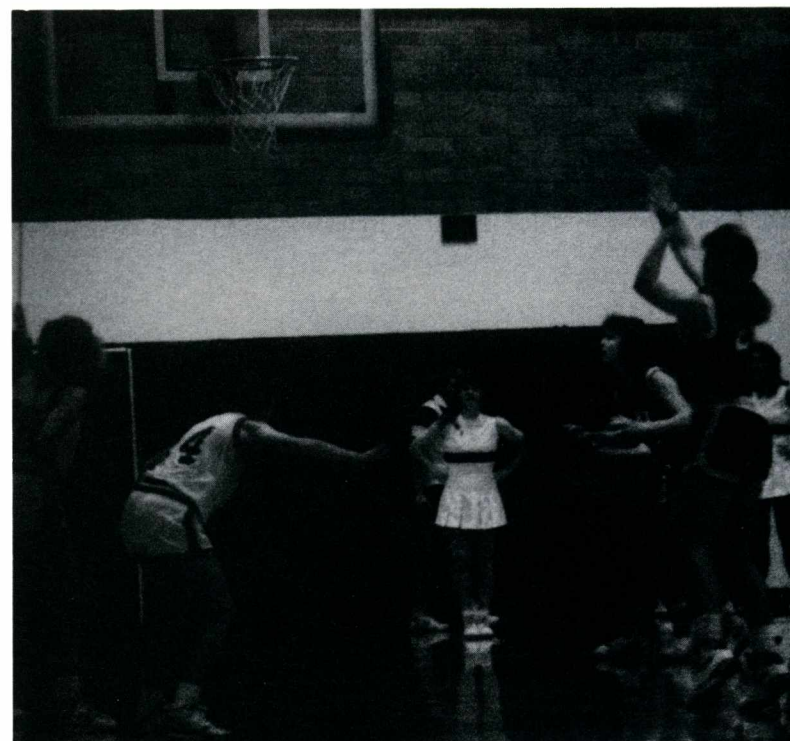
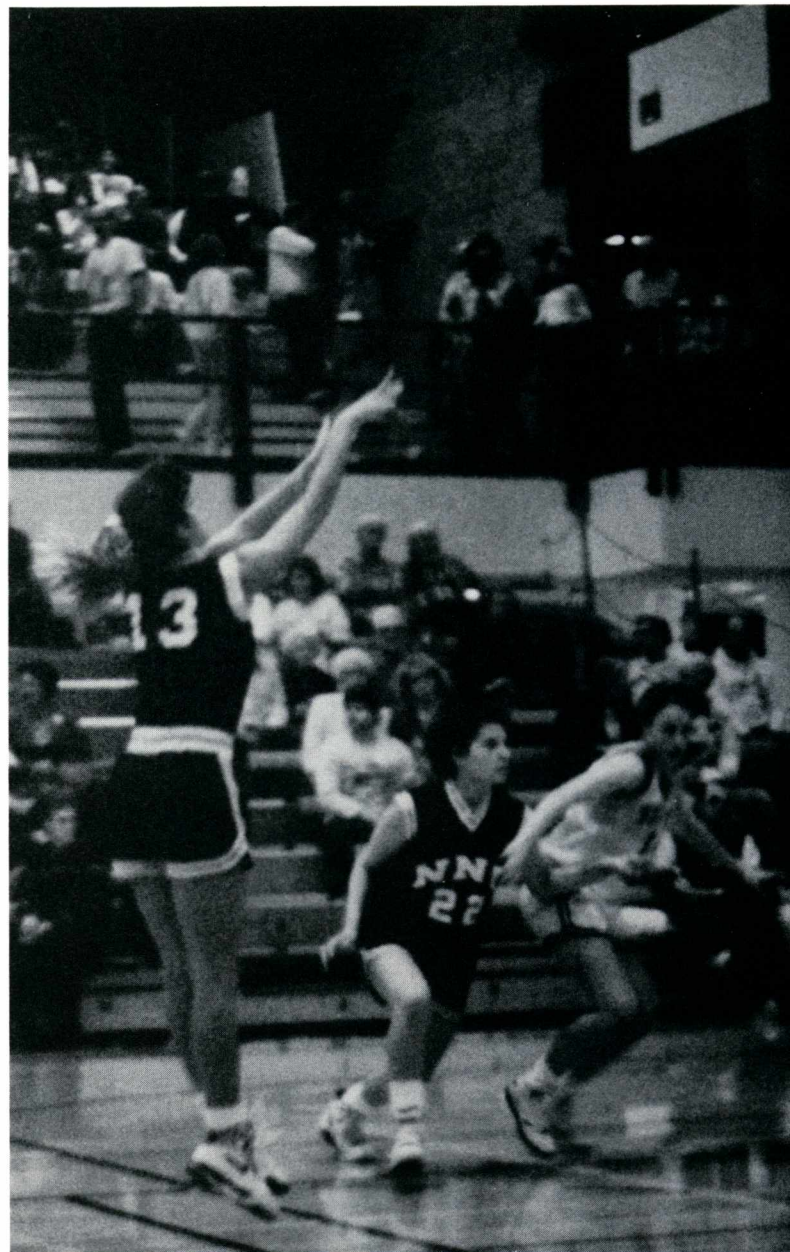

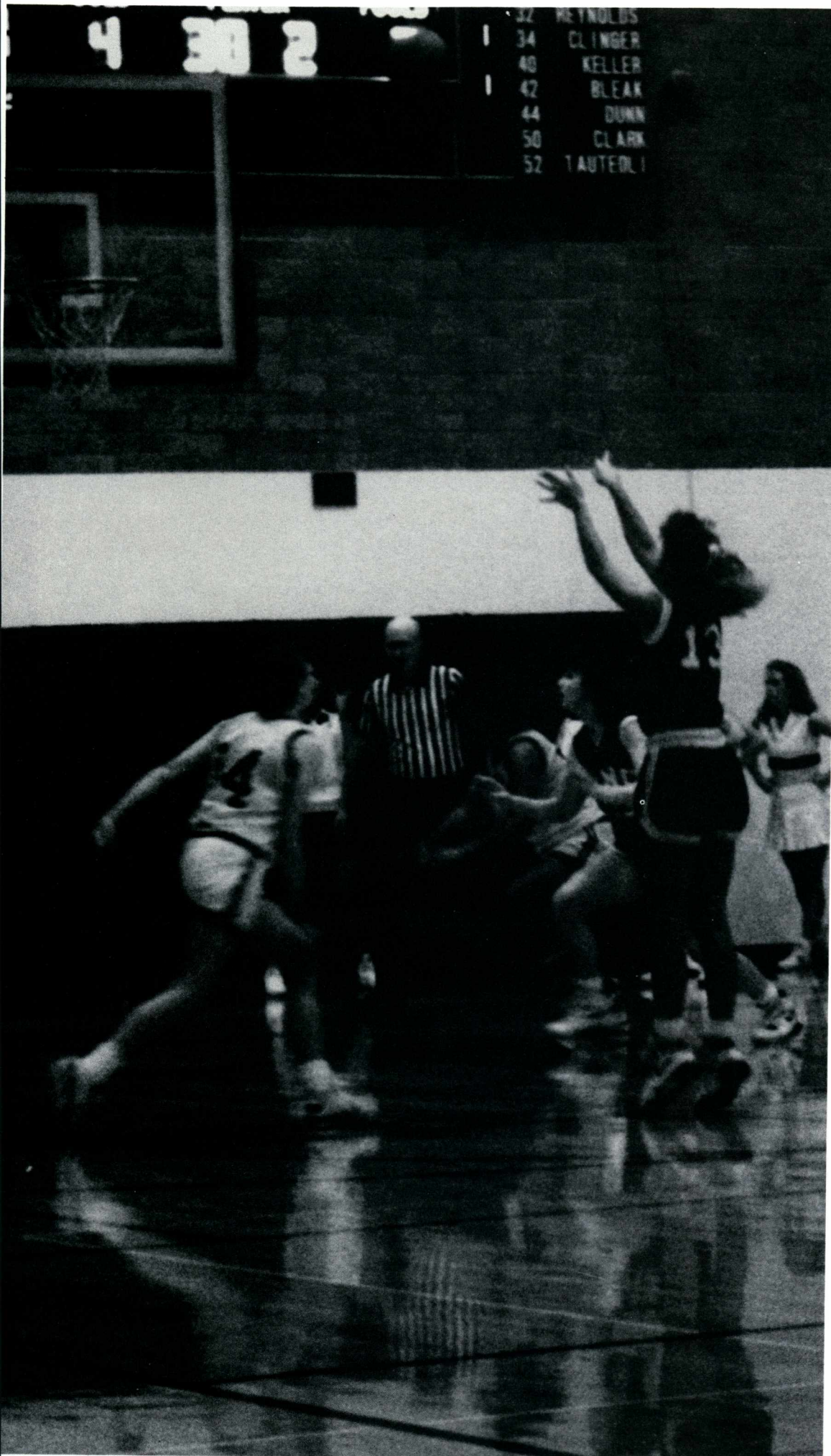
The women Crusaders returned home with the first place league tie, the District 2 title, and broke about 26 school records.

Of two graduating seniors, one was all district honor roll All-American and the first women athlete at NNC to receive the NAIA Academic All-American, and Doreen Hochstetler received a honorable mention in all district. We had a very good group of kids, the chemistry was there. I had a positive outlook and am looking for continued success. And we were nationally ranked in the top 50; 15th in nation in rebounds and 3rd nationally in field goal percentage."

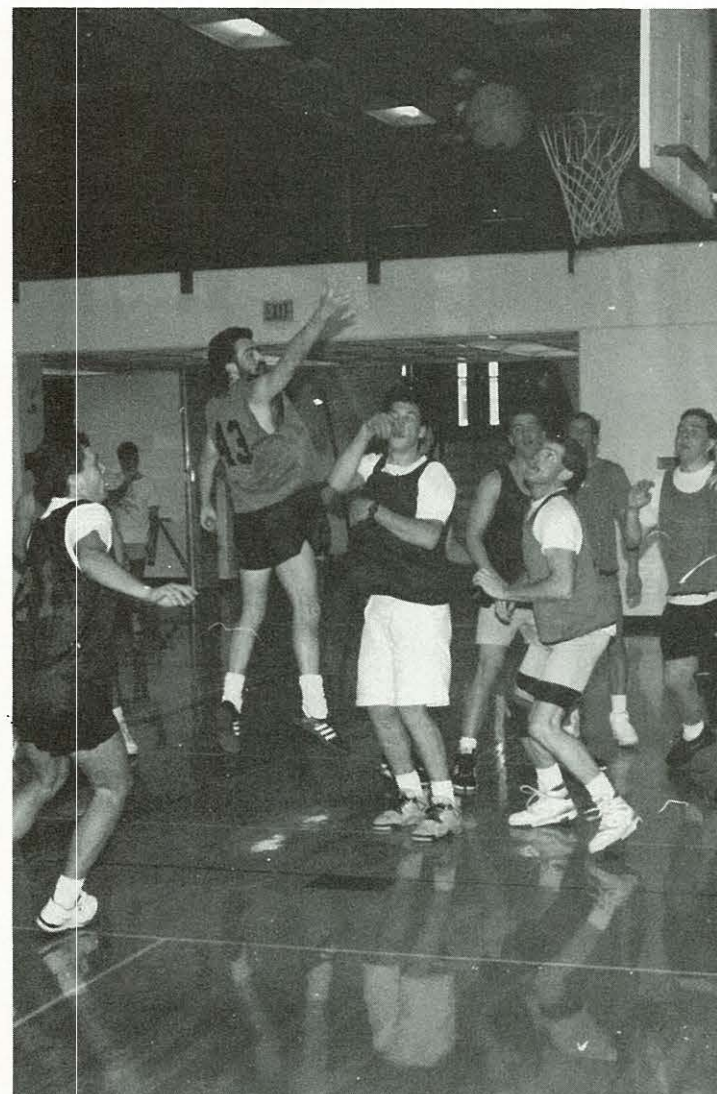

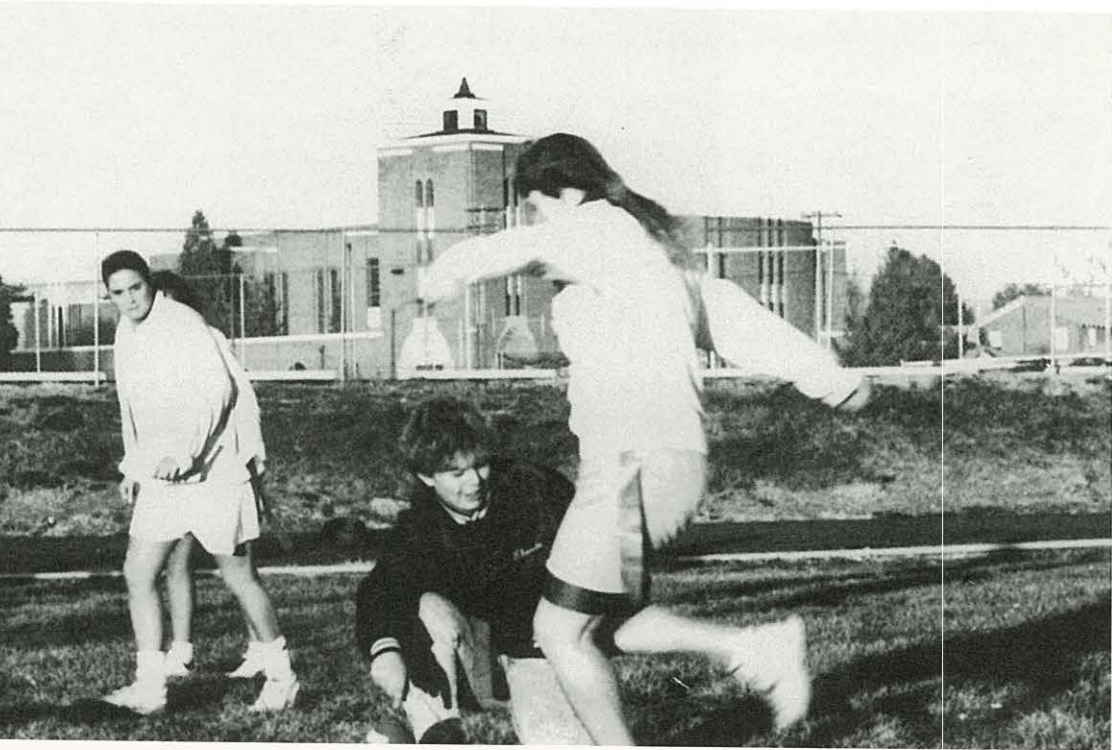

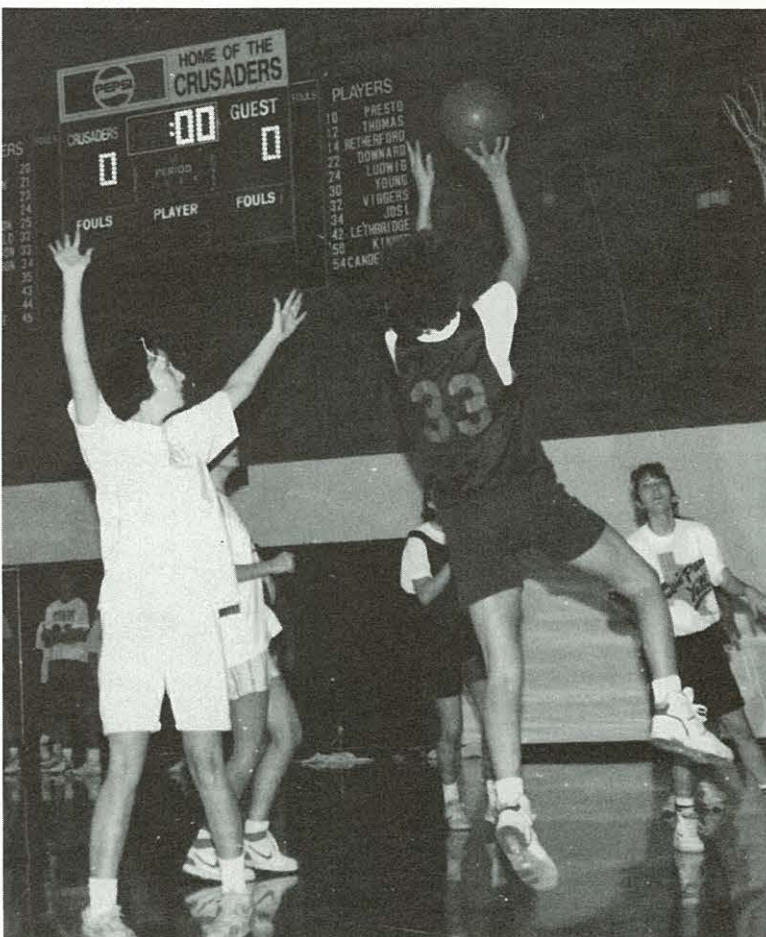

# Academics

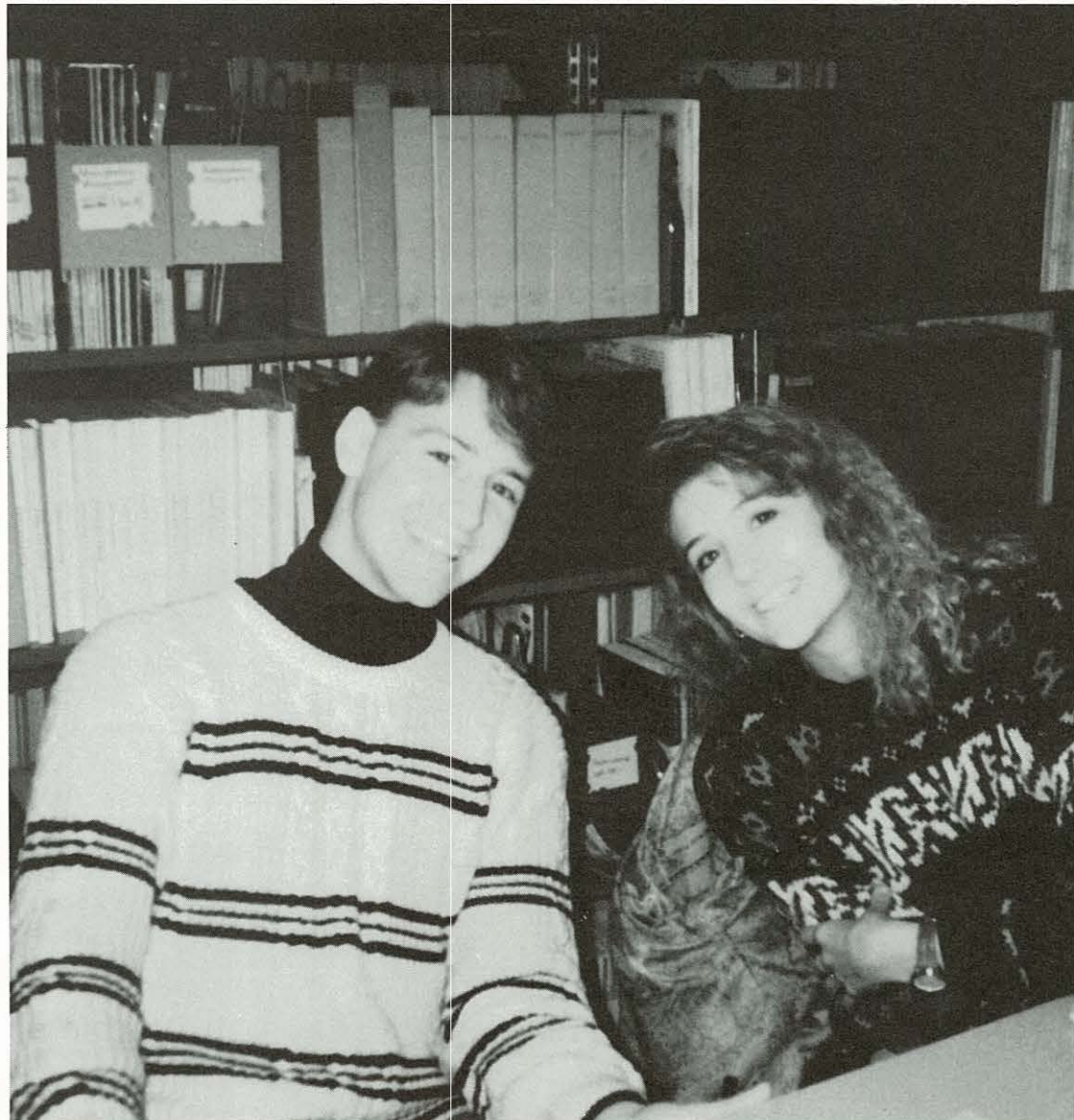

out to many other areas of interest such as clubs, sports, ministry groups and fun times with friends.

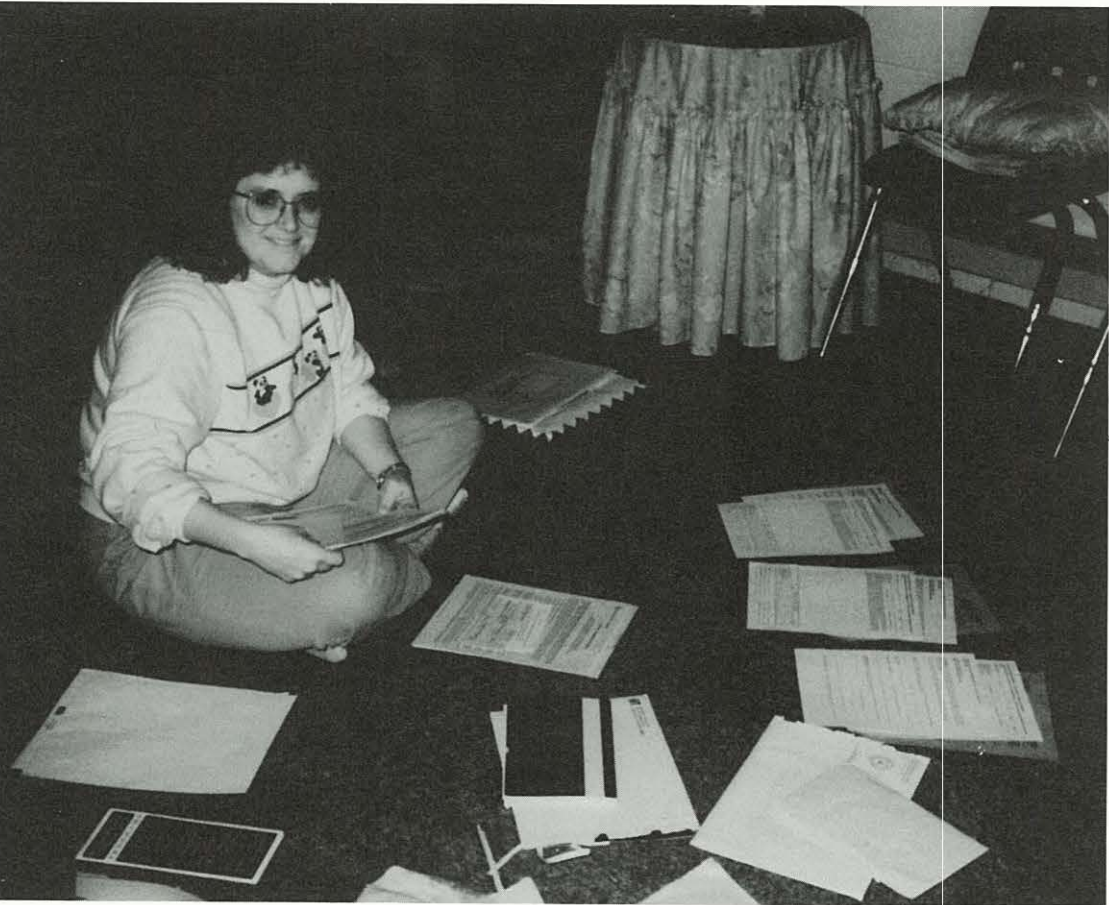

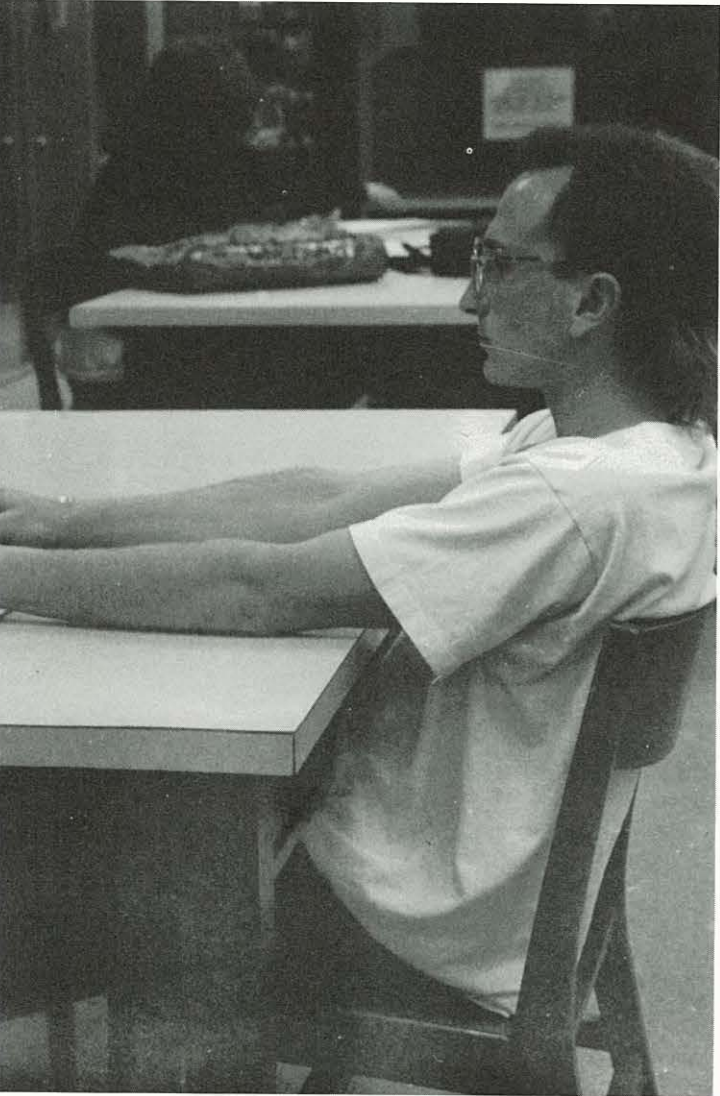

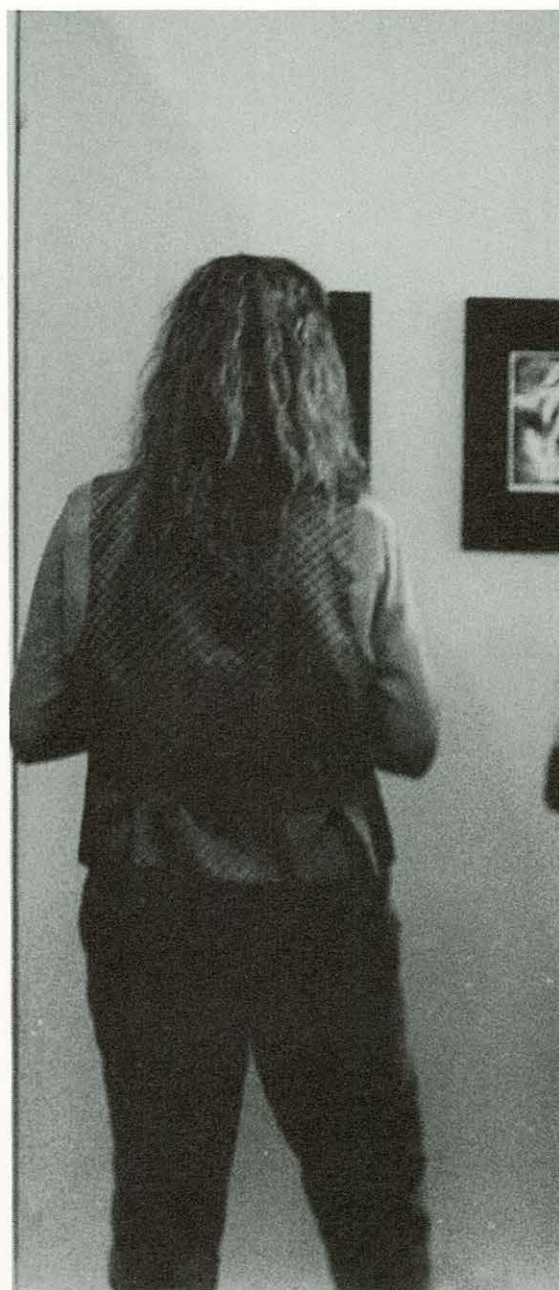

God's calling and instruction

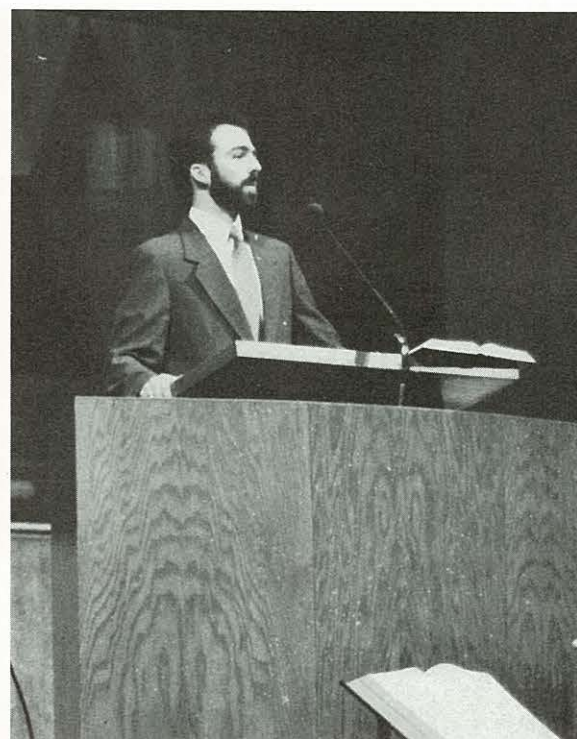
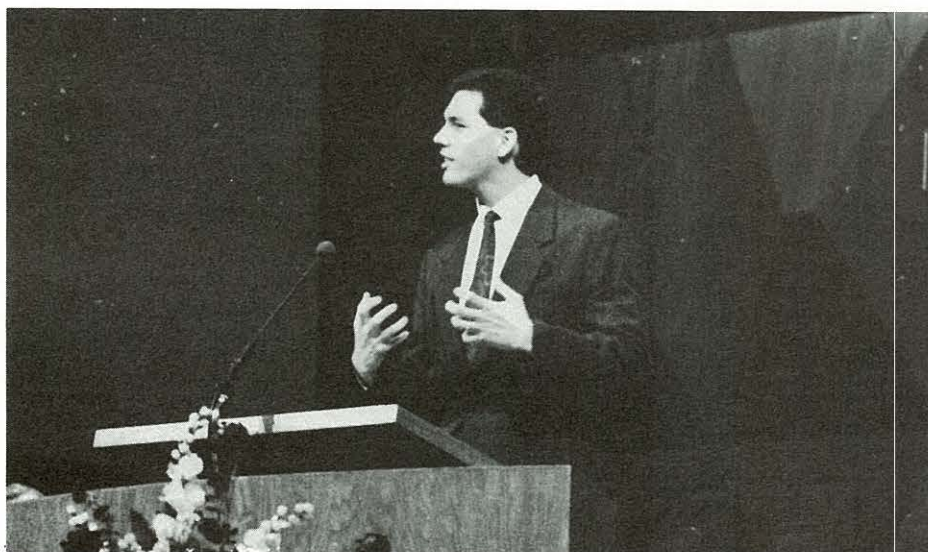

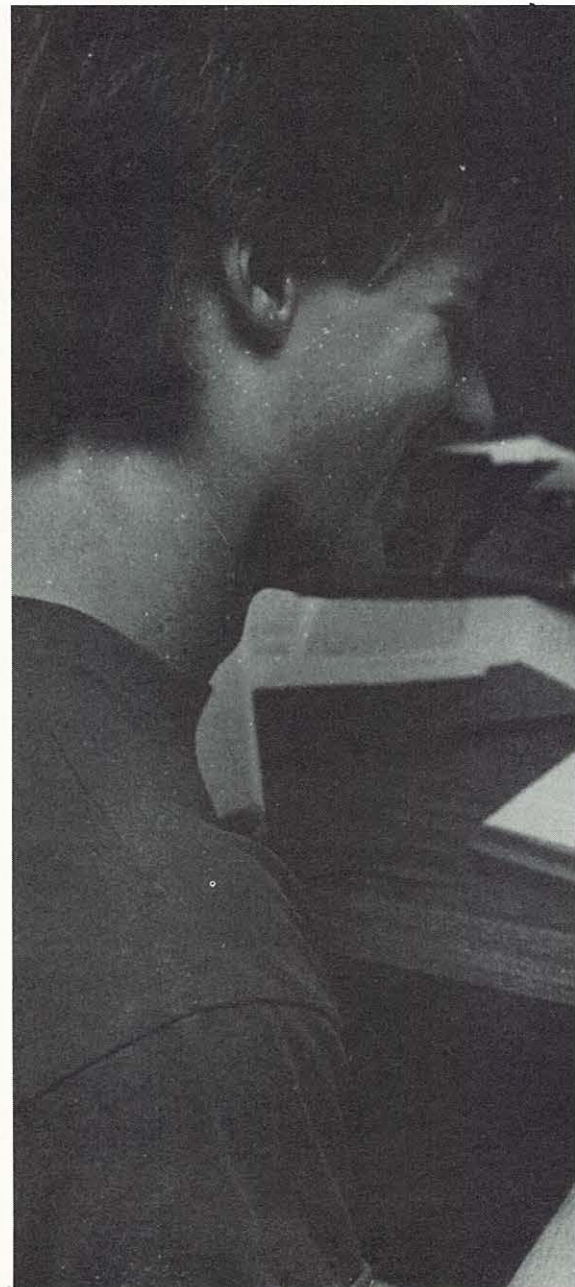
participation of project advisor(s) a researcher's problems might seem insurmountable.

rise higher and higher—until they leave this institution and once again become the bottom end of the stack, this time in the corporate world.

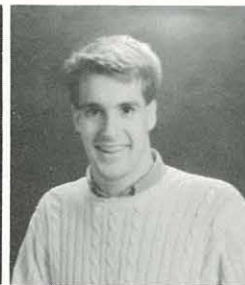

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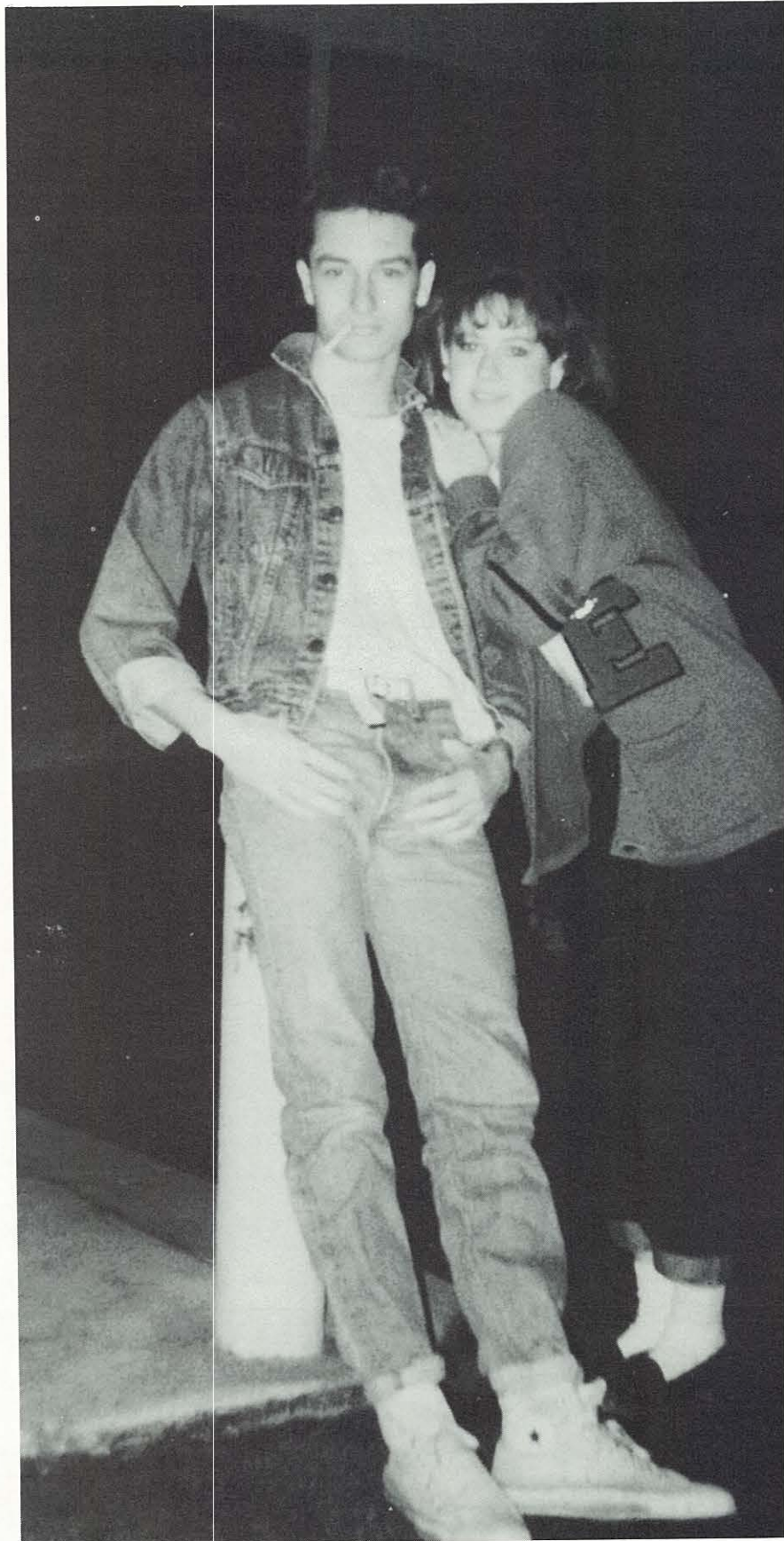
## The Class Of 1993

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# NNC Best In the West

There's no doubt about it. NNC is one of the best Regional Liberal Arts Colleges in the West. At least, that's how the October 15th issue of the U.S. News and World Report put it. More accurately, NNC ranks as the sixth in this category. And on the national level, NNC ranks 32nd of the 385 schools included within the study's category for small liberal arts colleges.

The 1,374 four-year schools included in the study were ranked according to academic reputation and statistics, which combined served to measure the selectivity of the student body; the degree to which the school supports a high-quality, full-time faculty; overall financial resources; and the level of student satisfaction as measured by the school's ability to graduate the students it admits as freshmen.

NNC's academic reputation was ranked 12th in the regional study by 2,483 college presidents, deans, and admissions directors who completed the survey questionnaire. NNC was also ranked second in student selectivity and sixth in faculty resources.

The ranking is "incredibly significant," said Dr. Rich Hagood, Vice-President for Institutional Advancement. "It means we no longer need to be quiet about the quality education we offer at NNC. When someone else says you're among the best, it has a ring of authenticity and is not just insured hype."

"It is really a morale-builder for the faculty and staff to see that what they've been doing, sometimes without much publicity, has been recognized on a national basis," remarked Hagood.

NNC was the only Nazarene college listed on the study's top forty list.

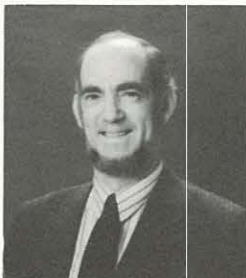

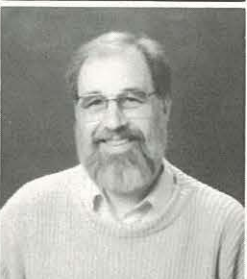

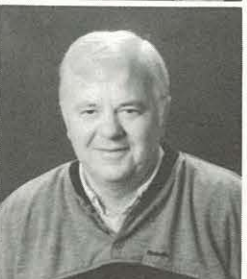

## Mission Completed

### NNC and Hieb Launch Into Space

The long-awaited moment arrived on Sunday, April 28, 1991, at 5:30 a.m. for NNC students—an opportunity to see a piece of NNC go into space. Fifty to seventy-five students were on hand to witness the second try at the

launching of the space shuttle Discovery.

The launch was canceled on April 23, 1991, when the news arrived that there had been a failure of a pressure sensor on the main en-

gine. The problem was then corrected and the launch rescheduled for 7:01 a.m. EDT on Sunday.

The launch not only marked the first unclassified shuttle mission for the Department of Defense, but also marked the first space flight of NNC alumnus Rick Hieb, graduate of the NNC class of 1977.

The shuttle carried with it a 160 million dollar set of instruments to be used to observe the atmosphere, aurora, and stars. Many of the experiments scheduled to take place will be to the advance of the Strategic Defense Initiative, better known as “Star Wars.”

The space shuttle landed safely at the Edwards Air Force Base in California on Monday, May 6. After the follow-up sessions are completed, Rick Hieb plans to attend and speak at NNC’s commencement ceremony on June 9.

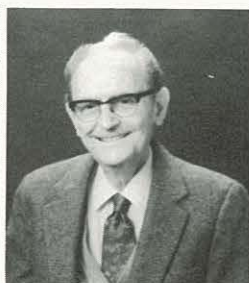

Environmental influences which will impinge on higher education in the nineties will call for what some are describing "white-water" leadership in colleges and universities. Conditions appear to be changing so quickly that the compass needle seldom stops long enough to take a reading.

In the bloodstream of Northwest Nazarene College is its rootage in the "Wesleyan-Armenian" tradition. A Major part of this tradition has been its strong concern for the development of excellent academic institutions. My use of the "Wesleyan" above implies this heritage. The following "drivers" are in mind as I think of the foreseeable future on NNC and its ability to navigate in "white-water" times.

a great deal about bringing together what had been "so long divided", that is, "learning and vital piety". Piety is present day language would be holy living in the real world.

The heritage of Wesleyanism begins with a strong concern for worship and for the centrality of Jesus Christ in the life of an academic institution.

Leadership is scholarly research and insistence on academic credibility are consistent with the best in the Wesleyan tradition. Dean Bertha Munro, A Nazarene scholar in the best of the Wesleyan tradition, affirmed that there is no conflict between the best in scholarship and the best in Christian faith.

The Wesleyan tradition measure the validity of theory by the practical application of experience. The ongoing tension between faith and learn-







ing finds a place of resolution in the real and concrete experience of life. The Christian faith in Wesleyan terminology is viable in the "common round".

Christian higher education in this tradition will be within the grasp of the common person. This is not to imply that academic excellence will be sacrificed for popular acceptance but that every effort will be

made to provide access for the eager achieving young person who thirsts after the values that NNC supports.

The Wesleyan tradition links historic mission to the needs and conditions of the times.

And, lastly, at the heart of the mission of NNC is its historic stance as a "holiness" college. The Wesleyan tradition at

its best insists that there is no holiness but social holiness. To state this another way is to say that there are no grounds for being called a Christian college unless those who make up the college live out those callings as Christians.

I foresee that the major stabilizing force for NNC in the fast changing 1990's will be its historic strengths based on a solid Christian mission applied in a revitalized institution.

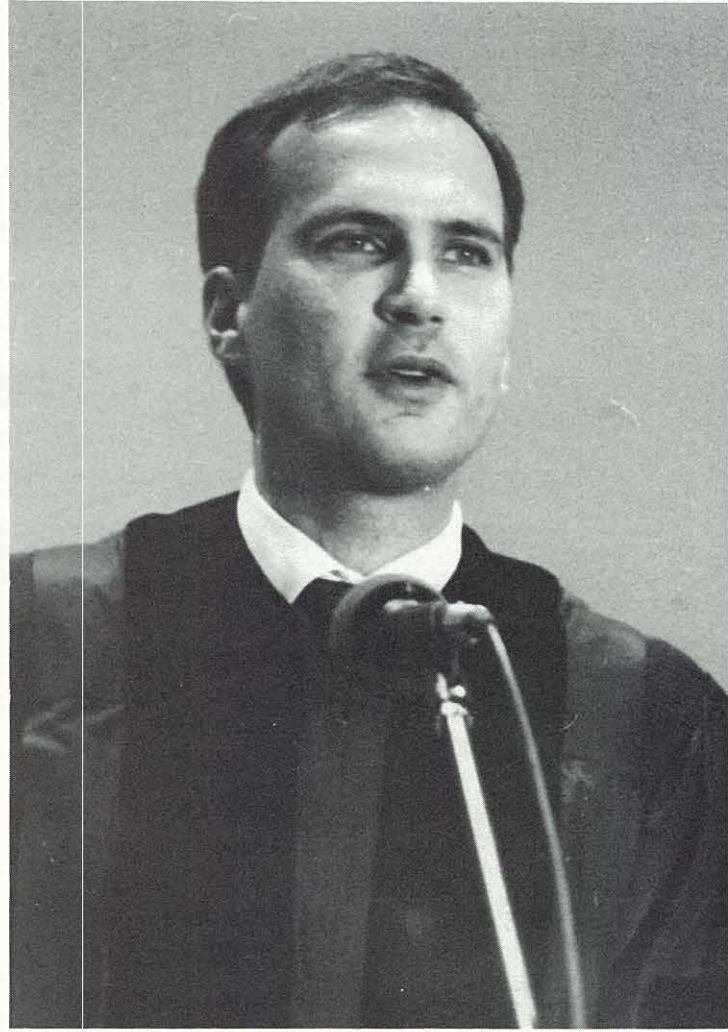
# A Giant Step Forward

# Wrapping Things Up

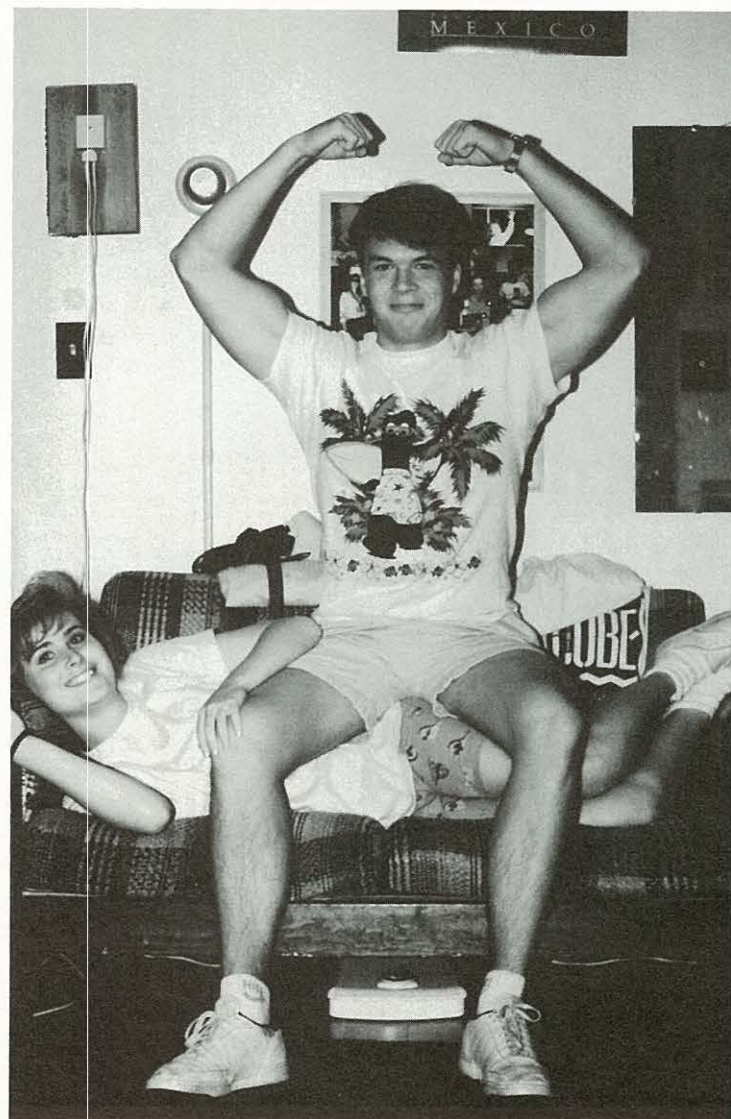

For the Seniors the end of the academic year means that all these four or five or more years of hard work will be rewarded with a degree, and they can begin looking toward to new job opportunities. For some it will

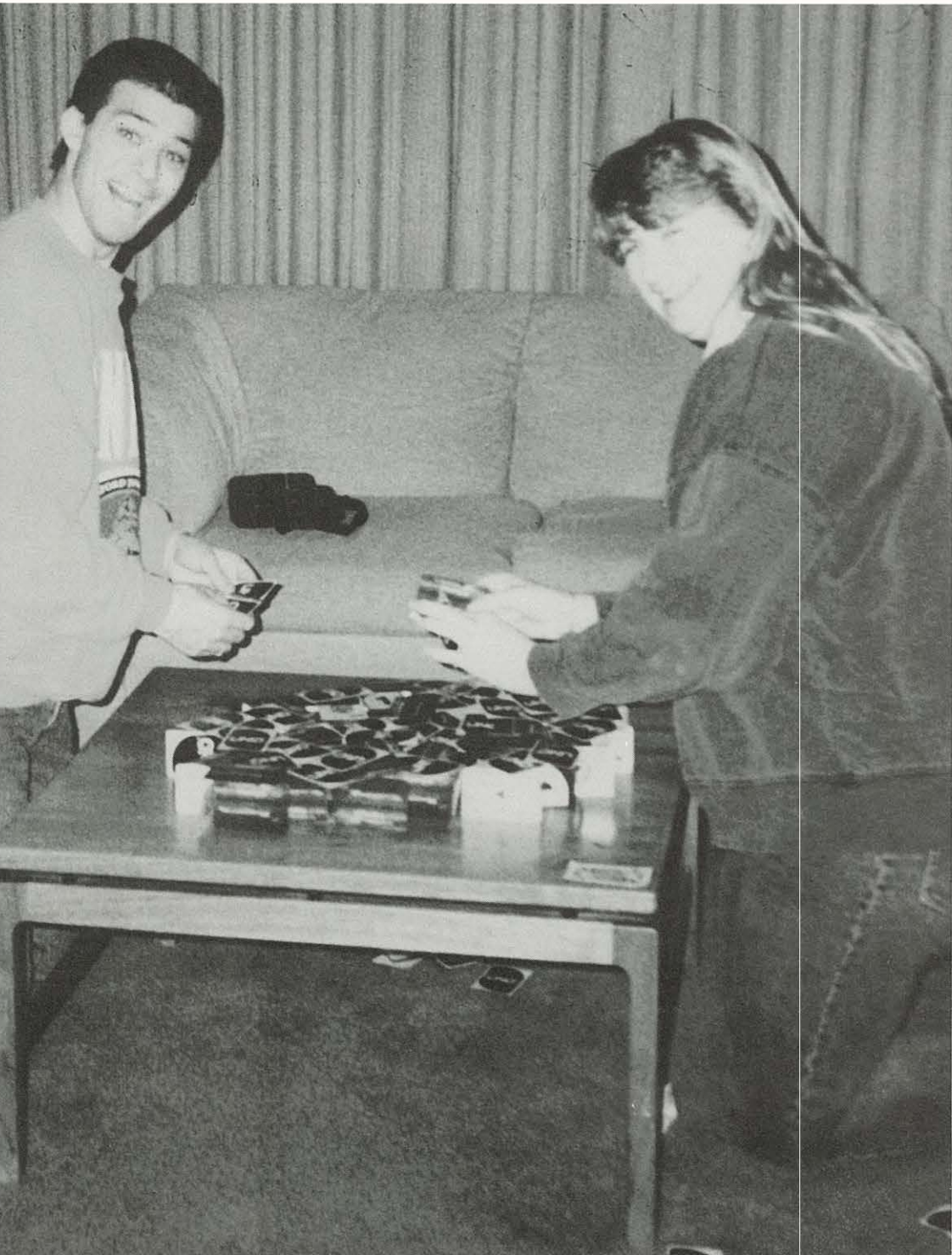
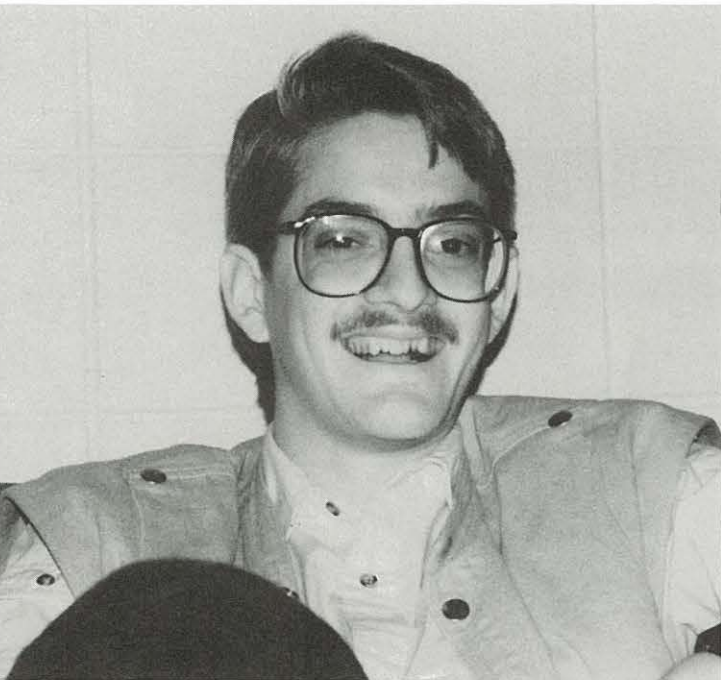
