Honduras

Honduras is a Central American country with a population of approximately 9.9 million people. The official language is Spanish. The Church of the Nazarene began work in Honduras in 1970. Danilo Solis was sent to the city of San Pedro de Sula by Rev. James Hudson to plant the first Nazarene church. Global Missions then sent missionary Rev. Stanley Storey to direct the work of the mission in Honduras in 1973. The church continues to grow and thrive in Honduras today through the work of faithful pastors and leaders.

Nazarenes minister to children and adolescents in vulnerable communities in Honduras



An evangelism event that took place in La Lima, Honduras, brought together more than 200 children and youth from three communities where the Church of the Nazarene has active discipleship programs. The event was held by a team of pastors and discipleship teachers.

During the event, the participants enjoyed a time of prayer, songs, and a Christ-centered message. 34 of the participants decided to give their lives to Jesus during this time.

The children and youth who participated are a part of discipleship groups in these churches: Bethel de La Lima, Colonia Martínez, and Colonia Pineda N° 2.

Gerson Martínez, a collaborator in the event and district leader, said that the Martínez and Pineda No. 2 neighborhoods are at the ends of the city and have many needs. These communities suffer from problems such as the recruitment of minors for gangs, malnutrition, lack of medical care, family disintegration, school desertion due to lack of economic resources, and child exploitation.

In Pineda No. 2, community leaders lent the church land to set up a temporary site, which will serve as a meeting place for them to continue ministering to the children and adolescents with whom they currently meet weekly. In addition, the leadership is preparing to minister to parents and more members of the community there.

"The mission is to establish a church that can serve the spiritual and social needs of that community," stated Martinez. "We hope to build links that will allow us to carry out the plans we have for that community."
