

The 1993 fall intramural sports brought out the largest men's football draft in the history of NNC. There were eight teams picked in the draft and four freshmen teams. With twelve teams altogether, intramural program coordinators were excited to get the games under way. Intramural director Jay Hughes commented, "I don't remember there ever being more teams." Due to the large number of teams, the league was divided into the AFC conference and the NFC conference. The championship game was between the winners of each conference.

In the first week of the season the opening game featured the Steelers destroying the Saints 48-6. The big game of the first week was when the Cowboys met the Lions. The Lions jumped into the lead early on in the game and went on to win 26-20.

The second week included the match up between the Lions and the Jets. Both had come from big wins the previous week, but the Lions pulled off an exciting 19-14 victory. The Cowboys bounced back from their previous loss with a shut-

out victory over the Saints 34-0. The Steelers improved their record to 2-0 with a devastating 32-6 victory over the Bills. In the West Division, the Seahawks upped their record to 2-0 with a win over the 49ers 12-7.

In the third week of the season, the Seahawks improved their record 3-0 with a 28-20 win over the Broncos, now with a record of 0-3. That victory put the Seahawks into a tie for first place with the Chiefs, who won by forfeit over the Chargers as they moved into the first round of the play-offs. In the East Division the Steelers, now 2-1, were tied for second along with the Cowboys, also with a record of 2-1. The Jets were tied for second after winning by forfeit over the "Saints." The Lions took first place with an undefeated record of 3-0 after winning by forfeit over the Bills.

The first round of play-offs featured the undefeated Seahawks scraping by with a 14-12 win over the Steelers. In the next game the Cowboys destroyed the Raiders 54-8 setting the Cowboys up to play the Seahawks in the second round of play-offs. On the other side of the bracket the Lions upped their

record to 5-1 with the Broncos' forfeit. The Jets upset the Chiefs 12-6, putting the Jets up against the Lions for the final round of the play-offs.

In the second round of play-offs, the Seahawks advanced with a 12-8 win over the Cowboys. In the second game the Lions held on to beat the Jets 13-12, moving both the Seahawks and the Lions into the championship game.

In the championship game between the Lions and the Seahawks the lead bounced back and forth throughout the game, and when time ran out the score was tied 14-14. In overtime the Lions pushed through to score two touchdowns to end the game and the season with a 26-14 victory.



The 1993 soccer team looked forward to a season of excellence with the addition of 10 new players, an improved 11 returning lettermen, and Head Coach David Diehl in his second season as NNC's soccer coach. The returning lettermen were led by senior captain, two time All-District and NAIA Academic All-American, Carlos Antras. The remaining four seniors, Rod Malcom, Eddie Miles, Rob Lawler, and Mike Wood, were the front runners for the team. Coach Diehl commented, "these seniors are high quality players that played a major role in the squad." The returning players; Juniors Colby Halker and Brian Murphy; Sophomores Chucky BonDurant, Kevin Saul, Mark Pond, and Tim Whetstone contributed their hard work and talent to the team. Communication and cooperation were a priority from the very beginning because of the unusually large 21-member squad.

After a slow start to the season, the team scored a 3-2 overtime victory over Albertson College of Idaho. The soccer team faced a rough early sched-

ule, losing their first four games without scoring a goal. The first Albertson victory since 1988, did a lot for the team's morale. As Coach Diehl put it, "This game was a real mental victory for us. Since we had not won any games, we needed a mental lift to get us going."

Despite their first victory over AC of I, the second time they met, the Crusaders fell in an intense contested match, Albertson came out on top 1-0. Coach Diehl remarked, "We need to start playing 90 minutes of intense soccer, rather than just 45," referring to their losses.

The soccer team opened district play winning one of two home games. They beat Linfield 5-1. Captain Carlos Antras was in the middle of most of the scoring with two goals and two assists. Rod Malcolm and Brian Murphy added two more first half goals, and Colby Halker scored NNC's final goal in the second half. Malcolm commented, "For the first time all year we played like we were capable of playing." After their win, however, the Crusaders fell to George Fox 5-0. The effort was there, but the execution of the offense was not. The follow-

ing district games were lost to Concordia 5-0 and Willamette 4-0.

The NNC soccer team ended a long season full of disappointing losses. The team lost to Western Baptist 4-1, then to Pacific 4-1, then the final game was lost against Albertson 2-1. The team lacked the intensity they needed to win in both games. "We were mentally out of the game," remarked junior Brian Murphy, "We played with no intensity." Kevin Saul, who scored the only goal against AC of I said, "We played with confidence after having a good week of practice, but we had a few bad breaks and came up a little bit short." A disappointed Coach Diehl reflected on the season, "We were a better team than we showed. We had good talent, but a lack of confidence kept us from showing what we could do on the field."

For the 94-95 year, the team hoped to return with a strong nucleus of players, plus several redshirt players also joining the team on the field. Coach Diehl expressed excitement about the possibilities of the future year's team, although they would be losing key players Carlos Antras,

Mike Wood, and Rob Lawler. The focus for next year will be developing pride in the soccer program. Coach Diehl's final comment was to "stick with the soccer team, because they are getting better and better with every season."

Experience was the key with the lady Crusaders this year with all six starters from last season returning and Head Coach Darlene Brasch beginning her fifth year with NNC volleyball. "Adding two junior college transfers to a potent offense containing the six starters from last year, we will be challenging every team in the conference," said Coach Brasch at the beginning of the season, and they did. Retuning starters included seniors Stephanie Arland and Brenda Cave; junior Terea Josephson; sophomores Melanie Trombley and Cheri Dailey. Joining the team were junior college transfers Michelle Miller and Michelle Barfknecht, both juniors.

The Crusaders had a record of 13-12 for the season, and were third place as they headed into the Conference Tournament. They had a tough start against Western Oregon State College and fell in three matches 2-15, 6-15, and 10-15. But they turned around to beat George Fox College 15-11, 15-12, and 15-12 with the help of Cheri Dailey and Terea Josephson's outstanding plays. The following weekend the Crusaders met up against Eastern Oregon, and the first

match ended with a score of 15-10. They confirmed their victory with a 16-14 match to end the game. In a second set of matches against Southern Oregon College, the first match was won 15-3. They then fell 3-15, but turned around to secure a 16-14 victory, beating Southern Oregon on their home floor. After the win against Southern Oregon the Crusaders met up with Western Oregon, the holder of fifth place in the country. Despite their efforts, the Crusaders fell 15-17. They attempted a come back in the second match with a score of 16-14, but failed in the third and final match 11-15. After their loss to Western Oregon, NNC was victorious over George Fox 15-1 and 15-7, then were defeated again by Western Oregon a second time 5-15 and 1-15.


Due to their losses against Western Oregon, the Crusaders came out in second place. "I think that was the best we have ever played all season!" commented Kristie Pickens. Stephanie Arland was honored with the All-Conference Award for the second time in a row, and All-Conference Honorable Mentions were given to Terea Josephson and Cheri Dailey. The Cru-

saders' impressive season ended with a record of 19 wins and 15 losses. Out of the five years Coach Brasch has coached the Crusaders, this team was the first to go to Districts.

This season the Crusaders broke a record for the most aces against Idaho State. Michelle Miller tied the school record for the most blocks with 11, and Terea Josephson took the record for the most aces in a single match with 7. The season was a triumph for the Lady Crusaders. According to Coach Brasch, "this is the finest volleyball team in the history of NNC."







league, the All-Stars by far outshone the rest.

During tournament time, things began to heat up as the 6 Studs and a Dud came up against their rivals 3-Peat in the A league championship game after the Huskers forfeited. 6 Studs and a Dud overcame 3-Peat to secure their A league championship title. 

The 1993-94 men's basketball team faced a tough pre-season schedule. Coach Ed Weidenbach stated, "That was the toughest pre-season schedule since I have been here, and probably the toughest in years." But, the team proved they could handle anything because, according to Weidenbach, the team had "depth."

This year's team had a good mixture of returning players. Rolando Garcia moved from the two guard to the point. Sheldon McClain took over for Garcia at the off guard position, proving an excellent defensive player with great ball handling skills. Emiko Etete moved away from the basket and saw some time at the three and four spots. Again Etete was a very strong athlete with unbelievable quickness. Joel Marion was the team's strong rebounder and put in solid defense at the forward position. Eric Spencer came back quicker and became more of an offensive threat. Justin

Marion rebounded from the guard spot and was strong defensively. Todd Schumacher, a junior college transfer, played point guard and battled for the back up spot behind Garcia, but soon proved himself. Chad Herron was another transfer. His amazing three-point ability was his main role for the team, and it pulled them out of the hole at crucial times. The Crusaders had a variety of talent, but, as Coach Weidenbach said, "There is a better unity within the relationships with the players. This is vital because we couldn't have made it to the level we did if we weren't all in it together." Weidenbach called this year's team, "the best group we've had in the two years I've been here."

In the first week, the team travelled to Montana. The Sadlers narrowly beat Carroll 62-60 and Montana Tech 68-65, making their first wins the first victories over Montana schools on the road in over 13 years. Next, the Crusaders downed Rocky Mountain College 68-59 and the Point Loma Crusaders 101-75 during

Homecoming week. The team moved on to edge out Western Oregon 81-80 in overtime. The following night was easier: Western Baptist went down 84-73, improving NNC's league record to 3-0 and placing them first in the Cascade Conference.

Defense was the key for most of the Crusaders' success, but against Albertson College of Idaho, the lack of defense keyed the win for the Coyotes 64-54. NNC kept Cascade Conference hopes alive with wins at Concordia and George Fox. The Crusaders edged out Concordia 91-89 in overtime before crushing George Fox 100-72. Concordia was the fifth overtime game NNC played this year, winning four out of five.

The Crusaders blasted George Fox for the second time in two weeks 72-49, then crushed Concordia again 74-53. The team's defense stifled George Fox, while NNC's offense went unanswered. Chad Herron tied an NNC school record

with seven three-pointers in a game in the win over Concordia. Next, the Sadlers avenged their loss to Eastern Oregon 91-78. The team had five players in double figures. The Crusaders then beat Southern Oregon 96-67, their eighth win in a row. AC of I's previous loss against Southern Oregon moved NNC into sole possession of first place in the Cascade Conference.


The 21st ranked Sadlers earned their spot in the championship game with a 116-100 victory over Eastern Oregon. NNC broke their four-game streak of losses to their arch-rival, beating AC of I 81-64. Later, NNC pounded Western Baptist 84-60, and didn't stop there. They defeated second-place Western Oregon 96-85. The win made it the 11th straight for the Sadlers, who finished their regular season 14-2 in league play and 21-7 overall.

Earning their 11th seed in the NAIA National Tournament, the Crusaders vanquished all comers until the final four, where they were tired out by the eventual champions from Eureka.





UP, UP AND AWAY. Point guard Mary Kessel shoots for the score. This year Kessel was voted "Best Defender" and broke the single season assist record.



The Lady Crusaders basketball team began what they thought to be a season resulting in the National Tournament, and they were right. They hoped to pick up where they left off last season, and with nine returning players and strong recruits, the momentum from last season was well under way. The returning players from last year's team brought back experience.

Senior Guard Kristi Chatterton, who received district and conference honors last year returned as the play caller. Junior Mary Kessel also returned as a guard. Giving the team height were returning sophomores Kathy Kyle at 6'1" and Donna Knight at 5'11". Other returning players were Becky Woods, Bobby Jungert, Lisa Schram, Jennie Fowler, and Stephanie Arland. Arland received honors last season as honorable mention All American for NAIA Division II.

Coach Schmidt really looked forward to the help from his newcomers too. Sandra Van Langen, who

came from the Netherlands, played at the post. Tara Jensen, from Boise, also played at post. And joining the team at guard were Jennifer Myers, Erica Walton, and Ellen Duncan.

The Lady Crusaders opened their season winning two out of three games and placed second in the West One Invitational. Behind their strong defense, the ladies defeated Eastern Oregon 65-45. The victory over EOSC moved the Saders into the tournament final against Lewis and Clark. The ladies were unable to overcome Lewis and Clark and fell 76-66. Then, the Lady Saders upped their record to 4-1 with a win over Carroll College and Montana Tech. Kristi Chatterton led the Crusader with her career performance, helping NNC to win 80-68. The team then faced Montana Tech for the second time in a week, and found themselves down 28-37 at half time, but turned themselves around and pulled out a tight victory, 65-62.

The ladies extended their winning streak to five games and improved their season record to 6-1. The Crusaders pounded CSI 89-61. The

Saders were led in scoring by Donna Knight with 17 points. In game two of Homecoming weekend, the ladies pulled off a win against Whitman College 62-52. The Lady Crusaders were then ranked tenth in the NAIA Division II poll. The ladies opened league play at George Fox with a victory of 66-59. Donna Knight led the team with 19 points and 11 rebounds. The ladies then thrashed Western Baptist College 89-49. Kessel said, "We really played well as a team and team unity is good, and our confidence was really high."

The ladies improved their Cascade Conference record to 3-0 with a solid victory over Concordia College. That victory put the Crusades in sole possession of first place in the Cascade Conference, and brought the team to 15-2 for the season.

Unfortunately, the Saders lost two of the three games played on their longest road trip, putting their record at 4-2 in conference play and 16-4 overall. Opening the road trip, the team beat Eastern Oregon State College 80-69. The ladies then fell to Southern Oregon 92-86 and again to Western

Oregon State College 59-46. The Lady Crusaders clinched a playoff spot and found themselves in second place in the Cascade Conference.


In the game against Western Oregon, the ladies jumped ahead and held on to win 80-65. Mary Kessel broke an NNC record and set a new mark for assists in a season with 161. Kristi Chatterton set the school record for career scoring; she had a career of 1,428 points.

In the game against Southern Oregon, the team fell short and lost 82-76. But, on their last regular season road trip, the Lady Crusaders overpowered Concordia 83-43. The victory put the team at 21-6 overall and 9-3 in the Cascade Conference. The Lady Saders then defeated third place George Fox at home, 73-64. The win marked the first round of the playoffs for the national women's tournament in Monmouth, Oregon.




