Sitting closer to the front in chapel, acting hosts and hostesses in the dining hall, and executing campus offices all signified that we had arrived.


We were plunged very early into a busy year of planning and preparation for the Thanksgiving chapel program.


The Deltas, riddled by the loss of players, failed to win a game in spite of their fighting spirit.




With the increase of interest in these services, we hope to accomplish the establishment-in-the-faith of the men and women who are saved through our ministry.






