


Parable







Adam Butts, Casey Green, John Giannatala, and Todd McArthur got the chance to be amongst their class in the sophomore guy's dorm as RAs.




others were focussed on the success of the women's basketball team.







The season record of a team does not always reflect the nature and desire of the team. Although the Crusader volleyball teamfinished with a 14-6 record they had a very competitive eason and established a












When spring comes around in Nampa Idaho many people like to take advantage of the sunshine. It's no different on the campus of NNU where many students participate in spring intramurals.





Students In Free Enterprise, SIFE is a group of about thirty members, striving










Debale C NNU


very avid about parties and retreats. They make it a goal to meet every 2 weeks to discuss



Physics Club






Above: This is what the setup of a typical S.I.C. meeting looks like.






This is a great opportunity to get involved with children and youth. These kids have not had easy lives so they really love and appreciate their NNU friends.


