IN CONNECTION WITH our emphasis on many means and types of evangelism, it is appropriate to highlight vacation Bible school evangelism. As the summer season nears, let us be reminded that this field offers an unusual opportunity for reaching out beyond our own group to touch many children who have had no evangelistic privileges.

Last year at an international conference of a religious organization whose legalistic interpretation of scripture might be considered a barrier to growth, it was reported that their church school enrollment in one Oriental country had increased during 1961 from 18,000 to


72,000 , or 400 per cent. According to this report, this phenomenal delevopment resulted largely from vacation Bible school evangelism, followed by branch church school evangelism.

While this may be an isolated and unique situation, it is of sufficient significance to warrant a reassessment of our attitude toward the vacation Bible

Nazarene children could be brought in some measure into the circle of our spiritual influence. More than $\mathbf{3 5}, 000$ such children were contacted through the vacation Bible school in 1962.

We should not fail to realize the significance, in the above-mentioned report, of the avowed and intentional pursuit of evangelism in the vacation Bible school and the church school. Children can and should be converted and come to a saving knowledge of Jesus Christ. Therefore we should not hesitate to use our vacation Bible school and Sunday school operations to lead the children whom we contact into this vital experience. In addition, a consistent follow-up of evangelistic effort directed toward the parents of such children could result in a considerable number of adults won to Christ.

The challenge of these possibilities is clear. Let an effective vacation Bible school be projected in every possible Church of the Nazarene. Plans and materials of the highest order are available through the Department of Church Schools and the Nazarene Publishing House. So, without delay, may every pastor, Sunday school superintendent, and church school board proceed with vision, energy, and enthusiasm to make full use of this, another evangelistic arm of the church.

## A SPACE AGE FAITH <br> H/31. (ils N1! <br> SINCE AUGUST, 1945, the news of the world has constandy wavered between alarm and despair. And this is not without justification. When we

 realize that we now hate destructive power in the megaton rating and that much of the world's military forse is in the hands of cannal, selfish, unreasonable, if not dememed, men, we have ample cause for concern.Not too long ago our nation was driven to near panic when it became how what some of these forces were active nincty miles from our shores.

Biblereading (hnistians, however, should not be dismayed by these developments. They have al ways read that the world as we know it will not continue on indelinitels. Long ago a servant of God observed. "Seeing then that all these things shall be dissolved, what manner of persons ought se to be in all holy conversation and godliness:" (II Peter 3:11) One then does not need to be a gloomy pessimist or religious fanatic to assert that the physical world will one day be destroyed.
But as the center of interest in these verses is not upon the destruction of the world but rather upon the importance of holy hamater, oo our concern todas should not be so much one of alam and fear as it is of desire to be the kind of persons that God's grace makes posible. The emphasis Peter makes is not upon the amithitation of the human race but upon spiritual wholeness in the midst of perplexing historical events.

What kind of persons ought we to be: Suppose we ask Peter. First of all, he declares that we must be persons of contrition. "The Lord is . . . not willing that any should perish, but that all should come to repentance" (1.9). Now repentance is not an arbitrary demand laid upon linite creatures by an infinite cod. Repentance is the glorious provision of God whereby sin an be forgiven and fellowship an be restored. Paul said that "the goodness of God leadeth thee to repentance" (Romans 2:4).
Most of those who read these lines will readils admit that repentance is an all-important step towards salvation, but have we considered that repentance is not only an act, but also an attitude? It is a way of life. It carries with it hmmilite sut
render, and dependence. The truly sincere Christian never forgets the life from which he has been redecmed and will always remember, with a repemant heart, the sins of his past. Our taith may tell us that after we are saved God treats us as thoush we had never simned, but we can never treat God as though we had newer simned. Perhaps this is what Paul meant when he exclaimed, "This is a faithful saving, and worthy of all acceptation, that Christ Jests came into the world to save sinners; of "hom I am chict" (I Timothy 1:15).

Lgain, living in a world totiering on the brink of disaster and in an age shot through with superliciality and wickedness, we should be persons of holy (harater. In his declaration Peter makes use of such words as "holy conversation," "godliness," "diligem," "peace," "without spot," and "blameless." These all are terms that help to describe the Biblical implications of holiness of heart and life.

Holimess is often denounced by sincere men, not o) much beatuse they object to a genuine experichee of God's grace in the heart and life but becanse the misunderstand the meaning of the word "holiness." The term too often has been associated wih shallow make-believe, superlicial pretense, and a holier thim thou hypocrisy. But genuine Biblical holiness is as far removed from these misconceptions as Christ was from Pharisecism.

Holiness is heath, wholeness, completeness. It is a clean heart, a pure life, and dedicated talents. It is a life tilled with the presence of God by the Holy spirit. It is consecrated service. What could be more desirable or relevam for a day like today than this experience?

Note also that the emphasis of Peter is upon Christan conlidence He follows his prediction of doom with the testimony, "Nevertheless we, according to his promise, look for new heavens and a new earth, wherein dwelleth righteousness" (II Peter 3:13). For the sincere, Spirit-filled Christian there is always tomorrow. John said, "Perfect love castch out fear" (I John 4:18).

In an age that has heen called an age of despair-
when we hate limancial pooperint with economic uncertaints, scientific adsance with fear of being outdistanced, military might with military suspicion, and when we are trying to conquer outer pace but hase not as yet conquered inner spacehow refreshing it should be to all of us to know

We hnow this is true because the come just as well and just as eagerts the seond week. This is one reason they learn rapidts. Another is that many of them attend more regularly than on sumday because their parents will not be taking them awat. Their happ attitude and regular attendance make the seoond week a must. They grow rapidly and our opportunities are limited: what we do for them must bee done now. While we hase them and their attention. Iet, gise them the plus of the seoond week.

Another plus of the second week is the added sense of importance it gives the shool. I week does not seem like much, but two weeks offer a real challenge. Workers take their task more seriously and prepare better for it. The pupils have a better attitude when the feel that there is time to accomplish something worthwhile. The parents realize that a twoweek shool is too important for their children to miss. This whole spirit makes for a better shool. for everyone unconsciously puts
mone into the effort.
One purpore of the ratation Bible whool is to gain exar leakhige time. Io give ken than wo weck to it cuts the wer heat out of this value. there will alway be a tiox lay and a last das. ## Tornado Strikes Olivet Campus

A sudden tornado cut a swath 300 yards wide across the campus of Olivet Nazarene College, Kankakee, Illinois, recently, leaving heavy damage on the college administration building, clinic, heating plant, dining hall, and gymnasium. It also wrecked about fifty trailer homes parked in a trailer court owned by the college.

At press time, no one connected with the college had died as a result of injuries, although several persons were seriously injured. One woman who lived in the town of Bourbonnais was killed while running to her car, carrying her three-month-old child. The child was injured.

A student, standing on the cast steps of Burke Hall, the administration building, was struck down and injured as the tornado moved from west to east across the campus. Classes had been dismissed on schedule only five minutes earlier. The fourth floor of the administration building was sheared off by the storm. The rest of the building was damaged and filled with debris.

Also in the path of the storm was Walker Hall, which serves as the school clinic, the heating plant, Miller Dining Hall, and Birchard Field House. Parts of the roof were blown off the gymnasium.

The twister then struck the trailer court immediately east of the campus, where about fifty trailer homes were parked. Parts of two trailers were left standing. The tornado strewed the broken and demolished houses across an open field. Miraculously, no one was killed. Dr. and Mrs. Clinton Bushey, whose home was in the park, were among the injured. Dr. Bushey is a professor of biological sciences.

The storm hit the campus at $4: 25$ p.m., April 17.

1962 Institute of Scientific Studies for the Prevention of Alcoholism； spoke in chapel at both Pasadena College and the Nazarene Theological Seminary in 1962；and has addressed many Health Education workshop at state colleges and for public school systems．He is active in the Associ－ ation for the Advancement of Infor－ mation on Alcohol and Narcotics．He has attended both the Yale School of Alcohol Studies and the Institute of Scientific Studies for the Prevention of Alcoholism．

Mr．Hanners＇home church was Fairbury，Nebraska（also the home church of Dr．Melza Brown）．Here he was saved under the ministry of Rev．L．A．Ogden．He graduated from Northwest Nazarene College．His pastorates include Lisbon，North Da－ kota；Wenatchee．Washington：and First Church，Vallejo．California．For two years he served as assistant pas－ tor to Dr．John E．Riley at the Col－ lege Church，Nampa，Idaho．He was the first minister ordained by Dr． Hardy C．Powers after his election to the general superintendencs．

Mr．Hanners and his family are members of the Concord．California， Church of the Nazarene．Concord is on the new Northern California（or coastal）District with Dr．E．E．Zarh－ ary as the district superintendent．
